# RECAP OF OCTOBER 1 GATHERING

#### **OPENING PRAYER**

Josh Goldberg, OFS, offered this opening prayer of St. Francis: "Lord, help me to live this day quietly, peacefully. To lean upon Thy great strength trustfully, restfully. To wait for the unfolding of Thy will patiently, serenely. To meet others peacefully, joyously. To face tomorrow confidently, courageously. Amen."

#### PRESENTATION: OPEN HOUSE

Bill Richey, OFS, and Josh Goldberg, OFS, provided the presentation "Why be a Franciscan?"

- To live and share in the Gospel life through the way of St. Francis of Assisi
- St. Francis was born in 1181 or 1182 to a wealthy merchant in Spoleto, Italy.
- He was a serious partier as a young man; as a warrior in Assisi's war with Perugia, he was imprisoned for one year until his father paid a ransom.
- He founded the Franciscan Orders, including the Poor Clares and the OFS.
- He died in 1226, and was canonized in 1228; a short video of his life was played.
- OFS brothers and sisters see Christ in everyone, are devoted to Mother Mary, and seek constant conversion.
- We meet in community monthly and work in individual and group apostolates.
- Val Milleson, OFS, shared her journey after feeling a calling that lingered for years.
- Kelly Passero, Candidate, shared her path to Tau after two prior relocations necessitated her withdrawal from an OFS fraternity in each area.
- Jennifer Raimo, Inquirer, was then elevated to Candidate. The Rite of Admission was directed by Josh Goldberg, OFS, Minister, and Bill Richey, OFS, Formation Director, utilizing pp. 14-17 of the Ritual of the Secular Franciscan Order. Congratulations, Jen!

#### **ONGOING FORMATION**

Bill Richey, OFS, led a review discussion of pp. 70-77 of Called to Build a More Fraternal and Evangelical World — A Concordance to the SFO Rule. Reflections on Article 11 were offered by:


- Lisa Jaeger, OFS: St. Francis was an extreme example of giving up all material possessions. We
  just need to be detached from material things. This should be a freeing from worrying. A poverty
  in spirit is joyful. St. John Paul II had explained without emptying ourselves we cannot appreciate
  what we've been given.
- Liz Welborn, OFS, shared that St. Francis was exuberant and wanted to suffer as Christ did. She
  grew in love for Christ and St. Francis at the annual Tau retreat. St. Francis demanded poverty
  from early followers. Eventually, this changed but Liz no longer feels the need to own extra possessions.
- Sharon Goldberg, OFS, read from Thomas Merton, OCSO, that Christ is within us and we are called to live in great simplicity. She explained we need to open the door and our hearts to Christ. She considers herself a mystical Catholic and leads from her heart. She believes St. Francis lived complete surrender.

# RECAP OF OCTOBER 1 GATHERING

#### ONGOING FORMATION, CONTINUED

- Bill Richey, OFS, discussed 2 Corinthians 8:9, p. 71, "Remember how generous the Lord Jesus was: he was rich but he became poor for your sake, to make you rich out of his poverty."
   Sts. Francis & Clare had the same thread of thought. The Papal Statement, p. 76 notes we become rich in the poverty of Christ on the cross.
- Bill Bouffard, OFS, noted that the reading didn't touch upon the Beatitudes, which Article 11
  is closely tied to. It's not about me, you, or us. It's about God, which opened up everything
  else for St. Francis.
- Kimberley Heatherington, OFS, explained both Christ and St. Francis were poor, but we aren't; we're just not owned by our possessions. Spiritual poverty is detachment from things in order to be more open to God.
- A general group discussion took place after guest Tom Ryan asked about the connection between ego and poverty.

Joe shares that, "One of my most favorite parts of the campus is the life-sized Stations of the Cross...outdoors and so peaceful!"








