Minister's Message

Pax et Bonum is the greeting St. Francis gave to all he met. Peace is the first greeting Jesus said to the apostles after His Resurrection.

"My peace I leave you, my peace I give you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled." John 14:27. These words our Lord said before He began His Passion. The peace Jesus wants us to have is interior peace. We are so accustomed to saying the greeting of peace at Mass, it has become second nature. Do we truly understand inner peace? How necessary it is to our Christian vocation? How difficult it is to maintain given our human nature?

Jacques Philippe in his book, *The Eight Doors of the Kingdom* states that "Christ strongly invites us to be at peace, embracing God's peace in our hearts. Someone whose heart is not at peace will be vulnerable to the force of division and all the cycles of fear and violence that trouble the world." (p.184-185). The state of the world and culture can certainly disrupt one's peace. Yet more often than not, the threat to our peace comes from within ourselves; confusion, need for control; need for recognition and appreciation; anxiety about everyday problems and endless more.

St. Paul tells us "The Lord is at hand. Don't be anxious; instead give thanks in all your prayers and petitions and make your requests known to God. And God's peace which is beyond all understanding will keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." Phil.4: 5-7.

Interior peace begets confidence in and openness to God. Fr. Philippe tells us that "Peace is needed to discern well. If one is not at peace but is instead troubled, anxious, or agitated, swept by a torrent of emotions, one lacks an objective view of reality and is tempted to take a negative view of everything and call into question its value" (p.188). How often have we been guilty of calling into question the good we are trying to do in our work, our ministry or family life when we have been disturbed by various situations in our lives?

Fr. Phillipe advises "When a problem causes you to lose your peace, don't hurry to resolve the problem in hopes of regaining peace, but first regain a modicum of peace and then see what can be done about the problem, In this way one avoids hasty, precipitous decisions ruled by fear and doesn't make the mistake of tormenting oneself trying to solve a problem about which you can do nothing, as people often do. But how to regain this modicum of peace? Basically, by putting oneself in God's hands in fervent prayer, making acts of faith and hope and meditating on Scripture passages that invite one to trust. And sometimes by opening one's heart to somebody who can help." (p.189-190).

My brothers and sisters, I wish you the peace that only Jesus can give. Pax et Bonum!

Day of Reflection

for Inquirers, Candidates and Newly Professed

Roland Willard and I attended the Day of Reflection on April 13,2019. About 75 people attended on a lovely day at the Shrine of St. Anthony. Hispanics were encouraged to attend which comprised about half of the group. Electronic devices were provided for translation for the talks and during Mass, part was in English and part in Spanish. We also had a small group session where we had translations from English to Spanish and Spanish to English.

Fr. Paul Dressler, OFM Capuchin gave two talks – one on joy and one on darkness.

The first talk was on Joy. He referenced the Evangelli Gaudium (Joy of the Gospel) by Pope Francis and Isaiah 9:1 – "Nevertheless, there will be no more gloom for those who were in distress." A few of the comments he made: The most used words in the Bible are Love, Peace, Joy. Joy is a sign of faith coming from a deep place inside. Let go of expectations and be open to what God wants. Hold on to faith and trust in God – surrender. Be a witness of a different way of living in the world. What is getting in the way of a relationship with God?

The second talk was on four areas of darkness. 1) Division (diabolical, to tear apart) – God wants to unite. We belong to one another. 2) Denial – We want to push away from uncomfortable truth and inconvenience. Ask God to enlighten our hearts. 3)Discouragement –Don't let our sin discourage us as God's mercy is stronger. 4) Delay – We postpone enacting the will of God. No matter what we are going through, we need not lose our joy or delay in carrying out God's Will. Don't let fear keep you from living fully. Replace fear with God's love. He also mentioned two books: The Irresistible Revolution by Shane Claiborne and Tattoos on the Heart by Greg Boyle. Both are related to social justice. I have read Tattoos on the Heart and highly recommend it.

I found this retreat to be very worthwhile.
