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Minister's Message

Almost 800 years ago, St. Francis of Assisi visited the town of Grecio to celebrate Christmas. Grecio was a small town in a mountainous area. Vineyards covered the fertile area. A little Franciscan hermitage was located near the town but St. Francis realized that the chapel of the hermitage would be too small to hold everyone who would come for Midnight Mass. Near the town square he found a niche in the rock, some called it a grotto, where he brought some hay, an ox, an ass, and prepared a manger. It was here that St. Francis, Franciscans of the hermitage, and the townspeople celebrated Mass during the cold Christmas Eve of 1223. This night marked the beginning of the Christmas crèche.

The inspiration for the crèche came to St. Francis while on a visit to Rome some weeks earlier. The feast of Christmas had always been exceedingly important to St. Francis yet he did not think that it was celebrated properly. He believed that the poverty of the newborn Christ Child had become lost in the lavishness and excessiveness of the celebrations, which somehow only lessened the joy, peace and hope of this awesome feast. People were deeply touched by the simplicity of St. Francis's Christmas crèche. They were able to gain a new sense of the peace and joy of that holy night.

As we approach this wonderful time of year, a time to gather together with family and friends, let's strive to keep peace in our hearts. The best ways to keep peace in your heart are to forgive others, accept them as they are, pray

for them, and serve them as you are able. For St. Francis, his practice of forgiveness sprang from his own perceived need for God's forgiveness. He is recorded as having said, "It seems to me that I am a greater sinner than anyone in this world." We need to remember the Gospel message to forgive and you shall be forgiven.

Much unhappiness comes from not only being critical of others, but also from a deep need to change them in some way to suit you. We are all born with different God-given traits and temperaments and are not meant to be the same. Dropping the need to change others will bring tremendous peace.

If you love peace, then hate injustice, hate tyranny, hate greed But hate these things inside yourself, not in another. – GANDHI

We all have weaknesses and/or traits that we need to change, but only God can change us. The best we can do for others is to pray for them.

St. Francis was a man dedicated to prayer. It was through prayer that St. Francis found the courage and wisdom to be a man of peace. Prayer is the primary source for God's peace because it opens the heart to God's presence, and in the presence of God there is peace. Having God's peace in our hearts enables us to reconcile with and be at peace with others.

So as we prepare for the coming of Christmas, set up and gather with family and friends around our own Nativity scenes, may we not forget to hold in our hearts the Baby Jesus. Following in the footsteps of St. Francis, may we open our hearts in the presence of the Christ-child and be at peace with ourselves and everyone we meet this Season.
