
Minister Message

At Mass on Divine Mercy Sunday, an expectant mother was seated with her husband in the pew in front of us. As the liturgy proceeded, Mom was apparently experiencing a lot of movement from her unborn baby or, perhaps, she was experiencing false labor contractions (she was very pregnant). I couldn't help but notice her movements as we all sat or stood or kneeled. One motion she had, though, impressed me: when she was standing, she gently rocked back and forth. I had the notion she was trying to soothe and calm her little one. It further struck me that mother's rocking motion was identical to one she would be using after the baby was born, holding baby in her arms.

The current horror of certain state legislatures (including Virginia's) crafting measures to allow abortion up to birth was brought home to me by this lovely young woman cradling and rocking her baby still in the womb. Legislative "crafting" indeed -- the craft of the diabolical. Yet, in the face of evil we are still called to love by Him who commands us to it. We are to have mercy, as St. Francis admonishes us.

And so we love our enemies. I pray God's mercy on the souls of those who would end the lives of these most innocent, like that precious one next to us on Divine Mercy Sunday. Jesus, I trust in you.
