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The Information Corner

May 30th – Feastday of St. Ferdinand III⁵



King of Leon and Castile, member of the Third Order of St. Ferdinand Francis, was born in 1198 near Salamanca. He was the son of Alfonso IX, King of Leon, and of Berengeria, the daughter of Alfonso III, King of Castile,

and sister of Blanche, the mother of St. Louis IX.

In 1217 Ferdinand became King of Castile, which crown his mother renounced in his favour, and in 1230 he succeeded to the crown of Leon, though not without civil strife, since many were opposed to the union of the two He took as his counsellors the kingdoms. wisest men in the State, saw to the strict administration of justice, and took the greatest care not to overburden his subjects with In 1219 he married Beatrice, the daughter of King Philip of Germany. blessed this union with seven children: six princes and one princess.

The highest aims of Ferdinand's life were the propagation of the Faith and the liberation of Spain from the Saracen yoke. Hence his continual wars against the Saracens. He took from them vast territories; only Granada and Alicante remained in their power at the time of his death. In the most important towns he founded bishoprics, reestablished Catholic worship everywhere, built churches, founded monasteries, and endowed hospitals. He turned the great mosques of Cordova and Seville into cathedrals, dedicating them to the Blessed Virgin. He watched over the conduct of his soldiers, confiding more in their virtue than in their valour, fasted strictly himself, wore a rough hairshirt, and often spent his nights in

prayer, especially before battles. Amid the tumult of the camp he lived like a religious in the cloister. The glory of the Church and the happiness of his people were the two guiding motives of his life. He founded the University of Salamanca, the Athens of Spain.

Ferdinand died at Seville on May 30, 1252, and was buried in the great cathedral of Seville before the image of the Blessed Virgin, clothed, at his own request, in the habit of the Third Order of St. Francis. His body, it is said, remains incorrupt. Many miracles took place at his tomb, and Clement X canonized him in 1671. His feast is on May 30th.

May Reflection

This month I want to reflect on Mary. While there are countless things one can say, many of which we have heard quite a few times, my mind kept circling back to Mary and our Order, so it is on that aspect of Mary I wish to reflect.

A sound way for a Secular Franciscan to start thinking of Mary is to examine what St. Francis himself said and wrote of her. For instance, his *Salutations* — this month's prayer — contains many symbols of Mary as a protector. The most obvious is how she held Jesus in her body, but there is so much more: a tabernacle protects the Holy Eucharist; a palace and a dwelling protect their inhabitants; a servant protects his master and the household; a robe protects its wearer; and virtues, put into practice, protect the soul.

Francis himself named Mary as protectress of the Order of Friars Minor, and by extension the entire Franciscan family. It was quite fitting, then, that when our Rule was updated in 1978, not only should an article should be devoted to Mary, but that she be named as our protector and advocate. She is our advocate with Jesus, who listened to her, both as a child and as an adult at Cana.

This month let us all make a special effort to pray the rosary or another Marian devotion or prayer in her honor. Let us also, in a spirit of protection and advocacy, reach out to another fraternity member, or the poor in our midst, and check up on them, bringing to them the same selfless caring that Mary has for us.
