#### MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Peace and all good!



As you probably already know, the month of June is dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. This is perhaps one of the most identifiable images in our Church and in our culture — an image that almost immediately says "Catholic". But in my experience, those of other denominations also find it appealing. Indeed, I did, too, before I converted to Catholicism.

Why is that? What makes this particular depiction of Jesus so engaging?

Well, the *Directory on Popular Piety and the Liturgy* — issued by the Vatican's Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments — says this:

"Understood in the light of the Scriptures, the term 'Sacred Heart of Jesus' denotes the entire mystery of Christ, the totality of his being, and his person considered in its most intimate essential: Son of God, uncreated wisdom; infinite charity, principal of the salvation and sanctification of mankind. The 'Sacred Heart' is Christ, the

Word Incarnate, Saviour, intrinsically containing, in the Spirit, an infinite divine-human love for the Father and for his brothers."

Yes; that's the theological version.

But our own very human hearts are not necessarily responding to the Sacred Heart by way of a theological proposition. No, our response is one of love. And that love is reflected back to us in the heart of Jesus.

Take a look at the Sacred Heart image above (which I will be sending you a holy card of during June). This is a wounded heart. It bleeds. It is pierced. It is encircled by a crown of thorns. It has experienced the physical and spiritual rejection of mankind. And yet, it is literally on fire — still on fire with love for humanity, in spite of all that. Jesus' Sacred Heart is like a furnace of love — love for us, with all of our weaknesses, and all of our strengths.

That, I think, is why this image is so popular. And why it is one that can accompany us, and remind us of Jesus' infinite love, throughout the whole year — not just in June.

Thanks to all Tau brothers and sisters for your enthusiastic adaptation to our new Coronavirus-induced "virtual" community! While videoconferencing is not a substitute for in-person gatherings and fellowship, it is the safest path for us for the immediate future. When will we be able to meet at St. Joseph again? That's still not clear. Your Council will be observing the directions of the relevant authorities as we move forward through this unusual time, and we will be in regular communication as there are new developments.

#### FORMATION

Walter Gawlak, OFS began ongoing formation by asking if members like the new book we are reading – *Francis and Clare: ATrue Story* by Jon M. Sweeney. Some highlights from the discussion are:

- During the coronavirus, we are being forced to old ways of prayer and penance, like Clare.
- Poverty is being in the present, living in the moment, not dwelling in the past or worrying about the future.

• We are facing uncertainty, similar to what Francis encountered.

Walter then lead us into a discussion on the first three chapters. He asked the following questions:

#### Chapter 1:

- Have you experienced the joy-filled spirit of Francis and Clare or has isolation, uncertainty, and anxiety made it too difficult?
- Have you figured out how to live more like Jesus?

#### Chapter 2:

• Are Francis and Clare more or less relatable if they are asexual as presented in the chapter?

#### Chapter 3:

• Francis' encounter with the leper revealed a number of spiritual insights. Which meant the most to you?

Lastly, Walter asked if the reading led members to read the Rule.

Next month, read Chapters 4 through 6. We will discuss.

#### MISSIONARIES OF CHARITY HOSPICE APOSTOLATE

Please continue to keep in prayer the patients and the work of the Sisters at the Gift of Peace House, a hospice run by the Missionaries of Charity Sisters in Washington, DC. Tau Fraternity volunteers continue their work to support the hospice patients throughout these early days of the pandemic. In the coming months, we will do "curbside drop offs" of a meal cooked by volunteers at home instead of in the hospice kitchen and delivered directly to the Gift of Peace House.

We delivered a meal in May and are scheduled to cook and deliver another meal for the patients in June, with a date to be determined on or around June 20. (Note this is not our regular day.) Only a couple volunteers are needed for June, to help cook a side dish at home (to be picked up curbside by Joe). Pat will recontact Fraternity members who volunteered but were not needed in May. Over time, we will need lots of help. (Of course, please volunteer only if you are virus free, and have no symptoms or contact with someone who has the virus, as the hospice patients are especially vulnerable.)

Finally, at the time of this writing, know that the hospice patients and Sisters are all safe. Pat reports that the Sisters say that not a single patient or Sister has had the virus, as they stay in strict quarantine. Praise the Lord! The Sisters remain grateful for our prayers, and especially appreciate our help with meals as they have had no on-site volunteers as part of their efforts to keep patients virus-free.

Thanks to St John Neumann Church for its financial support, and also to those volunteers who cooked or donated food for the meal in May.

### Pope joins interreligious prayer, begging God to end pandemic

ROME - At a time of global "tragedy and suffering" because of the coronavirus, and in view of the long-term impact it will have, believers of every religion should beg mercy from the one God and father of all, Pope Francis said.

During his early morning Mass, Pope Francis joined leaders of every religion marking May 14 as a day of prayer, fasting and acts of charity to ask God to stop the coronavirus pandemic.

Some people might think, "It hasn't affected me; thank God I'm safe.' But think about others! Think about the tragedy and also about the economic consequences, the consequences on education," the pope said in his homily.

"That is why today everyone, brothers and sisters from every religious tradition are praying to God," he said.

The day of prayer was called for by the Higher Committee of Human Fraternity, an international group of religious leaders formed after Pope Francis and Sheikh Ahmad el-Tayeb, grand imam of al-Azhar, signed a document in 2019 on promoting dialogue and "human fraternity."

During the pope's Mass, livestreamed from the chapel of the Domus Sanctae Marthae, he said he could imagine some people would say that gathering believers of all religions to pray for a common cause "is religious relativism, and you can't do it."

"But how can you not pray to the Father of all?" he asked.

"We are all united as human beings, as brothers and sisters, praying to God each according to our own culture, traditions and beliefs, but brothers and sisters praying to God," the pope said. "This is important: brothers and sisters fasting, asking God to pardon our sins so that the Lord would have mercy on us, that the Lord would forgive us, that the Lord would stop this pandemic."

But Pope Francis also asked people to look beyond the coronavirus pandemic and recognize that there are other serious situations bringing death to millions of people.

"In the first four months of this year, 3.7 million people died of hunger. There is a pandemic of hunger," he said, so when asking God to stop the COVID-19 pandemic, believers should not forget the "pandemic of war, of hunger" and so many other evils spreading death.

"May God stop this tragedy, stop this pandemic," he prayed. "May God have mercy on us and also stop other awful pandemics: those of hunger, war, children without education. And we ask this as brothers and sisters, all together. May God bless us and have mercy on us."



#### **BOOK REVIEW**

Jesus and the Dead Sea Scrolls, John Bergsma, PhD



This modest-sized readable book describes how the Dead Sea Scrolls provide a living connection between the Old and New Testaments, and between some Jewish practices of the inter-Testament period and the forms taken by the early Church. Subjects covered are: Baptism; the Eucharist; matrimony and

celibacy; Holy Orders; the Church, from St. Paul through the Reformation to the present day; and how the Scrolls shed new light on things about the Gospel of John that have always defied explanation. Though deceptively simple, to me the book's insights seemed brilliant – a synthesis that could be a major contribution to both Old and New Testament studies. (Caution – I'm not a Scripture scholar and might be a little off in this perception.) At the very least, he makes this subject accessible and interesting to the laity.

Dr. Bergsma is a professor of theology at the Franciscan University of Steubenville. He specializes in the study of the Old Testament and the Dead Sea Scrolls. He's a popular lecturer at Franciscan University, and it's easy to see why!
