



The Awakening of My Franciscan Vocation

God called me to live the Gospel of Jesus in the footsteps of St. Francis of Assisi over three decades ago. However, regular attendance to fraternity meetings was difficult for me, sometimes impossible due to military moves and family responsibilities with 6 children and also because I was lax. I had no sense of purpose as a Franciscan.

It was not until my recent attendance at the Regional Retreat that I became convicted that being a Secular Franciscan is indeed a divine calling. The retreat was given by Brother Michael, a Capuchin, whose first two talks did not really make an impression or impact on me because I could not understand his continual reference to being convicted in our Franciscan vocation. I realized later that this was due to my own inner conflict to my Franciscan call. Following Brother's last three talks, I realized that It was this very lack of conviction, commitment, and community that had lead to my lack of purpose.

I learned that our mission is to listen to the Holy Spirit and then to gently minister to whoever the Holy Spirit guides us to or sends to us. It is in the circumstances of our daily life of family and friends, neighbors and strangers that God will use us. As Franciscans we are to see the face of Jesus in everyone without exception, to love as Jesus loves and to respect and join with all of creation in giving glory to God.

The Sacraments of Our Holy Mother, the Church, cleanse us, heal us, nourish us, bless us, and strengthen us to live as God's children on Earth. Our Franciscan vocation emphasizes fraternity, where we receive nourishment and strength from each other to grow with God's grace as we continue to carry out the mission that began in San Damiano when Our Lord called St. Francis to repair and rebuild His Church.

This retreat was truly an awakening of my Franciscan Call and a Blessing!

Minister's Message

This year's regional retreat was outstanding. The conferences given by Br. Michael Meza, O.F.M. Cap. were geared to our vocation as Secular Franciscans. Br. Michael understands what it means to be a Secular Franciscan because he was a Secular Franciscan before he became a Capuchin Friar. My only disappointment and regret was that not every one of my brothers and sisters of St. Padre Pio Fraternity was present as well, both Professed and those in Formation.

Brother gave five conferences. I will make an attempt here to share with you what was imparted to us at the Retreat from my notes though I will have to do this in stages in subsequent newsletters.

The first conference was entitled *Called Forth in Our Salvation*. We are first called by our Baptism. Baptism is the moment we are immersed in Christ. Baptism purifies us of sin It also tells us who we are-children of God because it "makes us a "new creature" and "partaker of divine nature", a member of Christ and co heir with him and a temple of the Holy Spirit". (CCC:1265 and 1266). In addition to purification, by Baptism we are justified and sanctified. "The Most Holy Trinity gives the baptized, sanctifying grace, the grace of Justification- enabling them to believe in God, hope in God and to love him through theological virtues. -giving them the power to live and act under the prompting of the Holy Spirit through the gifts of the Holy Spirit" (CCC: 1226). Reconciliation purifies us again and sanctifies us. Confirmation pushes us toward the sevenfold gifts of the Holy spirit: the way of wisdom, courage, understanding, knowledge, fortitude, piety and fear of the Lord. Fear of the Lord makes us want to be one with the Lord Jesus. Sin takes us away from Him.

How many of us profess that we are Secular Franciscans? Do we say yes every day? We must deepen our commitment every day. At Easter we renew our Baptismal Promises. As Secular Franciscans, we are deepening our call through means of our Baptismal Promises. By Baptism we share in the common priesthood of Jesus, in his prophetic mission and royal mission. (CCC1268). We Franciscans are Priest, Prophets and King. In sharing in the common priesthood of Christ, we offer the sacrifice of ourselves. We are prophets when we speak out and proclaim the Gospel and that Jesus Christ is Lord. We share in the kingship of Christ because we are part of the royal kingdom of God. The Church at Easter wants us to remember who we are through Baptism and helps us to do that by renewing our Baptismal promises. Another point that Br. Michael Meza made is that if we remember Easter, we must remember the suffering. As Franciscans and as any follower of Christ we must carry our cross in imitation of Jesus. It was through Jesus's death on the Cross that the gates of heaven were opened for us.

Br. Michael ended the conference with the words of St. Francis" Let us begin again for up to now we have done nothing."

Following the first conference, Regional Minister, Bob Longo, said that "Each one of us should be encouraging others" and gave us the **challenge** of saying to those we meet in the course of our daily encounters "**May you have a Blessed Day**." "This gives people something to think about. As Franciscans we are called to live the Beatitudes. We need to be heard and what better way than by encouraging others."
