MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

This month our on-going formation will involve a handson lesson in helping those in need.

The social teachings of the Church frequently emphasize the importance of justice in economic matters. For example, the U.S. Bishops, in their Pastoral Letter *Economic Justice for All*, invite us as Catholics to use the resources of our faith, the strength of our economy, and the opportunities of our democracy to shape a society that better protects the dignity and basic rights of our sisters and brothers, here in our country, and all around the world.

Does our economy exist to serve the human person, or is it the other way around? How are the weakest doing in our economy? Is our economic life shaped by moral principles and ethical norms? Considering these principles offered by our Bishops, I could not help to wonder how the weakest in our world are faring in this economy of ours.

If we understand that we are stewards of the gifts given to us by God, then we need to know what it means to be a good steward. A steward is someone who takes personal responsibility for another's property or possessions. This assumes that a steward does not own the property or possessions but is responsible to take good care of them while under their custody. I then thought about all that God has provided me – my life, family, friends, faith, the earth, the air I breathe, just to name a few. Applying the standard of stewardship to these precious things that God

has placed in my custody, I had a renewed sense of responsibility for them. I cannot squander them or abuse them or ignore them. As a good and just steward, I need to take care of them, nurture them and help them to flourish!

We are all stewards of all that God has given to us, including our poor sisters and brothers. Also, the material wealth to which we have been given custody requires good stewardship on our behalf. As we consider our role as stewards, I suggest that we think about the moral principles that our Church puts forward to us concerning economic matters. We should also consider how we use our material wealth with the poor of our world. Then we should ask ourselves, "are we being good stewards?"

Do you know that our brother Frank Rega is a published author of many books, including *Padre Pio and America*, St. Francis of Assisi and the Conversion of the Muslims, What God Is by Nature, Mary Is by Grace and his latest book, Amazing Miracles of Padre Pio. We thank him for sharing the following:

From Francis of Assisi by Fortini.

On the particular day with which we are concerned it was already late spring. It was just after Francis had been advised by St. Clare and Brother Silvestro to continue in his apostolate. He was so full of spiritual enthusiasm that he devoured the road that descends from San Damiano, and continues on to the Cannara bridge, in high morning. Immediately the word spread and people hurried out to gather in the piazza before the parish church of Cannara.

As Francis spoke to them, he saw their stern faces smooth out, the dark diffidence give way to an expression of wonder. And his fervour grew because of that unexpected emotion. But the cries of the swallows distracted him and kept him from concentrating.

The flock fluttered back and forth between the river and the town gate, making such a racket that Francis, in the middle of his sermon, stopped. "My sisters," he said, "it is my turn to speak now. You have said enough already. Listen to God's word and be quiet until the sermon is over."

Immediately, and it was quite a sight, the swallows stopped flying about and settled down attentively. On the cornices of the houses, along the towers, in the arcades, the white breasts and forked tails of the now-silent birds shone out as when they gathered in September at the time of their migration.

The garrulous anxious swallows! Even after Francis died, the sound of his name could awake them to the old love. Celano tells a story about a scholar at the University of Parma, one of those skeptical and pleasure-loving types ready to laugh at the most sacred things. He was studying diligently one day but was distracted by the continual screeching of a swallow. Impatiently he gave vent to his annoyance, saying, "This must be one of the birds that disturbed Saint Francis when he was preaching, until he told them to be quiet." Then jokingly he turned to the swallow and said, "In the name of God's servant Francis, I command you to come to me and keep quiet." Scarcely had he finished the words when the swallow flew into his hands!
