#### **Chapter XXI.** On the inane and loquacious religious

### ADMONITIONS OF ST. FRANCIS

Blessed (is) the servant, who when he speaks, does not manifest all his own (thoughts) in view of (some) wage and is not swift to speak (cf. Prov. 29:20), but wisely provides, what he ought to speak and answer. He himself receives "his wage" (cf. Mt 6:2; 6:16) and (his) hearers bring back little fruit.

## **Minister Message**

This is such a rich time of the year for Catholics. Easter Sunday has come and gone but the Season, and the celebration, continues! The Lord is risen indeed. Once again in the Holy Liturgy we say, "Glory to God!" "Alleluia!"

During the week after Easter Sunday, Theresa and I traveled to Boulder, Colorado. It was business travel for her and I was her chauffeur. One day while she was at work, I attended Mass at a Boulder parish with the fascinating name, "Sacred Heart of Mary." Yes, that's the name. The parish



was originally founded in the 1870s, and its name was not unusual sounding to 19th Century ears, I guess. One thinks about it, though, and Mary's heart is sacred. It is holy, it is immaculate and it is thoroughly sacred. The parish Pastor, Fr. Cliff McMillan, gave a nice homily about the Suffering Servant in Isaiah chapter 53. The verses there are familiar: "...a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief, he was

wounded for our transgressions, bruised for our iniquities...and by his stripes we are healed." Every Catholic and Protestant Bible has these verses about the Suffering Servant, as do the early Hebrew Bible translations. Christians understand these verses as foretelling Jesus

> Christ, and most Jewish sages understood the passages to describe the Messiah when he came.

Father tied this telling of the Suffering Servant to the namesake of his Parish, Sacred Heart of Mary. Notice on depictions of Mary's Immaculate Heart, it's surrounded by roses yet pierced by a sword. Jesus' Sacred Heart is encircled with

the Crown of Thorns, the Heart previously pierced by the lance, bleeding, and further "crowned" with the Cross and with fire. Jesus hung from the Tree, was pierced with the lance, and Mary's heart was pierced by her son's suffering as she knelt at the foot of the Cross. It all tells a story of Our Lord's love for us, and her love for him.
