JPIC -- JUSTICE, PEACE AND INTEGRITY OF CREATION, ANIMATOR JUDITH TYRRELL, OFS

Today on this feast of St. Bonaventure we read here his words: In beautiful things he (Francis) contuited Beauty itself and through footprints impressed he followed his Beloved everywhere, out of them all making for himself a ladder through which he could climb up to lay hold of him who is utterly desirable. With an intensity of unheard devotion he savored in each creature-as in so many rivulets-that fontal Goodness.

My husband and I have just had an overdose of the Beauty of Creation lifting our hearts to God in praise for all of His wonderful majestic works in visiting Hawaii in our 50th year of marriage. There are no words (or mine fall very short) to speak of the beauty of the tropical plants and flowers, the green mountains and the rushing waves of clear aqua water, the glistening black sands, the fall colors of the dormant crater of Haleakala, the gleaming white of the egrets, the roosters and doves everywhere(airports, restaurants, parking lots etc) the endangered birds on the natural wildlife reserves like the coot and stilt bird and the nene in the mountains and the Honolulu zoo, the absolutely crayola colors of the fish in the Maui and Waikiki aquariums and sharing the delight of a little girl and her mom as we watched the birthing of literally hundreds of tiny seahorses. Did you know the male gives birth????

But Bonaventure unites the love of Creation with humans as well and we delighted in so many rich encounters with Christ in the people we met along the way of our travels from Cara a young adult heading to be a counselor supervising 700 Young Americans happy to know I would be praying, or Aaron, a homeless man in Kihei who talked about the TAU we were wearing, the Mindful theology he has embraced and although he doesn't like church he is grateful to the sisters at St. Theresas down the street who help and feed him. Then there was Bruce, a Ranger at the Kealia Wildlife reserve who happened to be an ex teacher who had taken his students to U. of Maryland! He was grateful for the Franciscan prayer card I shared with him. There was sweet girl Anna from Minnesota at the Farmers Market who sold us the mango from the farm where she is working through a "workaday" program. A girl named Parker in a photography shop in Paia asked about the TAU just as I walked in and I shared with her about it and she too wasn't happy with church organization but was open to hear about growing closer to God when I shared with her the Franciscan card with ways to get closer to Him(I have been praying for her ever since) There was Rob on the pier in Waikiki who just up and left Oregon when he realized he would rather be in Hawaii permanently sharing with us about all the fish that he has come to know in this small area of beach including an octopus, huge crab, and tilapia pointing out the ones at our feet. And the list goes on but the most special encounters for us were with the Sisters of St. Francis of the Neumann Communities on the island of Molokai.

Pat and I had met Sisters from this Order when we were on the pilgrimage to Prague studying the letters of Clare to Agnes. They were actually headed to the Canonization of Mother Marianne Cope one of their Order, the same one who served the lepers on Molokai. We had a local guide on Molokai, Kahi, who claims to have been healed of a stroke through her intercession. He had an awesome voice that filled the rafters of St. Philomenas church where Fr. Damien had ministered and where he is buried. We rode the bus with him to meet up with the Sisters, Alicia Damien, Barbara Jean and Barbara. The last two rode with us to various sites on the island including the original burial place of St. Marianne Cope and the Bishop Home(local name) with cottages where she had cared for the women and girls and the St. Elizabeth of Hungary chapel where we prayed for our Secular Franciscan brothers and sisters.

You know I never saw a dirty stretch of beach or water all around Oahu and Maui.

I have been known to cry in Pat's backyard family home over the pollution in the stretch of water that goes out to Long Island Sound. He grew up swimming in it, fishing in it, and having fun with friends and family on the boat in it. Now you wouldn't think of it? I'll bet you all have similar stories. Let's take back our environment and have the earthly paradise that God created for us to enjoy—the animals, the birds, the fish, and the human beings—just like St. Francis enjoyed- Pray the Canticle of Creation today and praise the Lord along with him and St. Bonaventure. My journey to make this a Franciscan oriented visit to Hawaii began with KUMULIPO- a Hawaiian chant about Creation done by Queen Liliuokalani (who had helped the lepers on Molaka)i and my journey ended with the same chant reflected on at the AHIHI-KINAU Natural Area Reserve on Maui on our last day where there are coral reefs which are threatened by our use of sunscreens containing zinc oxide and titanium oxide today.

Dear Friends of The Light House,

Thank you for the donation of bus passes to The Light House. This gift supports our mission of rebuilding lives with compassion as we strive to break the cycle of homelessness. Our overarching goal is to make homelessness brief and rare in our community.

At The Light House, we provide a place of belonging, coupled with life changing programs and a broad continum of services tailored to each individual client to set them on a path of self-sufficiency. The process works: 79% of our residential clients leave with a housing solution, increased income and improved life skills. Through both our residential program and our homelessness prevention and support programs, we serve an average of 2,000 clients each year.

In 2018, our staff, with the help of 2,200 volunteers who donated 15,000 hours of time, provided emergency shelter, food and other valuable services, as well as transitional and supportive housing apartments to 150 individuals and 18 families, including 24 children. Last year we served more than than 40,000 hot meals, distributed thousands of bagged lunches and over 100,000 pounds of groceries, as well as provided hot showers, laundry services and hundreds of articles of clothing to residents and community members in need.

We are committed to our mission of serving the homeless and those at risk of becoming homeless and are grateful for the generosity and continued support of donors like you.
