Let's talk money...

Regional Treasurer offers some tips!

The General Constitution tells us that there is a need for every fraternity to keep accurate financial records and that there be proper oversight of the person responsible for custody of the cash and the accounting records. And it's the council's responsibility to make sure the treasurer is maintaining adequate records and discharging the duties of the office in a Franciscan manner. At a minimum, the Constitution says, the council should provide for an audit of the treasurer's records at least just prior to the end of his or her term of office. In addition, a written report of that audit must be given to the council of the higher fraternity.

To make record keeping easier, payments should never be made from undeposited cash receipts. If cash is needed for an immediate expenditure, it should come from a petty cash fund authorized by the council and a payment voucher should be completed as a record. That petty cash fund can be replenished periodically by cashing a check for the appropriate amount.

It's important that the treasurer makes regular financial reports to the membership and council showing details of all income, expenses and cash balances, investments and any money held in trust. The report should be provided at least annually, if not more frequently. And an annual report must also be submitted to the next higher council. The treasurer may choose to publish the annual report in the fraternity's bulletin or newsletter and a copy should also be submitted to the council.

Items that should be a part of that annual report include the details of the fraternity membership (how many members, etc.), a description of activities, goals and accomplishments, the treasurer's annual financial report and the budget for the upcoming year. This annual report, along with the yearly per capita (Our Fair Share) should be submitted no later than July of each year.

If there are any questions regarding the responsibilities of the treasurer, a copy of the "Treasurer's Guidelines" from the National Fraternity of the Secular Franciscan Order in the USA is available from the Office of the Treasurer, 8933 Trailwood Court, Mentor, Ohio 44060-2131.

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
One Voice for Advocacy

More than 130 members of the Franciscan Family, representatives from 69 provinces, congregations, Secular Franciscan regions and ecumenical partners from throughout the United States, met for three days in March to discuss and discern ways to bring a more visible and effective Franciscan presence to the effort of repairing relationships to establish justice in the world. At this meeting, held in Baltimore, Franciscan friars, sisters, seculars and ecumenicals called for themselves and the larger U.S. Franciscan Family to “speak with one Franciscan Voice in order to effect the transformation of national social policy.” The gathering represented the largest U.S. Franciscan group ever assembled in the U.S. solely to discuss ways to be better advocates with persons who are poor, marginalized or victims of injustice.

Following an opening session on prayer, the participants interacted with three speakers to explore more deeply a Franciscan approach to advocacy: Fr. Michael Perry, OFM, councilor for the Sacred Heart OFM Province, Sr. Meg Guider, OSF, professor of Missiology at Weston Jesuit School of Theology, and Marie Dennis, SFO, director for the Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns. Each of the three presenters was paired with a “Franciscan Voice” who shared personal stories and realities. Br. Rodrigo Peret, OFM of Brazil, Mrs. Mary Mwangi, SFO of Kenya, and Sr. Sheila Kinsey, OSF from Wheaton, IL grounded the three presentations with the experiences of those ministering with persons who are poor or marginalized and were able to help make clear the connections between our experiences in the world and our rich Franciscan Charism.

The group collectively wrote a vision statement (see below) calling the Family to work together for social transformation and committed themselves to further dialogue and establishing a broad-based Franciscan Family Commission for Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation, as well as a Center for Action based in Washington, DC. so that the Franciscan Family in the U.S. will be able to effectively “walk with our brothers and sisters who are

Vision Statement of the Franciscan Family

ASSISI DURING LENT

Four members of the **St. Francis Fraternity** in Triangle, Virginia, traveled to Rome and Assisi in March as part of St. Francis Parish 50th Anniversary Pilgrimage. While Rome and the Papal Audience were "once in a lifetime experiences," one of the highlights for SFOs **Judi Ryerse, Claire Hoagland, Pat Steinberg and MaryLou Coffman**, was the opportunity to participate in a Lenten service along with Assisi's citizens, the Bishop, and the Friars and Sisters. As they do each Friday night during Lent, the Bishop led the townspeople along "the way of the cross," starting at the foot of the town near the Basilica of St. Francis and proceeding up the streets of Assisi to the Cathedral of St. Clare. At each of the temporary wooden crosses adorning the streets, the Bishop stopped for prayers, readings and singing. At the end of the "way", Claire said, the Bishop gave a sermon and a blessing to everyone who had accompanied him.

"It was a wonderful experience," said Claire, "and I am so glad that I followed the townspeople up that hill that night in the cold."

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Reflections from the Shore

Global warming has become the center of our news. We are witnessing the devastating effects of greenhouse gases – polar ice melts, extreme weather conditions, extinction of plants and animals, etc. We are seeing changes here at the shore with beach erosion, frequency and severity of our Nor'easters (eventually our property which is two miles inland will be beachfront...!!!).

What are our responsibilities to prevent and change the slow destruction of Mother Earth? What are we leaving our children, grandchildren and future generations? Does it matter?

Global warming and the associated climate changes we are experiencing are being attributed to the increases of "greenhouse" gas emissions (e.g., carbon dioxide, methane and nitrous oxides). U.S. carbon dioxide emissions are more than 20 tons per person annually (six times the global average). About half of this amount is attributed to direct emissions from household operations and our personal transportation. The remainder is from indirect emissions (e.g., greenhouse gas emissions from the manufacture, packaging and delivery of the products we purchase).

As stewards of God's creation we are called to take responsibility for the care of the environment. Specifically, as Secular Franciscans we are called to action by Article 18.4 of the General Constitutions of the SFO: "Following the example of Francis, patron of ecologists, they should actively put forward initiatives that care for creation and should work with others in efforts that both put a stop to polluting and degrading nature and also establishes circumstances of living and environment which would not be a threat to the human person."

What can we do to reduce greenhouse gases? There are several actions to consider including the following:

- ✓ Reduction of direct emissions of greenhouse gases
- ✓ Reduction of our indirect emission of greenhouse emissions
- ✓ Advocacy
- ✓ Prayer

In future issues we will offer some tips and suggestions to accomplish these actions including a challenge to reduce our greenhouse emissions by ten percent.

Community Outreach Project

At a recent Minister's gathering we heard about a number of interesting outreach projects that are underway in various fraternities. The projects ran the gamut, from saving Campbell Soup labels for inner city schools, to a website, www.anysoldier.com, which lists items that can be collected and shipped to our troops, to monthly team visitations of shut-in fraternity brothers and sisters, to a fraternity that records their monthly meetings so their inactive members can hear what's happening and still feel a part of the fraternity.

One project, however, touched the hearts of many at this meeting. **St. Clare Emerging Fraternity** in Bethany Beach, Delaware, is providing financial assistance to The Clermont Center for Homeless Adolescents in Jacmel, Haiti, a facility established about three years ago to help provide the basic necessities of food, shelter, clothing, medical care, guidance and supervision to young boys formerly living on the streets of Haiti. By offering these provisions, the chances of success for at-risk youth in Haiti is being significantly enhanced. A child can be supported for as little as \$50 a month. NOMINATIONS
NOW BEING ACCEPTED**

Our SFO Rule (19) instructs us: “Mindful that they are bearers of peace which must be built up unceasingly, they should seek out ways of unity and fraternal harmony through dialogue, trusting in the presence of the divine seed in everyone and in the transforming power of love and pardon.”

Our National Vice Minister, Tom Bello, has been given permission to revive the NAFRA Peace Award initiated in 1950 to recognize those who have made significant efforts in the generally defined area of PEACE. While guidelines may be revised at the National Gathering in October, presently they provide that any nominee for this award who resides in the United States or U.S. Territories have an advantage over those from other parts of the world. Nominees should not be political and not carry an agenda, they should be of known good moral character and they need not be Franciscan or Catholic.

Previous recipients of the Peace Award include Former Secretary of State, John Foster Dulles; former Archbishop of Boston, Most Rev. Richard J. Cushing; former Director of the FBI, J. Edgar Hoover; Rev. Martin L. King; Pope Paul VI; Robert F. Kennedy; Mother Teresa of Calcutta; Anwar Sadat and Pope John Paul II. Since 2000, the Peace Award has gone to a member of the Secular Franciscan Order.

In order to proceed, first of all, the Peace Award Committee (National Vice-Minister Tom Bello; National Peace and Justice Chair, Carolyn Colburn; LaVerna Regional Minister and former Chair of the Peace Award Committee, Ken Beattie; and National Public Relations Team Co-Chair Mary Stronach) would like each fraternity in the United States, locally, regionally and nationally, to pray and work with renewed spirit from our Risen Lord Jesus Christ for peace. Secondly, they are asking each fraternity in the United States, locally and regionally, to consider awarding a Peace Award to a worthy recipient of its own choosing. Third, they are asking each fraternity in the United States, locally and regionally, to consider making a nomination to the National Peace Award Committee for a recipient to receive the 2007 National SFO Peace Award at the NAFRA Gathering in October 2007. While they prefer that fraternities make these nominations, those made by individual Secular Franciscans will not be ignored. Nominations may be submitted in hard copy or e-mail to any of the members of the Committee. A nomination needs to be of three parts: one, the name of the possible recipient; two, reasons why this person should be considered; three, the name of the person or group making the nomination.

Novena for Darfur

A Message from our Regional Minister

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

We are once again approaching the time for praying the "perpetual" Novena for Darfur. St. Margaret of Cortona has been assigned the 2nd week of the months of January & July. As you read her timetable, all the regions of NAFRA are involved.

This is a very powerful way for us to do something. There are many possible ways to implement this within individual fraternities, and that will be up to each fraternity, so please plan to discuss this at your next few council meetings, as July will soon be here.

As agreed at the NAFRA meeting last fall, the SFO in the United States would like to continue the "perpetual" novena for at least one year on behalf of the people of Darfur. Every day, members of the SFO will be praying the novena prayer. For this to happen, 5 Regional fraternities be assigned to cover each month. To make sure we cover the entire month, there will be four to five "waves" of the novena, each starting on Sunday. People are assigned to these waves by Region again, as noted below. For example, the first Sunday of June, members of St. Elizabeth of Hungary Region will begin praying the novena; the second Sunday of the month Lady Poverty will begin the novena. In this way the people of Darfur will be held in prayer by the SFO for the entire year.

In the event there are only 4 Sundays in the month, the fifth Region can pray week 1, or choose another week. Individuals may start and end their novena on other days if necessary, or do a different week. If you want to continue to pray before or after your week/month you can certainly do that! You are also encouraged to share the novena with people in your parish, youth groups, or other organizations to which you belong.

A novena allows us to hold a particular concern before God in a special way. The name "novena" comes from the Latin for "nine". Traditionally we pray a novena every day for nine days, and the prayer is usually a bit longer than a brief intercession. This allows us to give more of ourselves to our prayer for the concern we are bringing before God.
