Minister's Minute

Our country and world are definitely going through a time of test. Social distancing is the new buzz word. I guess I take social interaction for granted. I am an introvert and find being alone with my dog pleasant. But now that social distancing is in force and most activities civil and religious are being canceled, I am starting to get edgy. First problem: I usually watch a lot of news, but they keep repeating the same thing and dwell on COVID-19 (Corona Virus Identified in 2019), so I've stopped watching the news. I switch to catching up on email and must get 30 messages a day from businesses explaining their new cleaning procedures. So now when I need a break I try to find a decent comedy. Better path: It is a time for reflection. The Desert. Jesus spent 40 days in the desert. The Desert Fathers (3rd century) and other Christian hermits. St Francis in the cave. Perhaps for us, this period of social distancing provides extra time to work on prayer, meditation and contemplation. I keep dwelling on one of St. Francis' Admonition:

XIII. PATIENCE

- 1. Blessed are the peacemakers for they shall be called the children of God (Mt. 5:9). The servant of God cannot know how much patience and humility he has within himself as long as everything goes well with him.
- 2. But when the time comes in which those who should do him justice do quite the opposite to him, he has only as much patience and humility as he has on that occasion and no more.

So how much patience do I have sitting at home missing many of my normal activities. Not as much as I thought I had. Beyond social distancing, restricting travel is vital to keeping this virus from peaking too fast. If you think Maryland is over-reacting, please take time to read and understand:

The St Francis Missal

Walters Art Museum, 600 N. Charles St, Baltimore, MD February 1, 2020 - May 31, 2020 (The Walters Art Museum will remain closed through March 31st)

The St. Francis Missal—a legendary 12th-century manuscript and relic of touch of St. Francis of Assisi—will have its first dedicated exhibition at the Walters Art Museum in more than 40 years.

In 1208, St. Francis of Assisi and two followers were debating what God's plan for them might be. Unable to agree, they sought answers at the church of San Nicolò in Assisi, where Francis often attended. They opened

the Missal, which sat on the altar, three times at random and in every case, the text on the page urged renouncing earthly goods. This pivotal moment laid the foundation for the Franciscan order.

Due to this possible contact with the saint, Franciscans worldwide consider the book now known as the St. Francis Missal a relic of touch, and many make pilgrimages to Baltimore to see it.
