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From the Desk of Brother Tage

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

May the Lord give you peace! September and October are rich months, liturgically speaking, for Franciscans.

On September 14, the Catholic Church celebrates the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. In the Gospel reading for that day, Jesus, speaking to Nicodemus, foretells that he will be lifted up on the cross.

On September 17, Franciscans celebrate the Stigmata of our Holy Father Francis. This feast commemorates how St. Francis, two years before he died, received on Mount La Verna the sacred wounds of our Lord Jesus. Two decades after Francis' conversion to Jesus and his Gospel, Francis was graced with bearing the painful wounds of his Savior, the Stigmata. Francis' love for the Lord was fulfilled by his complete identification with him. Truly, at this point, it was not Francis who lived, but Christ who lived in him.

On September 23, the Church and the Franciscans celebrate the Memorial of St. Pio of Pietrelcina. When Padre Pio, as he is commonly known, was 31, he received the Stigmata in his body. Padre Pio was graced with the same favor from God as was St. Francis. Padre Pio lived a life of intense suffering from these wounds, and from scorn and rejection by others, but he never failed to unite his sufferings to Jesus on the cross. His immense faith

sustained him throughout the decades of suffering and abuse that tormented him.

Finally, on October 4, the Church and the Franciscans celebrate St. Francis of Assisi. In the general church calendar, it is a Memorial, but for us Franciscans, this day is a solemnity! In the second reading for Franciscans who celebrate Holy Mass, we hear from St. Paul's Letter to the Galatians, where St. Paul says that he only wants to glory in the cross of Jesus Christ. The world has been crucified to him and he to the world. These words from St. Paul describe the life of St. Francis. Jesus on the cross! Jesus' love for St. Francis and the world shines through on that cross! St. Francis loved the cross because he saw how God condescended to humanity through Jesus' self-offering. God became man in order that we might return to God. In God's movement of Heaven to Earth, we are able to move from Earth to Heaven.

We Franciscans love the cross. On the cross is revealed God who emptied himself to become man, who as man suffered, died, and rose again for our salvation. Jesus, poor, naked, crucified -- with nothing to call his own. This Jesus was who St. Francis followed throughout his life. This Jesus is who we Franciscans are called to follow. Like Jesus, and like St. Francis, we strive not for earthly gain, power, or prestige. We strive to offer our lives in sacrifice to our God who loves us. This September and October, as we celebrate the cross and how it has been revealed in the saints, let us thank God for our Franciscan vocation and always keep our eyes on the cross. Let us imitate St. Francis and Padre Pio who accepted their sufferings, uniting them to Jesus. Like St. Paul, we too can say that we want only to glory in the cross of Jesus Christ. With and in Jesus, we can endure anything.

In advance, I wish you all a blessed and happy Solemnity of St. Francis of Assisi! Let us pray for each other.

Minister's Message

As Franciscans, we often talk about living the gospel. Every day we make countless decisions that either follow gospel teaching or not. Too often our thinking stops at that point – we think we've either avoided sin or we haven't. Whether we realize it or not, however, each decision involves not just a point in time, but also takes us down a path. This is why the church teaches that conversion is a process that is carried out daily. It is why our faith is not a once-and-done decision.

Living the gospel means that we have embarked on a journey from pride to humility, from selfishness to selflessness, from greed to poverty, and from hatred to love. OFS Rule 7 says it this way, ". . . motivated by the dynamic power of the gospel, let them conform their thoughts and deeds to those of Christ by means of that radical interior change which the gospel itself calls conversion." In our daily living of the gospel, over time we become different persons.

Unfortunately, the change which the gospel brings about in us does not make us perfect; we are still human. The conversion process, therefore, never ends. Each day of our lives, including the last, requires us to continue going from gospel to life and life to gospel, making decisions and putting into practice as best we can the gospel message.

Our culture today constantly entices us to seek things of this world, recognition, power, fame, wealth, with the assurance that these bring happiness. It tells us that truth is relative, life is not sacred, men are infected with toxic masculinity, and there are other alternatives to male and female. So look around. How many really happy people do you see today? Do you see peace or division?

Francis and Clare embraced the gospel to the extent that they took radically different paths from the culture of their day; and they found peace in Christ. As the canticle in Luke says, "In the tender compassion of our God, the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace."

Living the gospel not only brings about radical interior positive change in us, Francis and Clare have shown us through their example that it also brings us peace. May we all strive to more perfectly live the gospel and enjoy the peace of Christ.

Referring to that day's Gospel (Matthew 11:25-30) at Padre Pio's canonization Mass in 2002, Saint John Paul II said: "The Gospel image of 'yoke' evokes the many trials that the humble Capuchin of San Giovanni Rotondo endured.

Today we contemplate in him how sweet is the 'yoke' of Christ and indeed how light the burdens are whenever someone carries these with faithful love. The life and mission of Padre Pio testify that difficulties and sorrows, if accepted with love, transform themselves into a privileged journey of holiness, which opens the person toward a greater good, known only to the Lord."
