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# **ADMONITION OF ST. FRANCIS**

### **23.** On humility $^1$

Blessed (is) the servant, who is found to be as humble among his own subjects, as when for example he would be among his own lords. Blessed (is) the servant, who always remains continually under the rod of correction. A faithful and prudent servant is he (cf. Mt 24:45), who in all (circumstances) does not delay to punish his own offenses interiorly by means of contrition and exteriorly by means of confession and works of satisfaction.

Last month we disbursed \$133.82 in expenses, of which \$75 was for our apostolate. Donations for last month had not yet been deposited.



# The Information Corner

May 17th – Feastday of St. Paschal of Baylon<sup>4</sup>



Born on Pentecost in 1540 in Spain of poor but pious parents, Paschal from an early age appeared to be endowed with all the gifts of the Holy Spirit. He was joyfully attentive, obedient, understood divine truths and had a zeal for virtue.

As a boy, Paschal tended the cattle of strangers. He was well liked and respected by other boys his age. As he grew into a strong young man, his employer wanted to adopt him. Paschal, though, wished to remain poor and to consecrate himself to God's service as a religious.

At the age of 24 Paschal was admitted as a lay brother at the convent of the Friars Minor at Monteforte. Here Pascahl exhibited many virtues: humility, charity, hard work, and devotion to prayer.

Paschal always had his rosary in his hand and God in his heart. He fostered special devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, whom he called his Mother, and to the Blessed Sacrament, and it proved a constant means to rekindle his zeal.

God showed how pleased He was with this devotion: while Pascal was in the field, He presented Paschal with a vision of the Blessed Sacrament in a monstrance supported by hovering angels.

In the convent church Paschal frequently lie prostrate before the tabernacle or rapt in ecstasy. The simple brother, who had never learned to read or write, could discourse about the deepest mysteries of religion with marvelous insight. He was even sent on a very important matter to the general of the order.

Paschal died at Villareal on Pentecost, the feast on which he was born, May 17, 1592, during high Mass in the convent church, at the moment of the elevation of the Sacred Host.

At the funeral Mass, as the Blessed Sacrament was elevated, Paschal's dead body raised itself, bowed to the Sacred Host, and then lowered itself again. This was witnesed by many.

When his body was exhumed years later, there was no decay, no foul odor, and the limbs were supple and flexible. Numerous other miracles occurred at his grave.

Pope Paul V beautified Paschal and Pope Alexander VIII canonized him in 1690. Pope Leo XIII in 1897 made Saint Paschal of Baylon patron of all Eucharistic societies and congresses.

### **May Reflection**

#### Vessel of Honor: Mary and the Eucharist

This month I was moved to highlight St. Paschal of Baylon, not knowing why. Upon reading his story, I was impressed with his devotion to the Eucharist. Later I realized I had not chosen a theme, and this being May, something Marian was appropriate. In this manner I was led to consider the relation between Mary and the Eucharist.

At first, I thought there to be little direct relation, since Mary was not present when Our Lord established the Eucharist as a sacrament.

As I considered it more, though, I realized two things: Our Lord is fully present in the Eucharist, and after the Annunciation He was fully present in our Blessed Mother as well. This far predated the initiation of the sacrament!

One of the many titles our Blessed Mother has is Vessel of Honor. This, too, made me consider this relation. The chalice is made of gold, a noble metal, called this by chemists because it does not interact with other chemicals, and thus keeps the Blessed Sacrament from any impurities. Mary, due to her Immaculate Conception, is a such a noble vessel as well, she being free from all sin and keeping Our Lord, while in her womb, free from any contact with anything impure.

O noblest of women! O Vessel of Honor who held Jesus so lovingly, both before and after his birth! Pray for us, that we too may receive Jesus.

I close with the prayerful words of Pope Benedict XVI (*Deus Caritas Est 42*):

Holy Mary, Mother of God, you have given the world its true light, Jesus, your Son – the Son of God. You abandoned yourself completely to God's call and thus became a wellspring of the goodness which flows forth from him. Show us Jesus. Lead us to him. Teach us to know and love him, so that we too can become capable of true love and be fountains of living water in the midst of a thirsting world.
