This is the third and final of three articles on our Father Francis's deep devotion to prayer from my writings of my spiritual assistant's training. It is based on the tenth chapter of St. Bonaventure's, "The Major Life of Saint Francis".

Francis considered it a serious fault to allow one's mind to wander or harbor empty thoughts especially while praying. When he experienced this, he immediately confessed it and atoned for it. This was an efficient practice for him in that it minimized distractions to his prayer practices and life.

As we are currently into the Lenten season, Francis, during one of these seasons, made a dish to hold some articles to keep them from being lost. But when thoughts of this dish came to his mind during his prayer time, he trough it into the fire making it a sacrifice fore him deeming it to be an interference with his precious moments with God. He then prayed the Psalms, being seized with passionate surges of feeling each and every time he said God's name.

He honored God's name whenever he came across it. He was known to instruct his friars to pick up any piece of paper lying around and put them aside out of fear that God's name might be written on them and should not be tread on. He became filled with joy at every mention of the name of Jesus.

Three years before he met Sister Death, Francis celebrated the birth of Jesus at the Greccio (my Angelus article of last December). He obtained the people's permission for this celebration so as not to display it as an object of entertainment. All of the friars and people were invited to come and participate in the celebration and praise God. Francis stood before the crib virtually overcome with compassion. The mass was celebrated in song: Francis even sung the Gospel. He preached about the poor king, the Babe of Bethlehem, tenderly.

A knight who was a friend of Francis, having given up his profession for the love of Christ, said he saw the child asleep in the crib, but awoke when Francis took him in his arms. This witness proved to have

actually occurred. The display of reverence for the Child Jesus by Francis raised the hearts of all who were weak in faith. The hay of the crib was known to provide cures to sick animals and warded off pestilences when kept by the people. These on-going miracles were God's way of giving glory to His servant Francis and showed the people the authenticity of his prayers.


St. Agnellus of Pisa — March 13



He was welcomed into the Franciscans by Saint Francis himself who then sent him to start a Franciscan mission in Paris. He also began a Franciscan English Province in Oxford and became good friends with King Henry III.

St. Joseph of Aremathea — March 18

This is Joseph from the Bible who requested that the body of Jesus be taken down from the cross and given to him for burial. He gave his own tomb to the body of Our Lord and was called righteous and virtuous. For this reason, he is the patron saint of funeral directors.



St. Joseph — March 19

Joseph is the foster father of Jesus, and husband of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

He's man who taught the Christ Child the skills of carpentry and guided him in the
Jewish faith.

Joseph is the ultimate model of manhood, fatherhood, and discipleship. It's fitting that we celebrate this great man during the time of Lent, when he had to give so much of himself and his desires to ensure the safety of Jesus and Mary.





St. Patrick of Ireland is one of the world's most popular saints. He was born in Roman Britain and when he was fourteen or so, he was captured by Irish pirates during a raiding party and taken to Ireland as a slave to herd and tend sheep. At the time, Ireland was a land of Druids and pagans but Patrick turned to God and wrote his memoir, The Confession. In The Confession, he wrote:

"The love of God and his fear grew in me more and more, as did the faith, and my soul was rosed, so that, in a single day, I have said as many as a hundred prayers and in the night, nearly the same. I prayed in the woods and on the mountain, even before dawn. I felt no hurt from the snow or ice or rain."

SPIRITUAL ASSISTANTS LENTEN MESSAGE



This is the second of three articles on our Father Francis's deep devotion to prayer from my writings of my spiritual assistant's training and based upon the tenth chapter of St. Bonaventure's, "The Major Life of Saint Francis".

Our Prayerful Role of Hope

Saint Bonaventure said: "Three things are necessary to everyone: truth that brings understanding, love of Christ which brings compassion, and endurance of hope which brings perseverance". Amongst other things, the season of Lent traditionally involves refocusing and renewing our faith with deeper experiences of prayer, thus strengthening our prayer lives. It is also important to remember that Christians are called to live in hope. So, as we progress through this Lenten season, let us work to become more understanding, compassionate, and faithful by developing a stronger habit of hope.

As I have shared with you since the beginning of this year my writing on Our Father Francis's fervent prayer life, let's look at ours in light of this Lenten season. Some may have noticed that I wear a blue bracelet inscripted with St. Padre Pio's well-revered phrase, "Pray, hope, and don't worry". This famous saying of his is telling us that emphasizing our hope in God through prayer will give us the comfort we always desire. We pray because we are both reliant and confident in God. We, as good Christians and Franciscans, our usual traditional prayers, but we also pray the Scriptures, or God's own words. Some of these hope-promoting Scripture passages could include:

- "We who have taken refuge might be strongly encouraged to hold fast to the hope that lies before us. This we have as an anchor of the soul, sure and firm." (Hebrews 6:18-19)
- Rejoice in hope, endure in affliction, persevere in prayer". (Romans 12:12)
- May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit." (Romans 15:13)
- "Let us hold unwaveringly to our confession that gives us hope, for he who made the promise is trustworthy". (Hebrews 10: 12)

SPIRITUAL ASSISTANT'S LENTEN MESSAGE

The first passage above refers to hope as, "an anchor of the soul". During the time of the ancient Roman persecution of Christians, the anchor was adopted as a Christian symbol because of its similarity to the shape of a cross. It was found inscripted on the walls of the catacombs as well as homes representing hope to Christians without drawing attention to the Roman authorities. Since that time, the anchor cross can be found in many Catholic and non-Catholic Christian churches, reminding us of hope and encouragement in Christ. We use it as an inspiration to prayerfully meditate for hope in our stormy times in life. When we do realize it, let us practice it and find renewal in the resulting Easter season when we celebrate the glorious and joyful resurrection of Christ.
