Minister's Minute:

Twelve of our members were among those (probably about 70) who attended the Regional retreat at Priest Field, WVa, two weekends ago. We all enjoyed Br. Michael Meza's humor (primarily about himself) and zeal for our vocation. He was a Secular and the vice-minister of his fraternity 10 years ago when he quit to join the Capuchins. He focused his talks on the first part of Rule 6, telling us to deepen our vocation by becoming thoroughly convicted that God loves us and calls us to a conversion

of heart, so that we might be better equipped to love and serve others.

Lent is gone and Easter season ended. But Br. Mike told us not to let Pentecost be an end to these seasons this year. Rather, we should treat Pentecost as a beginning—to live in the power of the Holy Spirit that we received in the Sacrament of Baptism and was strengthened in the Sacrament of Confirmation. We make a deeper commitment to living our baptism when we make our Profession. As Fr. Benet Fonck, OFM, wrote:

One's profession in the Secular Franciscan Order is a special way of intensifying the effect of baptism. Entering a secular or religious order is not another sacrament, like ordination or marriage, precisely because its intent and result is identical to baptism, but on a deeper level. For example, a person may play a simple melody on the piano all by itself; that same melody is played again with harmonics and chords to give it an even greater richness, depth, and fulfillment. So, profession directs, intensifies, and deepens the "melody" of Christian life first played at baptism. From Fonck, Called to Follow Christ.

So let's look at the cross, live our Rule, and love our neighbor as this Jubilee Year of the Rule ends this month and not look back, but forward. Let us, in the words of Rule 7, "conform our thoughts and deeds to those of Christ by means of that radical interior change which the gospel itself calls 'conversion." And in our "human frailty" let us remember to do it "daily," as Rule 7 also tells us. Carpe Diem!

JPIC -- JUSTICE, PEACE AND INTEGRITY OF CREATION, ANIMATOR JUDITH TYRRELL, OFS

From the Priestfield Trail Guidebook JUSTICE is the virtue of giving what is due to both God and neighbor. St Stephen pursued justice in his work with the poor and in his mercy for his persecutors.

In Rule 6 we read "They have been made living members of the Church by being buried and raised with Christ in baptism; they have been united more intimately with the Church by profession. Therefore they should go forth as witnesses and instruments of her mission among all people, proclaiming Christ by their life and words."

Brother Michael Meza OFM Cap who spoke to us at the Priestfield Regional Retreat asked the question "Do I wake up and say yes to my profession as a Secular Franciscan and the call to be an "instrument of peace"? Do I who was baptized "priest, prophet and king" offer sacrifices of myself as **priest** to bring peace where there is hatred? As **prophet** am I one who speaks out what the Church teaches (without fear of consequences)? Or as **king do I** realize I am a part of the kingdom of heaven and the larger Regional, National and International Franciscan family with a commitment to say a "deeper yes" to my mission as a Secular Franciscan.

During lunch one day at the Retreat Gil Donahue our Regional JPIC Coordinator shared with us that he thinks that our focus as Seculars at this time needs to be on Advocacy. We have a mission **to do Justice**. He sent to us in March 2019 his JPIC Presentation, which is attached. In his outline of JPIC there are four points regarding Justice: Righting wrongs, Protecting the weak, Addressing systemic issues, and Active healing of individuals and society. His five Arenas for Action are the Family, Community/Fraternity, State, Nation and the World. He describes our commitment as our CALLS as stated in the Rule.

So let us reread this JPIC Presentation sent to us by Gil with the renewed fervor of the Holy Spirit. Let us PRAY, LISTEN and ACT with renewed zeal to fulfill our mission to proclaim Christ by our life and words as encouraged by Brother Mike. Let us reread the Rule 15 and Article 22 and 23 of the Constitutions. "Let them individually and collectively be in the forefront in promoting **justice** by the testimony of their human lives and their courageous initiatives." And pray and think about how we might ACT to promote justice. And praise God for how we already are!

We have heard this before.... what are the issues that you are passionate about? How can you be an Advocate for that issue? We pledge each year to be an Advocate for the poor and for creation doing our St. Francis/Pope Francis Pledge... "Advocate for Catholic principles and priorities in climate change discussions and decisions, especially as they impact those who are poor and vulnerable" What can you do? You can pray, you can write, you can speak out in the public forum, you can attend rallies, you can put up posters, you can be a voice in Congress, in the local Legislature, you can serve the poor, the sick and the needy, you can save babies and the elderly...... Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation

JUSTICE

- 1. Righting wrongs
- 2. Protecting the weak
- 3. Addressing systemic issues
- 4. Active healing of individuals and society

PEACE

- 1. Cessation of violence and chaos

HOW CAN WE LIVE IN ACCORDANCE WITH JPIC?

FIVE ARENAS FOR ACTION:

FAMILY

Suggested actions: Seek ways to simplify our lives by carefully weighing our purchases, decluttering and donating unused clothing and other items, limiting our carbon footprint, and adopting eco-friendly and green policies.

COMMUNITY (FRATERNITY)

Suggested actions: Seek opportunities to assist those in need, encourage eco-friendly policies, and stand up for the downtrodden.

STATE

Suggested actions: Research and advocate for state legislation on social issues, including health, education, housing and other forms of assistance to the poor. Advocate on behalf of the needy to improve systemic and structural issues that affect them.

NATION

Suggested actions: Research and support policies and legislation aimed at supporting the poor and needy, as well as sustaining the environment.

WORLD

Suggested actions: Learn more about, and closely follow, important international issues: efforts to build peace, further the rule of law, and protect the environment. Support international organizations that provide relief and assist with poverty reduction. Educate others about the needs beyond our shores.
