"Thanksgiving" Reflections From our Vice Minister

November is the month when we smell crisp autumn air and feast our eyes on spectacular leaves as they turn colors so brilliant that we can only marvel at God's grandeur. We turn our hearts heavenward as we thank God for creating such beauty. The days follow, and soon we find ourselves getting ready for Thanksgiving. In this month, it seems fitting to meditate on what our Rule says to us about giving thanks, especially for the Eucharist.

How do we instill in our SFO brothers and sisters a desire to become passionate about the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist? What in our Rule tells us to be ever mindful of our Lord's presence, and how do we respond?

Articles 5 and 8 speak to us about Eucharist, which in Greek, translates to mean *thanksgiving*. Article 5 says, "The faith of St. Francis, who often said, 'I see nothing bodily of the Most High Son of God in this world except his most holy body and blood,' should be the inspiration and pattern of their Eucharistic life," and Article 8 exhorts us to participate in the sacramental life of the Church, most especially the Eucharist.

In our Rule, we see how God turns to us and shares His love with us. In the Eucharist, we experience our most intimate moments with Jesus, the Living God. It is the supreme act of humility for God to wish to be with us and become like us in Jesus. St. Bonaventure says that we turn to God, not because we are sinners, but in awe and adoration, through the example of Jesus.

Remember, our own Franciscan vocations are gifts from God. We didn't initiate them – God did! How fortunate and blessed we are to have heard and answered God's call. Let us thank and praise Jesus for our vocations, especially this month of November. Thanksgiving is upon us. Let us also be ever mindful of our greatest gift of all – the Eucharist – the most holy Body and Blood of our Lord, Jesus. Let us ponder the awesome mystery of the Eucharist – the Real Presence. We have much to thank Jesus for – most especially for his most Precious Body and Blood.

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Franciscan Archbishop Charles Chaput of Denver speaks in Harrisburg

The day before the feast of St. Francis of Assisi, at the Red Mass celebrated for the Harrisburg (PA) diocese to invoke the power of the Holy Spirit on judges, lawyers and lawmakers, guest homilist Archbishop Charles Chaput of Denver spoke of Francis' renewal of the church in terms of the Seraphic Father's frequent admonition to his brothers, "Up to now, we have done nothing; let us begin!"

Archbishop Chaput, a Capuchin friar, noted that during Francis' time, the church hierarchy was inclined to gloss over the Gospel, interpreting it in such a way as to make it easy to follow. Francis, however, insisted on *sine glossa*, without gloss, without watering down the example of Jesus. Archbishop Chaput said that the church is always reforming itself and always in need of reform. He called Francis the most single-minded, faithful, zealous, and humble reformer in church history and instructed the congregation that these are the marks of renewal in any age.

The archbishop firmly declared that defending the sanctity of human life and political correctness cannot go together. He stressed that the world needs holiness more than anything. Renewal will follow.

A poignant note was an opening intercessory prayer read by Bishop Kevin Rhoades, asking God's blessing on the Amish community, who had this same week suffered the horrific loss of daughters in a one-room school shooting.

Archbishop Chaput noted that he had been in Denver during the Columbine shootings and had traveled to Harrisburg only to experience and share that region's sorrow. Both incidents, he said, are invitations for the faithful to turn to God, asking Him to do something, asking Him what we can do. He noted that the world is unjust, evil is strong and our

St. Elizabeth of Hungary Celebration

The Minister General of the SFO, Encarnación del Pozo, has announced that we will begin a two year celebration of the life of the Patroness of the SFO, St. Elizabeth of Hungary from November 17, 2006 - November 17, 2008. Her feast day is November 17. She died at the age of 24. In her short life, St. Elizabeth manifested such a great love for the poor and suffering that she has become the patroness of both the Catholic Charities and the Secular Franciscans. At the age of 14, she married Louis of Thuringia and became the mother of three children. After her husband's death in the Crusades just 6 years later, she was grief stricken. Under the direction of a Franciscan friar, she became a devoted advocate of the poor, providing bread to whomever came to her door. At the age of 21 she became a Secular Franciscan and worked hard to establish a hospital in honor of St. Francis. She died in 1231 and was canonized four years later. τ

Novena for Darfur A Message from our Regional Minister

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This is an extremely important message concerning the genocide ongoing in Darfur.

At our NAFRA meeting last week, there was great concern for the people in Darfur, Africa and what we <u>can</u> and what <u>we should</u> be doing to help. Clare McCluggage, our newly elected National Councilor has sent us a suggestion for Secular Franciscans in the U.S. Not only are we sending \$1,000.00 to CRS to be used for Darfur, but Clare has created a Year-Long Novena to be prayed for that impoverished country.

She divided the upcoming year, 2007, assigning 2 months for each Region to pray together. St. Margaret of Cortona has been assigned the 2nd week of the months of January & July. As you read her timetable, all the regions of NAFRA are involved.

This is a very powerful way for us to do something. There are many possible ways to implement this within individual fraternities, and that will be up to each fraternity, so please plan to discuss this at your next few council meetings, as January will soon be here.

"As agreed at the recent NAFRA meeting, the SFO in the United States would like to institute a "perpetual" novena for at least one year on behalf of the people of Darfur. Every day for the next year, members of the SFO will be praying the novena prayer. For this to happen, I am proposing that 5 Regional fraternities be assigned to cover each month. To make sure we cover the entire month, there will be four to five "waves" of the novena, each starting on Sunday. People are assigned to these waves by Region again, as noted below. For example, the first Sunday of December, members of St. Elizabeth of Hungary Region will begin praying the novena; the second Sunday of the month Lady Poverty will begin the novena. In this way the people of Darfur will be held in prayer by the SFO for the entire year.

In the event there are only 4 Sundays in the month, the fifth Region can pray week 1, or choose another week. Individuals may start and end their novena on other days if necessary, or do a different week. If you want to continue to pray before or after your week/month you can certainly do that! You are also encouraged to share the novena with people in your parish, youth groups, or other organizations to which you belong.

A novena allows us to hold a particular concern before God in a special way. The name "novena" comes from the Latin for "nine". Traditionally we pray a novena every day for nine days, and the prayer is usually a bit longer than a brief intercession. This allows us to give more of ourselves to our prayer for the concern we are bringing before God. "

We pray this in the Name of Jesus, our Lord, through the intercession of the sorrowful and Immaculate Heart of Mary.

Memorare: Remember, O Most Gracious Virgin Mary, that never was it known, that anyone who fled to thy protection, implored thy help or sought thy intercession was left unaided.
