

The Information Corner

Apr 23rd – Feastday of Bl. Giles of Assisi⁴



One of the original companions of St. Francis, Blessed Aegidius of Assisi, better known to us Brother Giles, holds the foremost place among the companions of St. Francis.

Of his antecedents and early life nothing certain is known. In April 1209, moved by the example of two

leading fellow Assisians, he begged permission to join the little band, and on the feast of St. George was invested in a poor habit St. Francis had begged for him. He accompanied the saint to Rome when the first Rule was approved orally by Innocent III, and appears to have then received the clerical tonsure.

Giles made many pilgrimages: to the tomb of St. James at Compostella in Spain, the Holy Places of Jerusalem, the shrine of St. Michael at Monte Gargano, the shrine of St. Nicholas at Bari, and still later in Rome and at Tunis. In these journeys Giles was ever at pains to procure by manual labour what food and shelter he needed: he made reed baskets, carried water and helped to bury the dead, cut wood, trod the wine-press, gathered nuts, and swept and cleaned house.

In these travels Giles gained much valuable knowledge and experience, and often preached to the people. His brief and heartfelt sermons were replete with homely wisdom; he never minced his words, but spoke to all with apostolic freedom.

Giles was of simple mind, a stranger to theological and classical learning, but by constant contemplation of heavenly things, and by the divine love with which he was inflamed, he acquired that fullness of holy wisdom which filled his contemporaries with wonder, and which drew men of every condition, even the Pope himself, to Perugia to hear from Giles' lips the Word of Life.

After some years of activity Giles was assigned by St. Francis to the hermitage of Fabriano, where he began that life of contemplation and ecstasy which continued until his death in 1262, on the fifty-second anniversary of his reception into the Order of Friars Minor.

At this month's meeting we will reflect on the Body and Blood of Our Lord, what that meant for St. Francis, and what it can and should mean for us, both as Catholics and as Secular Franciscans.

While we do so, let us also consider the larger Body of Christ, the Church, into which we were all made members due to our baptism, and through which we are all called to be redeemed and reunited with Our Savior.

Let us also reflect that it is this Eucharist, this very essence of Our Lord that He gave us, is what, both in the Church's early times and today, distinguishes us from other Christian faiths. It makes us truly Catholic.

When Jesus gave us His prayer, the Our Father, which we should pray often, He gave us something to say. Yet when He gave us Himself in the Eucharist, He also gave us something to do:

Do this in remembrance of me.
