Dear Brothers and Sisters,

There is no better season to appreciate the benefits of waiting than Advent. We are called to wait upon the Lord with courage and faith. At this time in the liturgical year, we remind ourselves of one of the basic ambiguities of our lives, that things are already present to us but not yet fully come. We are pilgrims who celebrate our destination while still journeying towards it. This special time is the Advent of the Lord, when we celebrate his arrival even as we still look forward to his coming.

As we contemplate the Incarnation during this Advent season, we see more deeply the depths of the love of our God for us. In his "Admonitions", Francis writes that the Father who dwells in "inaccessible light" is present in the Son through the love of the Spirit. "Each day he humbles himself as when he came from the royal throne into the Virgin's womb, each day he himself comes to us, appearing humbly." This is the mystery of the Incarnation, the Christ we meet in the Holy Eucharist.

"The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us" (Jn 1:14) As we enter into Advent, we pray for the grace to welcome our God as he already is in our lives. Jesus asks us to make our home in him as he makes his home in us. (Jn 15:4)

May our time of waiting for the celebration of Christmas be a joyful response to the Divine Presence within us!

Minister's Message

The more I listen to the news lately, the worse I feel. The rhetoric seems so divisive, the positions of the Democrats and Republicans are so strongly held, the name-calling so outrageous, that I'm left just shaking my head and wondering about a society that has become so uncivil. "You cannot be civil with a political party that wants to destroy what you stand for, what you care about," Hillary Clinton said recently; while President Trump travels the country calling the press "the enemy of the people." The Brett Kavanaugh confirmation hearings were demoralizing, while politics at the state level is no more palatable.

When things begin to look bleak and miserable, it's a good time to take a step back and focus instead on the many joys and blessings God gives us each day. One day, Brother Masseo and St. Francis were on the road and, after having begged for food in a small town, sat by a spring looking at the meager fare. Brother Masseo was depressed and questioned how Francis could be so joyful over the pitiful amount of food. "Because we are so lucky!" said St. Francis. "But Father," said Masseo incredulously, "we have no tablecloth, no knife, no plates, no pitchers, no house…" Exclaimed Francis, "but everything has been supplied by God's providence – look at this bread we begged for, this fine white stone that serves as a table, and this cool clear water! Isn't it wonderful? So let us pray God to make us love with all our hearts that holy poverty to which He subjected himself from His birth until His death!" Francis' words completely changed Masseo's outlook.

St. Francis was a simple man, unschooled, who eschewed books and did not hold book learning in much esteem. In his day many of his more educated friars thought of St. Francis as a simpleton, yet he demonstrated such magnetism that he drew large numbers of men into a way of life unparalleled since the time of Christ. To focus only on his simplicity is to trivialize the man. Simplicity is nice but without passion, drive, courage and an ideological vision, little will be accomplished. Keeping his mind centered on God, through prayer, staying positive and seeing the blessings he possessed empowered him to act as few are able to do. Being uneducated and poor did not cause him to despair, instead he was excited to think, speak and act in ways that to this day are considered 'different' but were incredibly effective.

As we follow the events of our time, let's not get dragged down to an emotional fetal position thinking that we are powerless to change anything. St. Francis can be our model on how to not only cope but act positively and forcefully to effect changes in our society and our church while at all times living the gospel. While some of our leaders are 'going low,' we can be light to the world and demonstrate how everyone, leaders included, should be expected to act.

Chester B. Barrick

Hanover - Chester Burnell Barrick, 94, of Hanover, PA, entered God's eternal care on Sunday, October 21, 2018 at home with his loving family by his side.

Born October 14, 1924, in New Oxford, PA, he was the son of the late Chester J. and Ruth P. (Becker) Barrick. Chet was the devoted

husband of Mary E. (Myers) Barrick with whom he shared seventy-two blissful years of marriage.

Chester attended Littlestown High School. As a veteran he served his country proudly in the <u>United States Marine Corps</u> from 1943-1946 during <u>WWII</u>. He established Chester B. Barrick Insurance Agency which he owned and operated for 44 years.

Chester was an active and faithful member of St. Joseph Catholic Church, Hanover, PA. His other memberships included the American Legion-VFW Hanover Post 2506, <u>BPOE</u> Hanover Elks Lodge, Hanover Lions Club, and 4th Degree in the Hanover Knights of Columbus.

Chester created beautiful stained glass art including the stained glass windows in the Adoration Chapel in McSherrystown, PA.

Chet professed and became a Secular Franciscan on July 13, 2003.
