IV. DECLINE IN THE QUALITY OF HUMAN LIFE AND THE BREAK-DOWN OF SOCIETY

Paragraph 50 "Instead of resolving the problems of the poor and thinking of how the world can be different, some can only propose a reduction in the birth rate. At times, developing countries face forms of international pressure which make economic assistance contingent on certain policies of "reproductive health". Yet "while it is true that an unequal distribution of the population and of available resources creates obstacles to development and a sustainable use of the environment, it must nonetheless be recognized that demographic growth is fully compatible with an integral and shared development". [28] To blame population growth instead of extreme and selective consumerism on the part of some, is one way of refusing to face the issues. It is an attempt to legitimize the present model of distribution, where a minority believes that it has the right to consume in a way which can never be universalized, since the planet could not even contain the waste products of such consumption. Besides, we know that approximately a third of all food produced is discarded, and "whenever food is thrown out it is as if it were stolen from the table of the poor".[29] Still, attention needs to be paid to imbalances in population density, on both national and global levels, since a rise in consumption would lead to complex regional situations, as a result of the interplay between problems linked to environmental pollution, transport, waste treatment, loss of resources and quality of life."

Currently, we are reading "Clare, A Light In The Garden". A beautiful meditation on the life of St Clare and her relationship to St Francis.

We meet on the first Saturday of each month from 1pm til 3pm in the Kolbe Room at the Shrine though we are very willing to move to another time slot if space at the Shrine is available. Bring a bag lunch and enjoy good conversation!

Franciscan Prayer

We know that neither Clare nor Francis offered a complicated prayer method. They call their followers to prayer with a decidedly contemplative dimension - to be present to God who is present to all creatures is prayer. They require that our prayer be Trinitarian. Our prayer is always addressed to God in the Son by the power of the Spirit. ... Our prayer is to be Incarnational. We become alive to God's deeds in the greatest gift of God, the Incarnation, in which God becomes one with us in the Son. The purpose of all Franciscan prayer, then is to give God ceaseless praise and thanksgiving for all God has done and does in creation and in our re-creation in Christ.

Prayer is a way of life for us — all the time and everywhere. We should be so filled with God that adoration flows from the depth of our inner life ... with joy and thanksgiving. This is the holiness to which we are called. Our everyday should thus be sanctified. In Francis' time, this sanctification of the day was given clear expression in the divine office. This is still the Church's understanding of the Liturgy of the Hours. We pray with the Son in his Mystical Body celebrating God's gift of salvation throughout the day. ... For Francis, praying the Office is also a sign of fidelity to the Church's tradition of daily praise and intercession.

(In the Rule), the motivation for our life of ceaseless prayer is described. ... The created world is the expression of God's goodness and the theater of God's redemptive love for us. Because we are made in God's image, it is possible for us to seek union with God as we do God's will. Thus, the Franciscan does not flee the world in order to "escape" to God, but seeks immersion in its sacramental reality. - Margaret Carney, OSF – "Franciscan Morning and Evening Praise"

The gospel way is a way of active love

To love our enemies, to turn the other cheek, to feed the hungry, to lay down one's life—these, Francis indicates, are not forms of passivity and resignation but active affirmations and instances of Jesus' Reign of God. While warning that "all who take up the sword will perish by the sword" (Matt. 26:52), Jesus rebukes the disciples who request permission to call down fire from heaven on inhospitable Samaritans (Luke 9:51-56). That war-like activity is familiar to us listening to accounts of bombing strikes in contemporary warfare on nearly every continent. Jesus urges a transformation based on compassion, bearing one another's burdens, loving one's enemies, sharing one's goods with each other. In the end, he asks for forgiveness for those who put him to death for "they do not know what they are doing" (Luke 34: 24).

"Look at the humility of God, and pour out your hearts before Him!

Hold back nothing of yourselves for yourselves, that He who gives

totally to you may receive you totally!"



The Form of Life Article 14

3. They should participate in the sacraments of the Church, attentive not only to personal sanctification, but also to fostering the growth of the Church and the spreading of the Kingdom. They should collaborate in achieving living and conscious celebrations in their own parishes, particularly in the celebrations of baptism, confirmation, marriage, and the anointing of the sick.
