Little Flower Fraternity Family,

Christos anesti! Christ is risen!

Alithos anesti! He is risen indeed!

—Traditional Easter greeting and response (Eastern Orthodox and Eastern Catholic Churches)

Our Easter Gospel (John 20:1–9) is St. John’s magnificent account of the Resurrection.

Three key lessons follow from the disquieting fact of the Resurrection.

First, there is more to life than this life. Jesus' Resurrection from the dead shows as definitively as possible that God is up to something greater than we had imagined. We don't have to live as though death were our master and as though nihilism were the only coherent point of view. We can begin to see this world as a place of gestation toward something higher, more permanent, more splendid.

Second, tyrants now know their time is up. Remember that the cross was Rome’s way of asserting its power and authority. But when Jesus was raised from the dead through the power of the Holy Spirit, the first Christians knew that Caesar’s days were numbered. The current faculty lounge interpretation of the Resurrection as a subjective only personal experience or a mere symbol is exactly what the tyrants of the world want, for it poses no real threat to them. But, the Church says from its earliest days otherwise.

Third, the path of salvation has been opened to everyone. Jesus went all the way down, journeying into pain, despair, alienation, even godforsakenness, as far as you can go away from the Father. Why? In order to reach all who had wandered from God. In light of the Resurrection, the first Christians came to know that, even as we run as fast as we can away from the Father, we are running into the arms of the Son.

As Bishop Robert Barron writes, "And so let us not domesticate these still-stunning lessons. Rather, let us allow them to unnerve us, change us, and set us on fire."

Let us pray: Risen Lord, You conquered sin and death bringing forth new life for us who believe in You. Give us grace, to never allow our sin of pride to keep us from being open to the glorious and transforming action You desire to do in our lives. Please turn us from our sin that we may turn to You so that we can assist our brethern who struggle with the demands of life to come to faith in you. Jesus I trust in You.

Who Were Luchedio and Buonadonna?

Luchedio Modestini was a man who made his home in Poggibonsi, Italy and was a contemporary of St. Francis of Assisi. As a young [man](#) he was engrossed in worldly interests and engaged in business as a merchant and money lender. He married Buonadonna from an affluent family of Borgo Marturi. She shared Luchedio's desire of wealth and power. Neither exhibited compassion for those who were less fortunate.

Unexpectedly, Luchedio experienced a holy conversion when, touched by grace, he endeavored to seek God's kingdom. Intrigued by the gospel values of St. Francis of Assisi, whom he probably met in 1221, he embraced a penitential state of life, devoting himself to intense prayer, fasting, and to the care of the poor. His wife had not had such a conversion and lacked support for her husband's new ideals.

His generosity to the poor became his driving mission. One day the couple had no bread in their home, yet a poor man came to the door begging for food. Luchedio asked his wife to go see if there was something that they could provide to him. His wife lost her temper and scolded him out of concern that they themselves would go hungry. Luchedio asked her again to go look in the pantry which she did. When she opened the door of the pantry it was filled with all the best sorts of bread. From that moment Buonadonna tried to outdo her husband in performing good works.

At this time Saint Francis visited the region of Tuscany where they lived. Following his sermon on penance, many people were inspired to leave their lives and families in order to enter the friary. Francis responded by asking them instead to persevere in their secular vocations. A special Rule of Life was written to guide men and women in serving God perfectly in the world.

Today Luchedio and Buonadonna are regarded as the first Secular Franciscans.

Luchedio and Buonadonna's example helps us to remember how the Franciscan way of life emerges from the sincere conversion to the gospel of Jesus Christ. Our penitential

lives as followers of St. Francis set us free from selfish attachment to material possessions. This ongoing conversion enables us to serve our brothers and sisters – especially the poor and suffering – sharing generously with them our gifts.

The church celebrates the feast day of Blessed Luchesio and Buonadonna on April 28th.
