Let Your Light Shine!

Lux tua luceat! Let your light shine! Throughout my high school years, that thought...that idea was before me daily...an excerpt from St. Matthew 5:16: "So let your light shine before all that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven." The sisters who taught me in grade school at St. Anthony of Padua and at The Catholic High School of Baltimore were Sisters of St. Francis of Philadelphia (Glen Riddle Franciscans, as we called them then!) and it was their mission to share their Franciscan charism with their students. So it's not surprising that I find myself reflecting often on something that one of them said or did that was truly Franciscan!

That scripture verse was emblazoned on everything at Catholic High so I guess that's why it comes to mind so often these days, and as I meditate on it, I see it as something that can serve us well in our lives as Secular Franciscans today. Within our fraternities, there are numerous opportunities to "let our light shine" by serving on a local, regional or national level. And by using our God-given talents in service to our fraternity, we give honor and glory to our Father in heaven.

For us, as Secular Franciscans, "serving" is not an option...it's an obligation. In Article 21 of our Rule, we are challenged to offer our "service" for a period of time and we are reminded that our service must be "marked with a ready and willing spirit and is a duty of responsibility to each member and to the community" and we cannot take that responsibility lightly.

So frequently we hear of local fraternities that have difficulty getting a few people willing to serve on the council at election time. It is easy for us to hide behind those convenient phrases: "I'm too busy" or "I've taken my turn already" or "I'm involved in so many other things."

Sometime in the next three years, your own fraternity will be asking for people to assume the leadership roles as council members? It might be a good idea to begin now to pray for guidance, and ask the Holy Spirit to bestow on you the courage and the wisdom you need to "let your light shine" by using the gifts that He gave you to serve your Franciscan brothers and sisters.

ST. FRANCIS LEADERSHIP SEMINAR

Imagine a setting with buildings named after famous Franciscans or Franciscan places on a rolling mountainside, and Franciscans from as far away as California coming together for instruction and fellowship, and you have a recipe for an unforgettable Franciscan experience.

Seventy-three SFOs gathered at St. Francis University in Loretto, Pennsylvania from June 26-29 to explore with Father Bernie Tickerhoof, TOR and Anne Mulqueen, SFO, the topic of leadership. There were 17 regions represented and ten SFOs from St. Margaret of Cortona participated. (See photo to the left.)

Topics included discernment of gifts, basic choices, servant leadership, listening with compassion and empathy, leadership styles, decision making, crisis and conflict, and leadership development/training. These lectures were presented with story telling, power point presentation, and personal sharing. Morning and evening prayers and liturgies provided a rich spiritual dimension.

There was much food for thought. A few highlights are offered:

Our call to discipleship and mission leads to leadership.

We bring our baggage of personal potential and frailty with us but through discerning our gifts and those in our fraternity we promote the reign of God.

The Spirit gives in abundance and God's graces are continuously pouring out toward us in conversion and faith.

Servant leadership is a Franciscan response to our leadership style as SFOs.

Communicating holistically and collaboratively are hallmarks of true interpersonal communication.

This gathering was the first of what is envisioned as annual events. The next seminar will be on Franciscan Spirituality at St. Francis University from June 25-28, 2009. Special thanks to Fr. Kevin Queally, TOR, National Spiritual Assistant, for promoting these seminars.





St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Fraternity in Emmitsburg, Maryland, held a baby shower in May to benefit the Pregnancy Center in Emmitsburg. Minister Gail Bunyan said "it was so much fun and everyone enjoyed buying little baby things again. For some of us, it's been many years! We had second-hand strollers, baby carriers, baby tubs, etc., as well as packages of diapers, baby clothes, blankets, bottles, etc. The Pregnancy Center is so grateful for anything you have to offer."

Fraternity members brought snacks and drinks and shared a dessert during their social time...a sheet cake decorated for a baby shower. The afternoon continued with their regular meeting.





Up until several months ago, I had been in charge of the St. Rita parish food closet, organizing, bagging and distributing food to anyone who came to the rectory door. Our numbers grew from the few to the many, as there is a "network" on the streets and friend told friend. I wasn't fully aware at the time, but the work was becoming a part-time job, not the most prudent byproduct of our original intent. My good priests noticed however, and stepped in to relieve me of this extra work. After determining what was best for everyone, it was agreed that St. Rita Parish would no longer operate a parish food closet. Our parish outreach program is quite excellent, however, and our many 'clients' were given multi-purpose referral cards.

I learned a great deal from this three-year experience. This was a truly Franciscan opportunity and, with few exceptions, I put my best (sandaled!) foot forward. Although the work was exhausting, I would have continued had Father wanted it so. Leaving it behind may have been good for my back and legs, yet it was my heart that took a bit longer to heal.

It was a painful awakening (after much prayer and many tears), to realize I had made this work too much my own. I had become attached to how good I felt when things went well, and I could fill perhaps a dozen orders a day! I felt good when people smiled and wanted to know my name and thanked me and said they loved me (men and women). I felt good that I could "manage" this work, as well as everything on my desk. — And so what have I learned? I've learned that God's Will is all that matters. I've learned that this was His work all along; it never was mine. I've learned that the poor are His, as I am, and He can take care for *all* of us quite nicely! And I've come to understand what Scripture means by 'obedience being a sacrifice truly pleasing to God.'
