The Information Corner

Jan 8th – Feastday of Bl. Eurosia Fabris⁴



Eurosia Fabris was born on Sep 27, 1866, in Italy, of farmer parents. She only attended two years of elementary school, as she had to help with farm household work and chores. With the help of the Holy Scriptures and religious books Eurosia

learned how to read and write.

After her first Holy Communion at age 12, she joined the Association of the Daughters of Mary, and through diligent observation of their practices increased her love for Mary. She taught catechism and sewing to the girls who came to her home. While several young men proposed to her, she did not feel called to accept.

In 1885, a tragic event forever changed Eurosia's life. A young married woman near her home died, leaving three very young daughters, one of whom died shortly thereafter. Eurosia's heart went out to these orphans, and she cared for them as if they were her own. For six months, she looked after the two little girls and took care of their home. Later. after praying over this sudden turn of events in her life, she decided to marry. On May 5, 1586, she married Carlo Barban, accepting the sacrifices that married life entailed as God's will, who she now felt was calling her through these two babies to embrace a new mission.

In addition to the two adopted children, Eurosia and Carlo had nine other children and their home was always open to additional children as well. Eurosia offered affection and care to all, sacrificing her own needs to provide a solid Christian formation to all these children. She was known to everyone as "Mamma Rosa". Three of her sons were ordained as priests.

Eurosia lived an intense life of prayer, and was especially devoted to the Holy Eucharist and the Blessed Virgin Mary. Mamma Rosa's family home was an ideal Christian community where her children learned to pray, obey, respect God's will and practice Christian virtues. She became a member of the Franciscan Third Order, attended all meetings and strived to live the true Franciscan spirit of poverty and joy in her home.

Eurosia showed heroic strength during the final illness of her husband, who died in 1930. She herself died just two years later, on Jan 8, 1932, and was buried in the Church of Marola. She was beatified on Nov 6, 2005.
