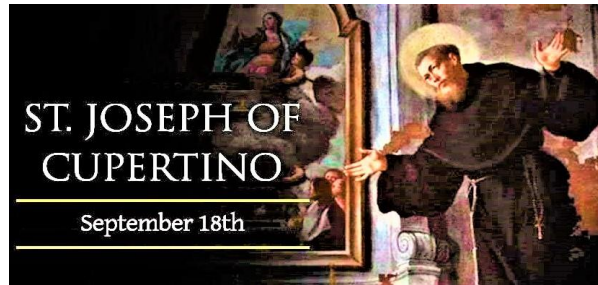

VI. WEAK RESPONSES

Paragraph 54. "It is remarkable how weak international political responses have been. The failure of global summits on the environment make it plain that our politics are subject to technology and finance. There are too many special interests, and economic interests easily end up trumping the common good and manipulating information so that their own plans will not be affected. The *Aparecida Document* urges that "the interests of economic groups which irrationally demolish sources of life should not prevail in dealing with natural resources".^[32] The alliance between the economy and technology ends up sidelining anything unrelated to its immediate interests. Consequently, the most one can expect is superficial rhetoric, sporadic acts of philanthropy and perfunctory expressions of concern for the environment, whereas any genuine attempt by groups within society to introduce change is viewed as a nuisance based on romantic illusions or an obstacle to be circumvented."

There we affirm the common vocation of all men and women to be brothers and sisters as children of God, we reject every form of violence – especially that committed in the name of religion – and we dedicate ourselves to defending authentic values and peace in the world. Let us pray that the seeds sown during the visit may bear much fruit according to his holy will.

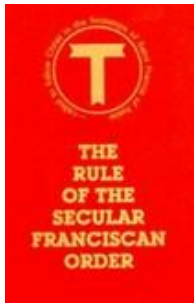

Course Description: Henri Nouwen is among the most influential spiritual writers in the past 50 years. His nearly 40 books have sold more than 7 million copies in over 30 languages. A Catholic priest, Henri presented spiritual realities in a nondenominational way that defined spirituality for the modern era. He made the spiritual life widely accessible to people of diverse religious backgrounds or no religious affiliation. Of interest to Franciscans, Henri wrote that his favorite saint was St. Francis of Assisi. His core insight that, like Jesus, we are the beloved sons and daughters of God, permeates his writing. Henri's particular gift was his rare ability to simply, yet profoundly, share his own spiritual struggles in a way that helps others to live a spiritual life and grow in relationship with Jesus. Guided by Henri, we will explore what it means to be "the beloved" and to explore three disciplines of the spiritual life. The two Nouwen texts for this course are: *Here and Now: Living in The Spirit* and *A Spirituality of Living*.

Seminar Leader: Ray Glennon is a member of Board of the Henri Nouwen Society and candidate in the Secular Franciscan Order. He is an avid student of Henri's work having participated in and facilitated many Nouwen Society book discussions since 2009. A graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy (B.S.) and George Washington University (M.S.A.), he is active in lay ministry and religious education in his Catholic parish and a member of the St. Joseph Cupertino Fraternity.

**The Form of Life
Article 15**

STILL STANDING

A little boy and his mother were attending a church service, and the gregarious child couldn't sit still. The urge to stand up on the seat and look around was simply too much. His mother kept murmuring. "Sweetheart, sit down." He'd sit down for a few seconds and then get back up. She'd gently reprimand him again, "I said to sit down!"

After this happened several times, he stood up and refused to sit down. His mother put her hand on his head and gently but firmly pushed him down onto the seat. The boy sat there, smiling. Finally, he turned to his mother and said, "Mom, I may be sitting down on the outside, but I'm standing up on the inside."

When life's currents change, our real inner strength is called upon. Maybe you're facing a serious setback. You may have received a bad report from your doctor. Perhaps you're living through a broken relationship, a bankruptcy, the loss of a loved one, or some other crisis. Be alert: even when we're sitting down on the outside, we must see ourselves as standing up on the inside, filled with persistence and resilience. We must say to ourselves: "This is not going to defeat me. This is not going to steal my joy."

Jesus urges us to walk forward and experience the next opportunity waiting for us. When the dust settles, we'll still be standing strong, because we hear Jesus calling us to get up, stay up, and take one more step.

TOMATOES



Sweet Tangerine – Early ripening fruits weigh about 6oz. Good for containers. Plant size 40"x18"

Determinate: smaller, bushier plants that set all their fruits within a few weeks and then they are done

QTY: _____



Porterhouse – Beefsteak type weighing 2-4 POUNDS each. Deep red flesh with old fashioned flavor. 40"x18"

Indeterminate: plants continue to produce throughout the growing season, often for many months

QTY: _____



Steak Sandwich – Perfect for sandwiches and salads. Vigorous compact plants produce 10oz fruits from midsummer to early fall. Good for containers 36"x18"

Indeterminate (definition above)

QTY: _____



Supertasty – Weighing between 7-9oz and have a rich, tangy flavor with deep red flesh.

Great for containers with minimal staking required 40"x18"

Semi-determinate

QTY: _____



Sungold – A favorite golden-orange cherry tomato borne in large clusters. Flavor develops early making it great for snacking a week before full maturity at which time it becomes very sweet and delicious.

Tall sprawling plant, needs support

Indeterminate

Cherry Baby – Cascading, dense clusters of ruby-red cherries. Super productive. Good for containers or in the garden 60"x60"

Indeterminate

Big Momma – Plum-shaped **paste** tomato. Meaty and weighing up to 10oz. Skin peels away easily after parboiling. Large plants, 50"x60"

PEPPERS



Jungle Parrot - High yielding plant produces small 2"-3" fruits. Perfect for large patio containers. Sweet and delicious fresh from the vine or as stuffed appetizers. Peppers turn from green to red at maturity.

Plants are 24"x30"

Honey Crisp - Large, 4"x5" golden fruits weigh up to 11oz each. Delicious texture and thick, juicy walls are ideal for slicing and stuffing 36"x30" plants can be grown in patio containers or directly in the garden. Peppers turn from green to yellow at maturity

Orange King – Large blocky 5"x7" peppers with thick walls. A juicy and sweet pepper perfect for fresh eating, dips, salads, stuffing, stir fry and sandwiches. Peppers turn from green to orange at maturity.

Sweet Savour - Compact 18"-24" plants produce an abundance of thin orange, yellow, red and purple sweet peppers. Usable in window boxes or containers. Sweet Savour is perfect for snacking, roasting or pickling

MISCELLANEOUS



Sweet Basil - Use in tomato sauce, pesto and salad, great used fresh or dried for poultry, meats, fish eggs, soups and sauces

Parsley, Italian Flat Leaf - Use in salad dressings, poultry, soups and as an ingredient of pesto. Flavor is much more pronounced than that of the more familiar curled type

Thyme - Gourmet seasoning herb for dressings, sauces and soups

Bush Champion Cucumbers – Great for container or raised beds, produces 8"-12" long cukes. Burpees choice for productivity and flavor. Plant grows less than 2' wide and less than 1' tall making it a perfect choice for containers or when space is limited in the garden.
