
NAFRA Secular Franciscan Peace Award 2009

AFRA's 2009 Secular Franciscan Peace Award has been presented to Don Ryder, sfo, for his work with the Water Project in Kenya, Africa. Don is a member of the St James Fraternity in Wausau, Wisc.

Don has helped coordinate efforts to raise money to drill wells and assemble piping for the pumps so tribes of the Maasai in Kenya Africa can have clean water. This has allowed the people to be stationary in a safer community.

The women of the villages have been saved from the rape and murder some of them fell to while traveling by foot to a stream or water hole that held dirty water, water that not only was contaminated with wild animal droppings but threatened by the dangerous animals themselves.

It took the women a full day to travel to and from their water source, carrying the containers over their backs. The lack of potable water caused the villagers to wonder from

place to place, never having stability. Their quality of community life was poor. Their main source of food was their cattle, which were not the fatted cattle we see in the United States.

The well and pump have allowed the villagers to be able to stay in one place, planting vegetable gardens to feed their families, with ample water for their livestock. This well has

nity get a copy. Please save our carrier pigeons and forward *Up to Now* to the members of your fraternity.





brought major improvements to their lives, cutting the infant mortality rate and reducing waterborne illnesses. Don is also encouraging them to plant trees, because they can now keep them watered, in an effort to reclaim some of the arid land in the Great Rift Valley. As the water is piped out beyond the well site, it is creating greater community among the people.

Work is already underway at another well site, where a windmill will be used. Near this second site is a small dispensary that Don visited on his last trip. There are plans are to pipe water to the dispensary with the hope that it can then be upgraded to a hospital where, the Maasai can come for treatment. The Diocese of Ngong, under the direction of Bishop Cornelius Schilder, recently received funds from the Vatican City to build a Catholic Church here. Water will also be piped to the school. All of this has been possible because of the efforts taken to see the needs of people and act on them.

Don has promoted the work among the SFO community throughout the LaVerna1

Region as well as in the neighboring city and towns of Wisconsin, and quite literally from coast to coast and border to border. The Fraternity published a cookbook, and the full profits from sales went to the water project. Rummage sales, bake sales, etc., all helped this funding.

Retreat Day to Be Facilitated by Father Ron Pecci, OFM

he St. Margaret of Cortona's Regional Retreat at the Priestfield Pastoral Center in will be facilitated by Father Ron Pecci, OFM.

Fr. Pecci, the second of six children, was born in Brooklyn, N.Y. and raised there and in Cresskill, N.J. He completed undergraduate studies at St. Bonaventure University in biology, and did graduate work in biology at William Paterson University and the University of Southern California. He entered the Holy Name Province of the Order of Friars Minor in 1977 and made his profession in 1979. He pursued theological studies at the Washington Theological Union and was ordained to the priesthood in 1983.

His first assignment was as parochial vicar at St. Joseph Church, West Milford, N.J. and was then named Vocation Director for Holy Name Province. He was subsequently named pastor of SS. Rita and Patrick parish in Buffalo, N.Y., where he worked extensively with youth and young

adults and helped create low income housing in the parish.

He was next assigned as pastor of St. Anne parish in Fair Lawn, N.J., where, among other things, he supervised a \$2 million capital campaign for parish repairs and improvements.

Fr. Ron returned to St. Bonaventure University for a sabbatical and studied at the Franciscan Institute, after which he was named Director of Postulants for Holy Name Province. Since 2008 he has been director of Novices for Holy Name Province. In his work as a formation director, he has worked to collaborate in the formation process with other branches of the Franciscan family, helping develop and arrange inter-Franciscan retreats and workshops.

Fr. Ron has served on numerous provincial committees and local boards in the communities in which he has lived.

Day of Reflection May 30, 2009 Profession and Sense of Belonging in the SFO Fr. Richard Trezza

he Maryland, Pennsylvania and Delaware Area Ministers sponsored a Day of Reflection at St. Clement's Church in Rosedale, Md., co-coordinated by Mary Simmons, sfo, Regional Councilor, and Mary Thuman, sfo, Regional Minister. The guest speaker was Fr. Richard Trezza, OFM, who spoke on Profession and the Sense of Belonging in the Secular Franciscan Order, Themes from the General Chapter, Hungary, 2008.

Approximately 80 people participated in the day. Fraternities represented were Padre Pio, Little Flower, St. Conrad Annapolis, Mary Our Queen, St. Joseph Cupertino, St. Casimir, St. Thomas More Harrisburg, Mount St. Sepulcher, Holy Family, St. Mary of the Angels and St. Michaels. Special guests were Jaime and Sonia Bernardo and Anne Mulqueen, sfo, International Councilor, who introduced Fr. Trezza.

Fr. Trezza based his talk on the outline given by Fr. Felice Cangiolosi, OFM Cap., at the General Chapter of the SFO in Hungary, 2009, on the theme of Transformation.

During the first session, the importance of profession and its power to transform the individual were discussed by Fr. Trezza. Profession take one out of Chronos (our time) and allows us to enter Kairos (God's time).

He stressed the care with which the fraternity, the council and the individual must prepare for profession.

In the second session, Fr. Trezza spoke of the search for holiness in profession. Profession becomes Pentecost...

Transformation... Sanctification. When the Profession is commingled with the Eucharist, the candidate prays to draw closer to the Lord in intimacy. This prayer can take on different forms:

A Cross Death Sickness

I want to be so close to you intimately; so that whatever is dealt to me in life, I will deal with it differently than someone else in life. There is always a DYING/SUFFERING and

DYING/RISING. I will to stay intimately close with You so that I can enter the other "Way" with you.

Bread and wine signify us. We are the drops of wine. We shall become "Body and Blood of Our Lord." It is offered up, sacrificed and eaten. What is happening? Offer your-

self as an oblation on the altar. You will recognize yourself on the altar. The Priest witnesses this self-giving. God the Father made you to be yourself, and to "Become One with Him," to be "Owned by God."

The priest confirms this at the altar. Candidates make themselves entirely available to God. They hand themselves over entirely. As the storms of life arise, the Secular Franciscan handles each trial as coming from the hand of God and as a Member of the Order of Penitents.

How can we live a life of penance if we cannot sacrifice something? God wants hearts willing to serve God. It is a lifelong task....professed for life. The Brothers and Sisters are asked to offer themselves consistently to God in all circumstances of life—this is the supreme proof of Fidelity to Christ.

Hope is to wait expectantly for what we know is TRUE to happen.

Consecration-to dedicate or reserve something. To destine a person for God, set aside for His exclusive services only.

The professed person becomes "God's Property." Professed is "transformed from within."

The SFO is a True and Proper Profession. It is valid and true.

- 1. Obligation before God. God asks and we do it.
- 2. "Rule"
- 3. Incorporation in Order.

Secular profession is not inferior to religious profession. We are equal.

When professing, one is promising to live the Gospel by following example of St. Francis.

Secularity – Living in the World, For the World, Born a Secular.

He is now turning to public health issues — a health clinic, clean water project, and solar panels for the schools and church. He has written a book on his experiences in Haiti called *The Lambi's Call*, the proceeds of which go to the OLPH Haiti Project. He will come to speak about his project to groups, and he seeks funds for ongoing projects there. 

What Are We Reading?


Franciscan Prayer by Ilia Delia, OSF (St. Anthony Messenger Press, Cincinnati, Ohio, 198 pp.)

Have you wondered how Franciscan prayer differs from, say, Carmelite prayer or Benedictine prayer? Have you ever tried to explain it to an inquirer or a candidate? We know that the Franciscan charism is unique (as are all the charisms), but how does that affect the way Franciscans pray?

In a book drawing on the thoughts of Francis, Clare and Bonaventure, Sister Delia explains Franciscan attitudes, expectations of, and approaches to prayer.

Excerpt:

How do we begin this descent into our humanity, this journey to freedom and the fullness of life in God? It requires first of all solitude of place and solitude of heart. Solitude is not the same as loneliness. Whereas silence is the deafening silence of being alone, isolated and enclosed, solitude is being alone



with God. . . . Francis was a person of solitude."

Thoughts on the Occasion of Surgery

The Holy Spirit prompted me to write some of my thoughts concerning my recent surgery. It is the spiritual aspects of the experience I want to share. I'm sure many of you have dealt with more serious medical challenges. However, months before the surgery, I began dwelling on all the negative possibilities: four to six hours of surgery, possible blood transfusion, being on painkillers up to a week, etc. None of these was a reality. The surgery was a success in four hours, I didn't need a transfusion, and I only took one pain medication when I got home.

As the surgery date began to creep closer, I told Jesus how much I trusted him, but I knew I really had to believe that myself. Also, I pray daily to Padre Pio and St. Anthony. I invited both of them into the operating room. Most importantly, I reached out to my Franciscan family for prayers, and you came through with flying colors. I was at peace.

I told my daughter that becoming a Franciscan was the best thing I ever did. While our community is widespread, our spiritual link is the force that underscores our ties as a family. I rarely see others outside my fraternity, except at regional functions. But the glue is there. I would like to stress how important it is for our spiritual growth to participate in regional functions. By meeting other members of our family, we all grow stronger. We are part of something greater than our fraternities.

It is from the depths of my heart that I extend to you my gratitude for your prayers. And it is to Jesus Christ, Our Lord and Savior, that I give the glory for my many blessings. Let us remember that as followers of Francis, our goal is to emulate Christ through our love of each other, and for all of God's creation.
