

Message from the Minister...

Dear Sisters and Brothers of Francis and Clare,

On April 29th I was able to attend a seminar given by Fr. Charley Miller, OFM on the Primacy of Christ. While initial formation gave us a taste of the Franciscan theology of the Incarnation, Fr. Charley provided a new depth of understanding of the differences between mainstream Catholic thought and the Franciscan intellectual tradition concerning the Incarnation.

Mainstream Catholic thought sees Christ primarily as the Redeemer whose suffering and death on the cross saves us from the effects of the sin of Adam. Continuing this thought, Christ came because Adam sinned and thus sin becomes the central reason for the Incarnation. This view of the world is sin-centered. This theology of the Incarnation is what I was taught as I grew up. I never heard of anything different. It was only after I started my Franciscan formation did I learn that Franciscans believe something different. Ilia Delio, OSF tells us that "Scotus maintains that God became human in Jesus out of love (rather than because of human sin) because God wants to express God's self in a creature who would be a masterpiece and who would love God perfectly in return. This is Scotus' doctrine of the primacy of Christ. Christ is the first in God's intention to love. Creation is not an independent act of divine love ... Rather, the divine desire to become incarnate was part of the overall plan. . . Scotus places the Incarnation within the context of creation and not within the context of human sin. Christ, therefore, is the masterpiece of love...Creation was only a prelude to a much fuller manifestation of divine goodness, namely, the Incarnation."

"Christ is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. For in him were created all things in heaven and on earth, the visible and the invisible...all things were created through him and for him. He is before all things, and in him all things hold together..." Colossians 1:15-17

As Franciscans, we need to understand that our salvation from sin is an effect of the Incarnation, not its cause. Our view of the world is not sin-centric but Christocentric. We need to look at Jesus as the center of the universe, the center of creation. The Jesuit poet Gerard Manley Hopkins wrote of Christ as the center:

...For Christ plays in ten thousand places, Lovely in limbs, and lovely in eyes not his To the Father through the features of men's faces.

I pray everyone enjoyed Spirit filled Pentecost and Memorial Day, and I hope to see you all on June 25th. We are late by a week because of Father's Day.
