

in the United States. and has been adopted by NAFRA. Franciscan Action Network (FAN) is a separate organization and encompasses the entire Franciscan family in lobbying efforts to promote gospel living. Board member Tom Bello spoke about the difficulties of promoting policies such as right to life in the political arena.

New formation documents are going to be issued by the International Fraternity (CIOFS), and regional formation teams should replicate the national formation workshop on the local level. Resource materials are listed on the last page of the *Tau-USA* newsletter.

PASTORAL VISITATION

National Spiritual Assistant Fr. Kevin Queally, TOR, Loretto, Pa., said that the Pastoral Visitor is to encourage the regional fraternity to live the Franciscan charism and emphasize the bond with the First Order and TORs. The decline in spiritual assistants was noted.

Fr. Queally said that fraternities must ask again and again for spiritual assistance, but that each fraternity must try to find suitable spiritual assistants. Fr. Queally recommended the Franciscan Family Connections program to form lay

spiritual assistants. Interested parties must be approved by the region and provincial assistant for the mentoring program.

He talked about the Summer Seminar program at St. Francis University on Franciscan Spirituality to be held June 25-29 and quoted Article 30 of the General Constitutions that each member is co-responsible for the life of the fraternity.

O.L.P.H. HAITI PROGRAM

Dr. Tom Fame, Companions of Francis & Clare Fraternity, Rocky Mount, Va., gave a presentation on the O.L.P.H. Haiti Project, with which he has been involved since 1996. With moving testimony and beautiful slides, he described the education projects on which he has focused These include has building three schools, setting up a lunch program, paying teachers. He is now turning to public health issues — a health clinic, clean water project, and solar panels for the schools and church.. He has written a book on his experiences in Haiti called The Lambi's Call. He will come to speak about his project to groups, and he seeks funds for ongoing projects there. More about the Haiti Project will be reported in the next issue of Up to Now.

JPIC Update from Rome

Pio Jackson OFM – director of the JPIC Office for the province – sends this update regarding his recent activities, especially his gathering in Rome for JPIC-related business

here is no need for me to go through a long and drawn-out explanation of why I am here in Rome and to put forth again the essence of our charism in justice, peace and integrity of creation.

So I will get to the point and just quote from a few of our recent documents.

Living and preaching the Gospel through works of reconciliation, peace, justice and care for creation is not one activity among others: parishes, schools, youth ministry care for the Secular Franciscans and religious women, missions, etc. Rather, it is an essential dimension of our vocation, like prayer, fraternity, minority and evangelization. JPIC is a way of life and mission; t through it we are challenged by the great issues of humanity and committed to the cause of all people, that all might live with dignity. Thus, JPIC embraces all our life; it is a central axis which passes through all the dimensions of our religious and Franciscan life; prayer, fraternity, formation, economics, vows mission, etc. All friars, whatever their age or ministry are called to integrate these dimensions in a balanced way through the course of their lives.

From the Guidelines for Animation 2009, 3.1.1.

JPIC will continue to be emphasized as a transverse dimension (emphasis theirs) of our vocation and appears in all the chapters of the Constitutions particularly in IV and V. And

The General Chapter requests that courses dedicated to JPIC, in which special attention is paid to the topics of creation and non-violence be established at the Pontifical Antonianum of Rome and recommends that similar courses be given in all the Franciscan Institutes of Higher Education.

from the *Proposals of the General Chapter of 2003*, Section V.41 on Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation

This year of 2009, twenty-three animators from across the globe have gathered to once again immerse ourselves into the heart of Franciscan living so we can better hear the cries of the poor and serve with humble, open and compassionate hearts. The latter part of the day is open to all who feel they can benefit from the Franciscan charism of

JPIC with about the same number coming from religious and other walks of life. The work here is long and intense and we see our greatest gift while we are here as ourselves to one another. Walking with vulnerability and humility, we minister to each with our presence and hopes and dreams. We do not see ourselves as experts but instruments of healing and hope. I have never ceased to be touched by the animators I have come across. Their lives tell the story of their commitment and their light shines through their wounds.

We are up for prayer around 6:00 a.m. and begin in our language groups between 7:00 a.m. and 7:30 a.m. The day starts with class around 9:00 a.m. on topics pertinent to JPIC, such as how we understand other religions and expressions of faith and how we do our work, and a methodology of proclamation, looking always to the signs of the times. After lunch, the sessions continue into the evening, interspersed with small breaks and group sharing. Sessions end about 7:00 p.m.

We are aware that we must be witness not only to others but to ourselves and our own Franciscan family as well. Everyone has asked what they can take back to their sisters and brothers, not only in their communities but their excluded, needy or poorest of the poor, and how they can better show this face of Francis to them.

I heard very little talk from any one about touring, etc. All were preoccupied with bringing in the Holy City of the Kingdom for all peoples and whatever time we had left was handled usually with a shrugged off attitude by someone with "well we'll see... I'm not really here to go around."



Above all we see ourselves as called to be disciples of Christ and Francis. Not to imitate, mind you. This distinction was made to us by one of the professors. We cannot try to superimpose 13th century Franciscan living into the 21st century modern world. We are called to witness

and serve the Living God who is as fresh as the Spirit and whose finger writes in sign our redemptive history with grace and hope, where we are open to embrace them and proclaim them for the sake of all.

The Franciscan friars are from the St. Joseph Friary in Chicago and are on a pilgrimage leaving Roanoke, Va., on June 20 and planning to reach the Monastery of the Holy Land in Washington, D.C. by July 31.

Two of the friars are Franciscans priests and formation directors for the other four. The four have made initial vows as Franciscans and are currently working toward their final vows.

The pilgrimage experience is an option during the friars' formation program for those who wish to discover the more primitive life of our founder. It is being conducted with the approval of their Provincial, the Very Rev. Jeffrey Scheeler, OFM. As the friars walk, they will be praying and sharing their experience of Jesus Christ. They plan to make stops along the way to work for the food and shelter needed to continue.

The priests are offering to preside at Masses in any parishes they visit. They would be happy to pray with and for Catholics gathered at these parishes, as well as to

speak to youth and young adult groups in any of the parishes they visit. They would enjoy speaking to any group about peacemaking and hope to engage other young people in conversation about the important issues of our times, the longings of our human hearts, and the desire for peace throughout the world.

What Are We Reading?

The Way of the Prisoner: Breaking the Chains of Self Through Centering Prayer and Centering Practice by Jens Soering. (Seattle: Lantern Press. 2003. Pp. 352.)

Centering Prayer is a modern adaptation of the ancient practice of contemplative prayer, a process of inner purification and an opening of the mind and heart to God. In this remarkable book, Jens Soering, an inmate in a Virginia prison, tells how Centering Prayer and its corollary, Centering Practice—contemplative prayer in action—enable him to survive the daily pain of prison life. Through a moving true story of personal redemption that shocks and inspires,

Soering shows how we can all transform our crosses, our prisons (literal or metaphorical), into the means of our salvation.

Not only does Soering discuss his prison experiences and his journey into Centering Prayer and Centering Practice, but he issues a challenge to each of us to engage in prison ministry and to work for reform of the justice system and the penal system.



Nominations Sought for NAFRA Peace Award

n 1950, the North American Federation of the Third Order of St. Francis, now the National Fraternity of the Secular Franciscan Order (NAFRA) instituted an annual peace award.

Nominations are now being accepted for the recipient of this year's award. Qualifications are that "[a] nominee should have made significant efforts in the generally defined area of Peace. Current activities would carry more weight than past activity; that is, a nominee exhibiting current Peace activity will have more weight over a nominee who displayed activity a few years ago. In order to prevent any scandal, the nominee should be of known good moral character.

As this is a National award, nominees who reside in the United States or U.S. Territories would have more weight than nominees from other parts of the world. Nominees need not be Franciscan or Catholic. Nominees should not:be political, nor carry an agenda."

The day began with Morning Prayer. Mass was offered at noon, followed by confessions after lunch.


