

SPIRITUAL ASSISTANT'S MESSAGE

April, 2019

Article twenty of our Rule tells us:

"The Secular Franciscan Order is divided into fraternities of various levels-local, regional,

national, and international. Each one has its own moral personality in the Church. These

various fraternities are coordinated and united according to the norm of this Rule and of

the Constitutions."

These last seven of the articles of our Rule develop and sustain the implementation of our Gospel life within the framework of our faith communities we call our fraternities. All secular Franciscan fraternities are living and vibrant communities that are expressions in various cultures and styles of loving and trusting relationships among the members. They have their various levels and have their particular characteristic about them(Article 20). They have local needs to fulfill(Article 21). They are established with the approval of the Church(Article 22). They have a mechanism for preparing prospective members for commitment to the Franciscan charism(Formation)(Article 23). Their meeting, called a gathering, and subsequent service are expressions of their sense of a serving community and leadership(Articles 24 and 25). Their spiritual nourishment and maintenance to the Franciscan charism is provided through the assistance of the Franciscan first, second, and third order regular as well as trained third order seculars(Spiritual Assistants)(Article 26)

Article 20 specifically defines the fraternity as the essential unit of all secular Franciscan events held on the local, regional, provincial. national, and international levels. By this, all of secular Franciscan life is aware of and mandated to accomplish a spirit of fraternity functioning on all levels beyond the local fraternities. Regional, provincial, national, and international activities are not to be considered just an extension of the local fraternities or a forum just for exchange, but actually a fully operating community with its own style, culture, and plan of management as set by our Rule and constitutions. Thus, no matter what the circumstance is that brings even so much as two seculars together, by our standards, this is considered a fraternity, and so we act accordingly.

All of you and your families have a most joyous and happy Easter as you celebrate in triumph of our Risen Lord Jesus Christ!

April – Month of the Holy Face and the Redemption

April 11 - St. Stanislaus - martyr and bishop, first Pole canonized and patron saint of Poland.

April 16th, St. Benedict-Joseph Labre, Franciscan Confessor, Cordbearer, d. 1783,

April 21 - St. Anselm - was a Benedictine monk, abbot, and philosopher.

April 23 - St. George - a dragon slayer and rescuer of maidens, was a Roman soldier of Greek and officer in the ground of Roman Emperor Diocletian who was sentenced to death for refusing to recant his Christian faith. He became one of the most venerated saints and especially venerated by the crusaders. His symbol a red cross on white background and became a standard of the British armies. George was made England's patron saint.

April 23– Brother Giles Of Assisi, lay brother, religious of the Franciscan 1st Order, d. 1262

April 24 - St. Fidelis - born as Mark Rey in Germany, was a Capuchin friar who was known for his generosity and care for the poor throughout his life. He became known as the Poor Man's lawyer. He was a major figure in the counter reformation and was murdered in Switzerland. He was proclaimed the patron saint of the Propagation of Faith.

April 25 - St. Mark, Evangelist - author of the Gospel of Mark, founder of the theological church of Alexandria and is honored as the founder of Christianity in Africa.

April 27th: St Zita of Lucca, Virgin, Franciscan Third Order Secular, d 1278 Saint Zita of Lucca was a member of the Third Order of St Francis. Lucca is in Tuscany; and since the Third Order was widely propagated there after its founding, this holy servant girl of the thirteenth century would quite naturally join its ranks. Zita was born at the village of Monte Sagrati in 1218, at the time that St Francis was entering upon his career as a knight-errant of Christ. Her parents were poor, devout Christians; an older sister afterwards become a nun; and her uncle Graziano was a saintly hermit. When she was twelve years old, Zita went to Lucca, eight miles from her home, to be a servant girl of the Fatinelli family which carried on a prosperous wool and silk weaving business; and she remained in their employ until she died forty-eight years later. Her daily work became a part of her religious life. She was wont to say: "A servant girl is not pious, if she is not industrious; work shy piety is sham piety." At the same time she led a very prayerful and penitential life. She rose nightly for prayer; and daily she attended the first Mass in the adjacent church of San Frediano. The good food she received for herself she gave to the poor, and lived on waste scraps or fasted. She wore only the poorest clothes and never put on shoes, even in winter.

April 28 - St. Peter Chanel - as a young priest, he revived a parish in a "bad" district by the simple method of showing great devotion to the sick. Natives had been baptized and when the Chieftain's son asked to be baptized, persecution by the chieftain reached a climax.. Chanel was clubbed to death. Within 2 years after his death, the whole island became catholic and has remained so. He is the first martyr of Oceania canonized.

April 30 - St. Pope Pius V - was head of catholic church, ruler of Papal State, venerated as a saint and is chiefly notable for his role in the Council of Trent. He stood against Nepotism and gained reputation for putting orthodox before personalities. He attributed the victory to the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and instituted the feast of Our Lady of Victory.
