Regional Minister's Message



Peace and all Good!

I am humbled and overwhelmed to be your new regional minister! My deepest gratitude goes to my predecessor, Mary Thuman, for her wisdom and leadership over the past three years. The region has truly benefited from your service, Mary.

On April 21 at the Shrine of St. Anthony of Padua, our

region held a day of recollection for our inquirers, candidates, and newly professed members. For those of us who have already made a permanent profession to the Rule, this event provided an opportunity to renew our commitment, and to remember the excitement and challenges as we walked our own paths to profession.

The Day of Recollection reminded me that formation never ends. We do not simply complete our initial formation and then profess the Rule. We are called - daily as our father Francis tells us - to conversion. We are responsible for continual refreshment and growth through ongoing formation.

Ongoing formation takes many forms. Most regularly, our individual fraternities conduct ongoing formation for all the brothers and sisters. Typically, this is the task of the fraternity's formation director. However, in fact, all members are responsible for assisting in this process, through preparation, reading, and participation in discussions.

On the regional level, ongoing formation takes place through gatherings such as the annual retreat, the triennial Chapter of Mats, and other such opportunities for the sisters and brothers of St. Margaret of Cortona to gather as fraternity.

Even on the national level, there are opportunities for ongoing formation. The Quinquennial in July is a wonderful opportunity to join together as a national Franciscan movement, to pray together, and to grow in the spirit of Francis and Clare.

One way everyone can participate on a daily basis is through our blessed Rule. This great gift from the Holy Father Pope Paul VI was approved 34 years ago next month. Its predecessors date back nearly 800 years. When the current Rule was passed down to all the brothers and sisters, our Minister General, Manuela Mattioli, OFS, begged "all the brothers and sisters to cherish it, to know it well, but above all to live it daily so they will be able 'to die with it."

We have made a PERMANENT profession to the Rule. We are obligated to know it well and live it daily. I keep a copy of the Rule by my bedside. Every night, before turning out the light, I read one rule, the one which corresponds to the day of the month. I am writing this column on May 6, so this evening I will once again read Rule 6. I have read it many, many times over the years. Sometimes, I read it quickly, just to get it out of the way. Sometimes, it speaks to me in a new way, with a new meaning I've never realized before. But if I am truly to know it well and live it daily, if I am to die with it, then I must read it every day.

The weekend had attendees from all levels of the OFS on the

weekend staff: fraternal, regional, national and international, a rare and special occurence.

Twenty-seven of the 30 fraternities of the region had the participation of at least one member of their formation team, if not their formation director. According to the directive of the National Formation Commission, once a region does its formation workshop modeled after that of the National Formation workshop and at least one representative of a fraternity attends, that fraternity is entitled to obtain and use the FUN Manual as a resource for initial and on-going formation programs. It is suggested that the person or persons of the fraternity who attended the regional workshop instruct the others on the fraternity's formation team as to how to use it. This can be an on-going process as the manual is used. Those fraternities who were for any reason not able to at-

tend the regional workshop can purchase a set of DVDs on the presentations of the national workshop at a cost of \$13 plus shipping and handling of \$5.00. The set can be ordered online with a credit card or PayPal.

Once the fraternities view these DVDs and this has been verified by the regional executive council that they have done so, they can order the *FUN Manual* from the NFC. Information on how to order the *FUN Manual* will be provided by the regional council.

The workshop sessions were presented in a variety of ways, from PowerPoint to group discussion to lecture. But regardless of the mode of presentation, all were presented in an inspiring, dynamic and professional way, engaging all who attended the workshop. This was one of many weekends we'll never forget.



Third Annual Day of Reflection for Inquirers and Candidates

he St. Margaret of Cortona Region held its third annual day of reflection for inquirers and candidates on April 21, 2012, at St. Anthony's Shrine in Ellicott City, Md. Mary Lou Coffman was the facilitator for the event. Fr. Charley Miller, OFM, spiritual assistant to St. Francis Fraternity of Triangle, Virginia, gave an opening talk on discernment and vocation to the 46 participants.

The rest of the program included breakout discussions, interactive sessions and a Trust Walk. The activities of the day had participants moving about. Attendees were encouraged to interact with each other in ways that promoted real faith enrichment, which may not necessarily be experienced when sitting the whole time or listening to a presenter give a talk for the duration. The breakout groups used various areas of the Shrine including outside in the gardens, as it was so nice and warm that day.

Many of the participants said they enjoyed the day, especially the Trust Walk. This activity was done in the afternoon and was designed to illustrate the our need as Franciscans to trust

one another if we are to help each other to demonstrate the gospel life and to do it effectively as a community of believers. Once we are willing to let go and allow each other to lead us and to

lead others, then why should we hesitate when it comes to allowing God to lead us. Letting go for Him is the safest risk we can really take.

As Mary Lou put it: "The day was built around the questions:"How did we get here? Where are we going?" The purpose of the morning session was twofold: To help us to get to know our fellow Franciscan and to help us focus on our journey to this point. The afternoon exercise built off the idea that in our profession we make ourselves totally available to God. The Trust Walk is an illustration on how it feels to be dependent on others and how we come to trust in our dependency and thus how it feels to be totally dependent on God. From that we look at how we might experience things differently when we acknowledge our dependence. The other part of the exercise is to look at how carefully we, in our human, imperfect way, are when we're entrusted with the safety and well being of another—and how much more God cares for us in His total and perfect ability.

The tentative date for the fourth annual Day of Recollection is April 6, 2013 (Easter is March 31, 2013).



National JPIC Rally

n April 12-15, I was fortunate enough to attend the JPIC (Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation) rally at Our Lady of the Snows shrine, in Belleville, Ill. Representatives from most areas of the country attended. Being around other Franciscans is such a joy.

The purpose of the rally (the first since JPIC was established for the Seculars) was to define our goals, hear what others are doing, and learn to be good communicators in a one-on-one basis. Kent Ferris, the current head of JPIC was one of the facilitators. The two others were Lonnie Ellis, a candidate in the St. Anthony of Nagasaki Fraternity, and Christine Elliott, both from the Franciscan Action Network (FAN).

Article 15 of the Secular Franciscan Rule was our motivation. Building relationships with each other was stressed many times. A major goal is to foster an atmosphere of fraternity that shapes our lives. Kent spoke about guidelines, the power of the Secular Rule and the effect of the gospel on society and our every day experiences. The Guidelines on Faithful Citizenship from the U.S. bishops are a basis for what we act upon.

Lonnie spoke about immigration as a prime issue for FAN.

Father Pio Jackson, ofm, Spiritual Assistant for the St. Clare Region, St. Louis, Mo., spoke and presided at Mass.

A JPIC representative from Milwaukee spoke about the people who support their work, with a focus on peace and

justice. Also, spirituality, community and simplicity are emphasized.

Kent said it is time for JPIC to reach down to the fraternities. There needs to be means to develop community and fraternity, as well as to connect to other groups.



What Are We Reading (or Watching)?



CATHOLICISM: A Journey to the Heart of the Faith

By Fr. Robert Barron Word On Fire Catholic Ministries 10-disc DVD set / \$149.95 / www.wordonfire.com Hardcover edition from Amazon.com/ \$17.98

At a time when it appears that the Catholic Church is under siege in many quarters of the public square, and where many of our brothers and sisters have left the Catholic Church for a variety of personal reasons, it is refreshing to see a concise, visually appealing, and beautifully written and presented summary treatment of the Catholic faith. That is what Fr. Barron's Catholicism series is.

When the ten one-hour segments were aired unexpurgated on PBS and other cable stations last fall, many of us were surprised that the secular media would have given such objective treatment to a series that is avowedly and unapologetically pro-Catholic. In fact, it is a veritable survey of western civilization through the prism of Christianity. And it is a treatment of Christianity meant to address the prevalent skepticism of the 21st century.

For those who missed these broadcasts, or who would like to see them again, I heartily recommend the 10-DVD set, and/or the book version. Fr. Barron has also issued a study guide for the benefit of those groups using the series as part of a catechetical program. This would be ideal for young people, or for adults whose catechesis has come up a bit short. Watching the DVDs or reading the book would be a very worthwhile Lenten exercise for the entire family, and it would spark a lot of useful discussion about our faith.

Father Robert Barron — an author, speaker, and theologian — is the Francis Cardinal George Professor of Faith and Culture at Mundelein Seminary and the founder of Word On Fire (www.WordOnFire.org). For the Catholicism series, Fr. Barron gained access to many of the most holy and famous shrines in the Catholic world: the Vatican, St. Paul's Outside the Walls, and St. John Lateran in Rome; the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem; the Basilica at Lourdes, France; the Shrine of the Virgin of Guadalupe in Mexico;

and many others. The series stresses both the universality and the cultural diversity of the Catholic Church, with scenes from locations as varied as Ireland; Kolkata, India; New York City; Uganda; and the Philippines.

Each of the ten episodes is themed to illuminate some key element of the Catholic faith. The series begins with an exploration of Jesus' life and ministry in the Holy Land, how he fulfilled the four tasks of the Messiah, according to the Old and New Testaments, and how the living legacy of Christ, God and Messiah, is proclaimed by the Church. Then follows an explanation of the thrust of the Gospel, highlighting the Beatitudes, the path of non-violence and lessons of forgiveness, care for the poor and our relationship with God as presented in the parables. Fr. Barron addresses the questions of the existence and nature of God, and the problem of evil.

Fr. Barron forthrightly presents the importance of Mary, as a "new Israel," and the first and model disciple. His visually rich visits to the major Marian shrines, as well as France's Chartres Cathedral, illustrate Mary's role in the Church. The series treats many of the "greats" of the Catholic Church, including Sts. Peter and Paul, recent saints (Katherine Drexel, Thérèse de Lisieux and Mother Teresa of Calcutta), as well as Thomas Merton, Teresa of Avila and John of the Cross.

Father Barron gives a full explanation of the Sacred Liturgy, including a description of all parts of the Mass, which Catholics consider "the source and summit" of their identity and mission. The final session discusses the Catholic view of "the end times" – death, judgment, heaven, hell and purgatory. Fr. Barron shows how this vision is supported by the mystery and truth of the Resurrection of Jesus.

In short, this series is a concise summation of the Catholic faith, and it serves as a modern reference work on important aspects of the Church's doctrine and practice. It is recommended to Catholics and non-Catholics alike. Fr. Barron is sometimes compared to Bishop Fulton J. Sheen for his beautifully-phrased description of and arguments for the Catholic faith.






