Minister's Message

May is the special month of Our Lady and Our Mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary. The practice of dedicating the month of May to the Blessed Virgin began in the late 13th century initially as a way to replace secular springtime celebrations. Honoring Mary during the month of May has been highly recommended by many popes including St. John Paul II. The Church also recognizes and honors Mary as our mother (John 19:27).

How appropriate that Mother's Day is in May. The first celebration of this day in the United State was held in 1908. Anna Jarvis, the founder of Mother's Day in the U.S., believed a mother is "the person who has done more for you than anyone in the world." And, for most people, that was pretty much true – until 1973. That was the year of the U.S. Supreme Court's *Roe v. Wade* decision. No longer was a pregnant mother considered to be "with child," because an unborn baby was now something less than human; it had become a fetus.

Those of us old enough to remember at least back to the seventies know how rapidly technology has developed since then. With respect to pregnancies, ultrasound, electronic fetal heart monitoring and fetoscopy (an optical instrument put directly into the womb) has made it possible to see a developing baby as never before. Here is a description of a baby in the womb at 20 weeks: "the baby weighs about 10 ounces and is a little more than 6 inches long. The baby can suck a thumb, yawn, stretch, and make faces. Soon -- if you haven't already -- you'll feel your baby move."

On the evening of January 29, 2018, a procedural vote on a Senate bill to ban abortions after 20 weeks failed after more than three hours of debate. The bill will continue to be considered in the Senate and is widely expected to be a topic of debate in 2018 elections. The Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act proposes that abortions be made illegal after 20 weeks on the basis that fetal neural development enables the unborn to experience pain. The bill, which was passed by the House in October 2017, is opposed by most Senate Democrats. Fourteen Catholic senators, twelve Democrats and two Republicans, voted against the 20-week abortion ban in the procedural vote.

Germain Grisez served as professor of moral theology at Mount St. Mary's Seminary in Emmitsburg, Maryland, from 1979 to 2009. Sadly, he died February 1, 2018 at the age of 88. He was considered a towering figure in contemporary Catholic teaching on abortion, contraception and chastity. In a 2004 article for *America* magazine on public funding for abortion, he wrote that "legislators who support abortion funding ipso facto intend that abortions be done."

So what does this mean for us, you and me? Do we say we oppose abortion but vote for legislators who support abortion funding? The federal budget this year contained \$500,000,000 of taxpayer dollars for Planned Parenthood, the world's largest abortion provider, founded by Margaret Sanger. Planned Parenthood provides about a third of the roughly one million abortions done in the United States every year. Think about it – since the *Roe v. Wade* decision in 1973, over 60,000,000 abortions have been performed in the United States.

I believe, as Anna Jarvis said, that our mothers have done more for us than anyone in the world. I wish all mothers a special and happy Mother's Day. Let us also thank our spiritual mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary, for all she does for us and wish her, too, a Happy Mother's Day; and with Mary enjoy this beautiful month of May.
