

VI. WEAK RESPONSES (Paragraph 59)

"At the same time we can note the rise of a false or superficial ecology which bolsters complacency and a cheerful recklessness. As often occurs in periods of deep crisis which require bold decisions, we are tempted to think that what is happening is not entirely clear.

Superficially, apart from a few obvious signs of pollution and deterioration, things do not look that serious, and the planet could continue as it is for some time. Such evasiveness serves as a license to carrying on with our present lifestyles and models of production and consumption. 

CHAPTER III

How, changed in mind but not in body, Francis spoke of the treasure he had found and of his spouse in allegory

6 Changed, therefore, but in mind, not in body, he refused to go to Apulia and he strove to bend his own will to the will of God. Accordingly, he withdrew for a while from the bustle and the business of the world and tried to establish Jesus Christ dwelling within himself. Like a prudent business man, he hid the treasure he had found from the eyes of the deluded, and, having sold all his possessions, he tried to buy it secretly. Now since there was a certain man in the city of Assisi whom he loved more than any other because he was of the same age as the other, and since the great familiarity of their mutual affection led him to share his secrets with him? he often took him to remote places, places well-suited for counsel, telling him that he had found a certain precious and great treasure.

This one rejoiced and, concerned about what he heard, he willingly accompanied Francis whenever he was asked. There was a certain grotto near the city where they frequently went and talked about this treasure. The man of God, who was already holy by reason of his holy purpose, would enter the grotto, while his companion would wait for him outside; and filled with a new and singular spirit, he would pray to his Father in secret. He wanted no one to know what he did within, and taking the occasion of the good to wisely conceal the better, he took counsel with God alone concerning his holy proposal.

He prayed devoutly that the eternal and true God would direct his way and teach him to do his will. He bore the greatest sufferings in mind and was not able to rest until he should have completed in deed what he had conceived in his heart; various thoughts succeeded one another and their importunity disturbed him greatly.

He was afire within himself with a divine fire and he was not able to hide outwardly the ardor of his mind; he repented that he had sinned so grievously and had offended the eyes of God's majesty, and neither the past evils nor those present gave him any delight. Still he had not as yet won full confidence that he would be able to guard himself against them in the future. Consequently, when he came out again to his companion, he was so exhausted with the strain, that one person seemed to have entered, and another to have come out.



THE GIFT OF HOLINESS

All men are equal before God, everyone has some inclination to holiness ~ by Silvia Ceccarelli

"If I can prevent, a heart to break, I will not have lived in vain. If I alleviate the pain of a life or relieve a pain or help a fallen robin to return to the nest, I will not have lived in vain! [...] ".

So wrote Emily Dickinson in the verses of one of her famous poems, still remembered today for the sweet melody of the verse that vibrates with the same intensity in the sounds of English (her native language) and for the beauty of its contents from which the need emerges to make sense of their lives by doing good works, expressing their closeness to people's problems and showing how even a simple smile can alleviate the wounds of living beings. The profound and suggestive verses of Emily Dickinson's poetry invite us to think about the value, or perhaps better, about the gift of holiness that God has infused into human nature.

On many occasions Pope Francis has affirmed that all mankind are equal before God, and that each of them possesses, sometimes even minimally, some inclination to holiness (conceived primarily as the way to go to consent to the divine will). In every part of the world there is no saint who is not revered by a large community of faithful: St. Anthony of Padua, for example, is loved and revered everywhere.

Represented conventionally next to the Child Jesus, as well as alongside other objects of intense symbolic value (the lily and the book), Saint Anthony embodies the purity of mind, the innocence never lost, the tender and good nature manifested in understanding of the discomfort or the sickness of the smallest. He is for everyone a member of the family, the perfect companion who is there to support us in the difficulties of life, a fixed point on which to count and to share in prayer the joys and sorrows of existence.

St. Francis of Assisi, whose brevity of life did not prevent him from manifesting his holiness in small things, also left in the memory of all, feelings of love, peace and hope. A past not too far, however, leaves in our mind the memory of Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta, the little pencil in the hands of God, who has traveled the world far and wide on streets and alleys full of poor and needy to whom she went teaching and dispensing His love and care without fearing anything, as accompanied and sustained by the grace of the Lord.

That same grace that allowed St. John Paul II, during his long pontificate, to give proof of his holiness by siding with all his strength to defend the rights of all and against any form of corruption or injustice. Holiness, as a gift from God, is therefore in the small daily gestures: any work of good done within the home, at work or in places of prayer, is the key to sanctity.

You do not need miracles to be holy, but small gestures made with the heart, small gestures that reveal our love, our attention and dedication to others - whoever it is. Because "it's in giving that we receive".

Geri tells us, "crocheting or knitting these sleeping mats for those who find themselves homeless has been such a pleasure. In addition to providing a lightweight, waterproof surface between the person and the cold, wet ground, they are also an amazingly positive way to utilize plastic bags!"

"Each mat uses up to 500 bags—so much better than the landfill - I find so many people are happy to save their bags for me. Our kids got a kick out of me quietly **removing** bags from our supermarket recycle bin and the Franciscan Center has been happy to receive them."
