Minister's Notes

Last month Jan talked briefly about the 4 Cs of the Franciscan charism; the Crib,, the Cross, the Cup, and Creation. Upon reflecting on recent years of living as a Franciscan Christian, I realize that I often focus on one charism for weeks or months at a time, The year we were expecting our first grandchild was definitely a Crib/Incarnation year. The incarnation is something I keep coming back to, a sort of home base for my prayer life.

That is further reflected in my being more comfortable with the joyful mysteries than the sorrowful mysteries that focus on the Cross. It is interesting that at times of personal suffering my prayer life does not swing to the Cross but rather focuses on either the Joyful (Crib) or Glorious Mysteries. After all God humbled himself to become a human child, even if he knew an ugly death was part of the package. Jesus' glory returns with the Resurrection and the Glorious Mysteries.

The times I focus on the Cross are actually the times I focus on the Cup. I was catechized in an era when it was always called the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. Our parish has an oversize, can't miss it size, crucifix behind the altar. In my mind the Cross and the Cup are intertwined.

The fourth C charism is creation. The bird bath St. Francis comes to mind. For me care of creation starts with admitting to myself that I

Franciscan Crown Rosary in the FUN Manual

At the same time, Francis placed Mary as the Protectress of the Franciscan family: she holds a special place in our hearts and lives. There are some very authentic and specifically Franciscan ways of expressing this relationship. One option for our daily Office, for example, is the Little Office of the Virgin Mary, in its contemporary form, patterned after the Liturgy of the Hours. We have the Franciscan Crown Rosary, the "seven joys of Mary." So, while it would be inappropriate to make the Crown our normative prayer at fraternity meetings, at certain times of the year, particularly May or October, this may be a wonderful form of communal prayer. And in all of this, like the Franciscan life in general, we must always remember that we are people of our own time, and that we cannot and should not slavishly try to imitate Medieval spirituality. [Basic Catholic *Doctrine – 3-23-2011 Page 21 of 24*]

As stated previously by Pope Paul VI, our own Franciscan tradition holds up for our consideration two devotions to Mary as alternative means of praying the Liturgy of the Hours: the Franciscan Crown Rosary and the Little Office of the Blessed Virgin. Francis noted Mary to be the first disciple of our Lord. He followed her example unreservedly. He urges us to do the same. [Francis and the Blessed Virgin Mary 3-23-2011 Page 10 of 16]

The Franciscan Crown also shows honor to the Blessed Virgin Mother. It is the rosary of the seven joys of Mary and is appropriate for Franciscans to recite. The story behind the Franciscan Crown Rosary came about in the year 1422 when a young man who daily adorned a statue of Mary with a wreath of flowers was upset that he could not continue to do so since he had entered the friary. As the story is told, Mary appeared to him and asked him to give her a crown of flowers in the form of reciting seven decades of Hail Marys in honor of her seven joys: The Annunciation, the visit to Elizabeth, the Nativity, the adoration of the Magi, locating Jesus in the Temple, experiencing the Risen Jesus on Easter and her Assumption. This devotion quickly was said through the Franciscan family. At a later point in

time, the seven decades were followed with two Hail Marys in honor of the seventy-two years that it is believed she lived. One Our Father and Hail Mary were also added for the intention of the pope.

Prologue¹

Here Begins the Prologue to the Life of Blessed Francis

By St Bonaventure of Bagnoregio. OFM

The grace of God our Savior has appeared

In the last days (Titus 2:11)

in His servant Francis

to all who are truly humble, and lovers of holy poverty,
who, while venerating in him, God's superabundant mercy,
learn by his example

to reject wholeheartedly ungodliness and worldly passions, (Titus 2:12)
to live in conformity with Christ
and to thirst after blessed hope with unflagging desire. (Titus 2:13)

In an outpouring of kindness,

the Most High God looked upon him, (Job 36:22)

a little, poor, and contrite man, (Isaiah 66:2)

so that He not only lifted up the needy man (1 Kings 2:8)

from the dust of a worldly life; (Isaiah 49:6)

but gave him as a light for believers,
a practitioner, a leader, and a herald of Gospel perfection.

that by bearing witness of the light (John 1:7)

he might prepare for the Lord a way of light and peace (Luke 1:76, 79)

in the hearts of the faithful.

Shining with the splendor of his life and teaching, like morning star in the midst of the clouds, (Sirach 50:6) by his resplendent rays he guided into the light those sitting in darkness and in the shadow of death, (Luke 1:79) and, like the rainbow shining among clouds of glory (Sirach 50:8) he made manifest in himself the sign of the Lord's covenant. (Genesis 9:13)

He preached to the people (Romans 10:15)

the Gospel of peace and salvation,
being himself an angel of true peace. (Isaiah 33:7)

Like John the Baptist,

He was destined by God

to prepare in the desert a way of highest poverty (Isaiah 40:3)
and to preach repentance by word and example. (Luke 24:47)

First endowed with divine grace, he was then enriched by the merit of unshakeable virtue and *filled with the spirit* of prophecy, (Luke 1:67)

he was also assigned an angelic ministry and was totally inflamed with Seraphic fire.

Like a hierarchic man. lifted up on a *fiery chariot*, (2 Kings 2:11) it may be reasonably accepted a true that he came in the spirit and power of Elijah, (Luke 1:17) as.will appear quite clearly in the course of his life. And so in the true prophecy of that other friend of the Bridegroom, (John 3:29) John the Apostle and Evangelist he is considered not without reason to be like the Angel ascending from the rising of the sun bearing the seal of the Living God. For "at the opening of the sixth seal," (Revelation 6:12) John says in the Apocalypse, "I saw another Angel ascending from the rising of the sun having the sign of the Living God." (Revelation 7:2)

If we consider the height of his extraordinary sanctity
we can come to the conclusion, without any doubt,
that this messenger of God
--worthy of love by Christ,
imitation by us,
and admiration by the world—
was God's servant, Francis.
In this, while living among humans,
he was an imitator of angelic purity
and was placed as an example for the perfect followers of Christ.

This conviction should be faithfully and devotedly

in the forefront of our minds;
not only does this advance the mission he held
of calling to weep and mourn, (Isaiah 22:12)
to shave one's head and wear sackcloth,
and to sign the Tau
on the foreheads of those mourning and grieving (Ezekiel 9:4)
with a sign
of a penitential cross,
and the habit conformed to the cross,
even more,
It confirms with irrefutable testimony of truth that
the seal of the likeness of the Living God. (Ezekiel 28:12)
that is, of Christ crucified, (Ezekiel 28:12)
was imprinted on his body,
not by natural forces or human skill,

but by the wonderous power of the Spirit of the living God. (2 Corinthians 3:3)
