May the Feast of the Incarnate Christ be with you all!


Our next article on Francis and the Beatitudes will talk about how good we are as peacemakers. This Beatitude states: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God" (Matthew 5:9). We acknowledge our resource: "Brother Fir, Sister Earth: The Way of Francis of Assisi for a Socially Responsible World" by Adela DiUbaldo Torchia, doctor of religious studies at the University of Manitoba.

Living harmoniously with others is certainly important to us as Franciscans and Christians. At the end of his "Canticle of Brother Sun". Francis added at a later time words about the happiness of those who endure peace. This addition specifically referred to a conflict involving noblemen or civil authorities at a local situation he had to diffuse. The concern to diffuse tense situations was familiar to him. As Franciscans and as clearly defined in his "Peace Prayer", Francis was known as a person of peace. But we also know that he experienced disagreements and tensions in his life. Early Documents, for example, often mentioned Francis's admonitions to his friars to keep them from saying anything critical to or about the local parish priests whose approval was required before any of the friars could preach in that parish. Also causing hardships to the friars having deep desire to share their visions of God's goodness with the local people. Much of this unfortunately was driven by petty jealousies and vested interests among some local priests and church authorities. It was difficult to curtail the friars' sharing for an indefinite period of time. Therefore, Francis had to be insistent that the priests were not to be criticized.

The calling to be peacemakers unfortunately does not always mean avoiding conflict. Sometime, it is the result of attempted peacemaking. Next month, we will see that this conflict can involve persecution for doing the right thing.

Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order Chapter 2 The Way of Life

Article 7. United by their vocation as "brothers and sisters of penance", and motivated by the dynamic power of the gospel, let them conform their thoughts and deeds to those of Christ by means of that radical interior change which the gospel itself calls "conversion". Human frailty makes it necessary that this conversion be carried out daily. On this road to renewal the sacrament of reconciliation is the privileged sign of the Father's mercy and the source of grace.
