Minister's Notes

For months I have been promising that I would outline **job descriptions** for elected officers in 2024. Today I finally begin with what a minister does.

The minister leads the council (calls meetings,

chairs meetings)

The council decides on admission and acceptance to profession/ establishes fraternal dialogue with members in difficulties/receives requests for withdrawal/decides distribution of available funds.

The minister tries to make sure the decisions of the council are put into practice. The minister prepares the annual report to the regional council, attends regional elections and an annual ministers meeting (Sat. in Nov.), or delegates someone to represent the fraternity.

Ongoing formation - We continue "to live as Francis lived" this month. Once again, I will have copies available for sale, \$19, at the fraternity meeting. Reflection 2 starts on page 6. Jan will also speak with us about someone she feels lived as Francis lived. We are looking for volunteers to report on a favorite saint or saintly person. Who would like to share in March?

Liturgy of the Hours - We need volunteers to lead and lector. The leader starts the Hour with the opening verse ("God come to my assistance...), read the antiphon before the psalms and start the first verse, the Our Father and the closing prayer. The lector reads the short reading and leads the responsory, reads the antiphon for the Magnificat and lead the intercessions. These roles can shift a bit, but this delineation reduces the number of times the microphone needs to be handed off.

<u>Housing Options</u> include single and double hotel-like rooms with private baths in the <u>Christiane Inn</u>, in close proximity to the dining room and meeting rooms. Accommodations are also available in cottages, downhill from the dining and meeting space. <u>Cottages</u> have two twin beds per room and shared baths down the hall.

Event Costs:

All meals (Friday dinner through Sunday breakfast) and registration fees are included in the cost of the rooms. The lodging cost is based on the type of housing selected from the options below. There are no additional fees.

- Inn single room/1 queen bed for 1 person (\$265 by April 30/\$315 after May 1)
- Inn 2nd person in single room/1 queen bed for 2 persons (\$208 per person by April 30/\$235 per person after May 1) – must designate roommate
- Inn double room/2 queen beds for 2 persons (\$225 per person by April 30/\$275 per person after May 1) roommate may be designated or assigned
- Inn double room/2 queen beds for three persons (\$200 per person by April 30/\$230 per person after May 1) must designate roommates
- Inn double room/2 queen beds for four persons (\$188 per person by April 30/\$210 per person after May 1) must designate roommates

Cottage – two twin beds per room for 2 persons (\$185 per person by April 30/\$235 per person after May 1) – roommate may be designated or assigned (no single rooms in cottages)

PLEASE NOTE: Single rooms are limited and available on a 1st come, 1st served basis. If you want a single room, or to reserve any other room of your choice, we encourage you to register and pay the \$150 deposit ASAP.

Original Text of the Peace Prayer of St. Francis Belle prière à faire pendant la Messe

Seigneur, faites de moi un instrument de votre paix.

Là où il y a de la haine, que je mette l'amour.

Là où il y a l'offense, que je mette le pardon.

Là où il y a la discorde, que je mette l'union.

Là où il y a l'erreur, que je mette la vérité. Là où il y a le doute, que je mette la foi.

Là où il y a le désespoir, que je mette la joi. Là où il y a le désespoir, que je mette l'espérance.

Là où il y a les ténèbres, que je mette votre lumière.

Là où il y a la tristesse, que je mette la joie.

Ô Maître, que je ne cherche pas tant à être consolé qu'à consoler, à être compris qu'à comprendre, à être aimé qu'à aimer, car c'est en donnant qu'on reçoit, c'est en s'oubliant qu'on trouve, c'est en pardonnant qu'on est pardonné, c'est en mourant qu'on ressuscite à l'éternelle vie.

Origin of this Prayer

I he first appearance of the Peace Prayer occurred in France in 1912 in a small spiritual magazine called <u>La</u> <u>Clochette</u> (The Little Bell). It was published in Paris by a Catholic association known as **La Ligue de la Sainte-Messe** (The Holy Mass League), founded in 1901 by a French priest, Father Esther Bouquerel (1855-1923). The prayer bore the title of '*Belle prière à faire pendant la messe*' (A Beautiful Prayer to Say During the Mass), and was published anonymously. The author could possibly have been Father Bouquerel himself, but the identity of the author remains a mystery.

The prayer was sent in French to Pope Benedict XV in 1915 by the French Marquis Stanislas de La Rochethulon. This was soon followed by its 1916 appearance, in Italian, in <u>L'Osservatore Romano</u> [the Vatican's daily newspaper]. Around 1920, the prayer was printed by a French Franciscan priest on the back of an image of St. Francis with the title '*Prière pour la paix*' (Prayer for Peace) but without being attributed to the saint. Between the two world wars, the prayer circulated in Europe and was translated into English. Its has been attributed the first time to saint Francis in 1927 by a French Protestant Movement, **Les Chevaliers du Prince de la Paix** (The Knights of the Prince of Peace), founded by Étienne Bach (1892-1986).

The first translation in English that we know of appeared in 1936 in <u>Living Courageously</u>, a book by Kirby Page (1890-1957), a Disciple of Christ minister, pacifist, social evangelist, writer and editor of The World Tomorrow (New York City). Page clearly attributed the text to St. Francis of Assisi. During World War II and immediately after, this prayer for peace began circulating widely as the Prayer of St. Francis, specially through Francis cardinal Spellman's books, and over the years has gained a worldwide popularity with people of all faiths.
