# Nominations for Regional Council

n April 21, 2018, the St. Margaret of Cortona Region will elect new officers. We need each fraternity to submit nominees for the offices of Minister, Vice-minister, Secretary, Treasurer, Formation Director, Area Councilor MD/PA, Area Councilor Metro D.C., Area Councilor VA/WVA and Area Councilor MD/DE. When submitting a name, give the fraternity name and the office for which the person has agreed to run. Those nominated for office must consent to the nomination. Those nominated will be asked to submit a short biography, which is to include SFO experience, as well as other pertinent experience.

### From the General Constitutions of the Secular Franciscan Order: THE OFFICES IN THE FRATERNITY Article 51

1. While firmly upholding the co-responsibility of the council to animate and guide the fraternity, the minister, as the primary person responsible for the fraternity, is expected to make sure that the directions and the decisions of the council are put into practice and will keep the council informed about what he or she is doing.

- 2. The minister also has the following duties:
- a. to call, to preside at, and to direct the meetings of the fraternity and council; to convoke every three years the elective chapter of the fraternity, having heard the council on the formalities of the convocation;
- b. to prepare the annual report to be sent to the council of the higher level after it has been approved by the council of the fraternity;
- c. to represent the fraternity in all its relations with ecclesiastical and civil authorities. When the fraternity acquires a juridical personality in the civil order, the minister becomes, when possible, its legal representative;
- d. to request, with the consent of the council, the pastoral and fraternal visits, at least once every three years.

e. to put into effect those acts which the Constitutions refer to his or her competence.

### Article 52

- 1. The vice-minister has the following duties:
- a. to collaborate in a fraternal spirit and to support the minister in carrying out his or her specific duties;
- b. to exercise the functions entrusted by the council and/or by the assembly or chapter;
- c. to take the place of the minister in both duties and responsibilities in case of absence or temporary impediment;
- d. to assume the functions of the minister when the office remains vacant.
- 2. The secretary has the following duties:
- a. to compile the official acts of the fraternity and of the council and to assure that they are sent to their respective proper recipients;
- b. to see to the updating and preservation of the records and the registers, noting admissions, professions, deaths, withdrawals, and transfers from the fraternity;
- c. to provide for the communication of the more important facts to the various levels and, if appropriate, to provide for their dissemination through the mass media.


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# Regional Minister's Message



### 2018: A Year of Important Events

Brothers and Sisters, when each of us made our permanent profession to our Rule, we entered into a lifelong commitment to observe the gospel by following our Holy Father Francis. In 2018, we will commemorate the 40th anniversary, when, on June 24, 1978, Blessed Pope Paul VI approved a Rule that had been 10 years in the making. In his Decree of Promulgation, the Holy Father thanked the Fathers General of the First and Third Order Regular, and said that our new Rule, "...was necessary because of the changed condition of the times and because of the teaching and encouragement given them by the Second Vatican Council.... In this way, we nurture the hope that the form of life preached by that admirable man of Assisi will gain a new impetus and will flourish vigorously." Each and every fraternity should commemorate this occasion, and use it in the words of the Fathers General - to return "to the origins and to the spiritual experience of Francis of Assisi and of the brothers and sisters of penance who received from him their inspiration and

# Formation Director's Message

Dear Brothers and Sisters! Peace of Christ!

In October, we held our Second Annual Formation Director's Workshop at Loyola. Twenty-seven people attended, including formation directors and several fraternity ministers. The weather was beautiful, and we closed with a celebration of the Holy Mass on Sunday with Fr. Kevin Treston, OFM, one of our Regional Spiritual Assistants, presiding.

The theme of the workshop was "Communicating Christ to Others in the Spirits of St. Francis & Clare." The main topic discussed was On-going Formation. At the workshop, a thumb drive and manual were given to each fraternity attendee. There were four presentations, along with time for discussions, which also included additional phases of formation. I would like now to extend my thanks to the following who helped make the workshop a success: Michael Huether, Jeanie McLees, Denise and Jerry Miante, and Gary Burton. They all contributed their expertise with a variety of tasks, as well as inspiring talks! I would also like to thank the Good Lord, as well as all those who brought snacks, or helped in any way.

The October 2017 manual's outline was built around the answers I received from the questionnaire I sent out in May to all the fraternities. Thank you to those formation directors who took the time to reply. Your feedback was very useful in creating the manual and in teaching others better communication skills. In reviewing the answers, I was also able to learn new methods of technology to reach out better to members in all phases of formation. This includes those who are infirm or who can no longer attend the meetings.

The table of contents of the workshop manual includes some of the following topics: *Prayer Before the Crucifix and for Vocations, Duties of the Master of Formation, Tools Used for Formation, Topics and Methods for On-going Formation, PowerPoint Presentations, Website Video Links, A Guiding Principle of the Franciscan Order, Ideas that Work Well, The Four Pillars of Formation, and many more!* 

Brothers and Sisters, as Franciscans and formation directors, we have a duty to set the proper example for every member of the Order! But our work does not stop there. Outside of the Order and within our own communities, we are called to be holy examples of Christ and St. Francis. This is our task: to live out peaceful lives, full of hope and joy in our Risen Savior.

I would like to quote our own late beloved Deacon Tom Bello from his book, *For All the Saints: St. Francis' Five Point Plan for Salvation*. In it, he speaks of the four basic Cs of the Franciscan Charism. The first C is the Crib. Deacon Bello points out that the Franciscan Charism with the Crib is our firm foundational faith in the Incarnation; namely that the Word was made flesh. The second C is the Cross. Jesus' love for us, he writes, carried Him all the way to the cross to die for our salvation. The third C is the Cup. Deacon Bello explains that the Cup of the Eucharist, the Holy Blood and Body of Christ, keeps us close to the Christ of the Crib and the Christ of the Cross. And lastly, the fourth C is for Creation. Here, he affirms that the love of St. Francis for all of God's creation is a love of God in all Creation.

As we approach the Advent Season in preparation for Christ's birth into the world, I would like to leave you with this thought, taken from the Franciscan Media Website: <u>https://www.franciscanmedia.org/saint-francis-and-the-crib/</u>. It speaks about the origin of the first crèche and says:

The home crib became popular in Catholic Europe after 1600, owing, it is said, to the efforts of the Capuchins.

Francis would smile at our nice varnished cribs, though he would bless any home that has one. Probably he would prefer those set up outdoors with live animals. And if he were to stand by one and preach today, he might say something like this:

Look deeper than this pleasant scene. See your God become your food for eternity in a feeding place for animals. See the simple bands wound around the helpless baby, not the embroidered dress. See a man and woman wearing the clothes of the poor. See and smell the animals. Feel the cold and dirt of the cave, lighted only by a little fire. And adore your God, who took a human heart that could know the greatest love and the sharpest pain, arms that could embrace the sinners, the neurotics, the lepers, and hands that could touch cheeks running with tears, and be pierced with nails. Adore your poor and humble God.

Brothers and Sisters, I would like to leave you with this thought for meditation during this Advent and Christmas Season: Do not forget the Christ Child, who has redeemed you and given birth to your hearts, so that you may live in utmost poverty on earth, in order that you may enjoy the extreme riches of eternal glory.

As always, I hold you within my heart in prayer. Please do the same for me!

# Letter Written by Fra Giovanni

I am your friend and my love for you goes deep. There is nothing I can give you which you have not got, but there is much, very much, that, while I cannot give it, you can take.

No heaven can come to us unless our hearts find rest in today. Take heaven!

No peace lies in the future which is not hidden in this present little instant. Take peace!

The gloom of the world is but a shadow. Behind it, yet within our reach is joy. There is radiance and glory in the darkness could we but see - and to see we have only to look. I beseech you to look!

Life is so generous a giver, but we, judging its gifts by the covering, cast them away as ugly, or heavy or hard. Remove the covering and you will find beneath it a living splendor, woven of love, by wisdom, with power.

Welcome it, grasp it, touch the angel's hand that brings it to you. Everything we call a trial, a sorrow, or a duty, believe me, that angel's hand is there, the gift is there, and the wonder of an overshadowing presence. Our joys, too, be not content with them as joys. They, too, conceal divine gifts.

Life is so full of meaning and purpose, so full of beauty - beneath its covering - that you will find earth but cloaks your heaven.

Courage, then, to claim it, that is all. But courage you have, and the knowledge that we are all pilgrims together, wending through unknown country, home.

And so, at this time, I greet you. Not quite as the world sends greetings, but with profound esteem and with the prayer that for you now and forever, the day breaks, and the shadows flee away.

Giovanni Giocondo was born in Verona around 1433. He joined the Dominican Order at the age of eighteen and was one of the many of that Order who promulgated the Renaissance. Afterwards, however, he left the Dominicans and entered the Franciscan Order. Giocondo began his career as a teacher of Latin and Greek in Verona, where Julius Caesar Scaliger was one of his pupils.

As a young priest, Friar Giovanni was a learned archaeologist and a superb draughtsman. He visited Rome, sketched its ancient buildings, wrote the story of its great monuments, and recorded, deciphered and explained many defaced inscriptions. He stimulated the revival of classical learning by making transcriptions of ancient manuscripts, one of which, completed in 1492, he presented to Lorenzo de' Medici.

Giocondo soon returned to his native town where he built bridges and planned fortifications for Treviso, acting as architect engineer, and head-builder during the construction.

#### FALL SAINTS, FALL SOULS

Editor's note: In late summer, Rose Urankar, a 2015 grad of Notre Dame, joined the ranks of Franciscan Mission Service D.C. Service Corps volunteers. Though they come with diverse interests and backgrounds, all volunteers are young adults who commit to a year of service, spiritual growth, and simple living in community. In this reflection, we read Rose's spiritual musings on the transition from fall to winter during a session on Laudato Si' led by Lonnie Ellis, OFS. But as I walked among the colorful garden, I began to feel a winter chill. My fingertips froze, and I hugged my jacket a little tighter. After fall comes winter, death, and these pretty falling leaves just lead to wintry woes. For a moment I was sad at the impending doom of cold to come.

Then my gaze lifted and I saw, again, the triumphant trees. With this visual shift in perspective came a mental one as well. Instead of bemoaning the end of the year, I should be celebrating it like nature—taking joy

If there is ever a time to walk around in nature and be astounded by the creativity of God, it's during the fall. Sure, most flowers are still in bloom, but the leaves steal the show. Each one radiates a unique warm hue, as if the summer sun spent its final days painting them with golden rays.

Earlier this week, some members of the Casa Community were invited to go on a nature walk through the gardens

of the nearby Franciscan monastery. Our guide told us to contemplate nature, keeping in mind Pope Francis's words from *Laudato Si*': "The universe unfolds in God, who fills it completely. Hence, there is mystical meaning to be found in a leaf, in a mountain trail, in a dewdrop, in a poor person's face."

It wasn't difficult to find the fullness of God in nature that day, as mid-October presented us with the fullness of fall. Every leaf was a masterpiece in its own right: blushing reds, drunk on cabernet; fiercely speckled orangey yellows that could have camouflaged jaguars; bossy greens, boasting their hold on the classic mossy hue.



in the details of each leaf, their splendor multiplied by their community. The leaves are only able to be beautiful because they will fall and die. Their beauty is revealed through their variety, through their communion, and through their end.

I find myself pondering the same thing during this time of celebrating the feasts of All Saints and All Souls that marks the be-

ginning of the Church's full month of remembrance for those who have died. Rather than feeling blue at their loss, we notice the radiant beauty each one bore before passing away. We see the variation of each call to holiness: Joan of Arc's bold red battles; Augustine's spotty early years and fierce conversion; Francis's pure green oneness with all of creation. No saint could capture all it meant to be holy because their lives were short and their callings distinct. Rather, each saint—including the ones we encounter every day—is a single stroke in the communion of saints, coming together to form a much grander tapestry that proclaims God's vibrant grace.

#### MARIE DENNIS, OSF, SPEAKS AT THEOLOGY ON TAP

On Monday evening, October 23, 2017, the friars of St. Francis of Assisi Parish in Triangle, Va., hosted an event in their ongoing series of Theology on Tap at the Ornery Brew Pub in Woodbridge, Va. The speaker for the evening was Marie Dennis,



OFS, co-president of Pax Christi International, who addressed members of the parish, parish council, and others in attendance. Marie explained that Pax Christi is a Catholic sponsored organization that is international in scope, with more than 100 member organizations. Created after World War II to assist with reconciliation and reconstruction, Pax Christi is comprised of lay brothers and sisters, women religious, and clergy who work to promote non-violence, peace and justice, and reconciliation between groups throughout the world.

Marie helped the assembled group understand the difference between non-violence and pacifism, spoke about some of the

- c. to provide for the communication of the more important facts to the various levels and, if appropriate, to provide for their dissemination through the mass media.
- 3. The master of formation has the following duties:
- a. to co-ordinate, with the help of the other members of the council, the formative activities of the fraternity;
- b. to instruct and enliven the inquirers during the time of initiation, the candidates during the period of initiation formation, and the newly professed;
- c. to inform the council of the fraternity prior to profession, concerning the suitability of the candidate for a commitment to live according to the Rule.
- 4. The treasurer, or bursar, has the following duties:

prominent figures who promoted non-violence (Ghandi and Martin Luther King), and the Scriptural basis for all non-violence demonstrated through the life and deeds of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. She also spoke of the successes of the organization, along with some of the ongoing efforts concerning non-violence. One of those is a discussion with the Vatican, coupled with a position paper and a proposed conference to adjust the criteria for application of the Just War theory. Subsequent to her talk there was a question and answer session, followed by prayer to close the event.

- b. to record in the same register the items of expense, specifying the date and the purpose, in conformity with the directions of the fraternity council;
- c. to render an account of his or her administration to the assembly and to the council of the fraternity according to the norms of the national statutes.

Additionally, the council has four regional area council members, representing the minister at fraternal visitations and local elections. The four areas are: the Virginia area, the Maryland/Pennsylvania area, the Maryland/ Delaware area, and the metro D.C. area.
