The most beautiful credo, “I believe”, is the one we say during times of sacrifice and through a stringent exercise of our wills.”

Deepening Our Communion with Our Lord Jesus

In my desire to share with you the conferences from the Regional Retreat in June, the following is from my notes from the second conference by Br. Michael Meza, O.F.M. Cap..

As mentioned in the previous conference, we know we are called through Baptism. However, we must really be convicted of our call. We must always have the conviction that we are people of faith. This requires constant conversion. We must have a deeper relationship with the Lord. If we don't have the conviction of our call and faith in Jesus, we can't relate/give our belief to others. When we give a blessing – for example saying, “Have a blessed day or “God bless you”, we must be ready to share our faith.

Francis had this conviction of his faith deep in his heart. Conviction gave Francis the strength to carry the stones to rebuild the little church. To acquire this conviction, we must talk to the Lord.

In Genesis- Chapter 12, we read about the call of Abraham. It was not easy for Abraham to grab everything and go. This is what Abraham and Francis heard - to leave everything and do God's will. We Secular Franciscans need to trust the Lord and have the conviction that Jesus will take care of us.

We must go deeper in our Secular Franciscan vocation- put out into the deep. We are in different times than Francis. The Lord will give us the strength. We can only get that conviction by sitting with the Lord. When do we give time to the Lord? If we want to emblaze the world, it must first start with us, with our communion with the Lord. We can't give what we don't have. When we say “Have a blessed day” be ready to have a conversation with the other.

We wear Tau Crosses without a corpus because we are the corpus who must climb on the Cross. We are constantly being converted. To have the conversion that Abraham had, we must lift the knife and be tested.

The hardest thing is to forgive oneself – Let go and give it to God. We must choose faith. To choose faith, we must trust. To trust, we must abandon ourselves to God. Yes Lord, send me. Without us, who then? Will the next generation do this mission and respond to the call of Baptism? We don't know.

At Confirmation, we said we want to be confirmed. What about now? If it is all words, if the conviction isn't inside us, we are empty vessels. Rule #6 states that Secular Franciscans are “called to work together in building up the Church as the sacrament of salvation for all and, through their baptism and profession, made “witnesses and instruments of her mission.” We must give God time in prayer. We must Listen to the Lord's call.
