#### A few notes for Teleconference etiquette:

If you can mute your audio from your side, please do so. The organizer of the meeting (me) has capability to mute people as a group or individually. I hate to do this in case you have something to say! However when we pray the Liturgy of the Hours I may mute everyone except for those who are participants.

Although it is helpful to have a beverage nearby, please be mindful of slurping, crunching ice, etc.

Snacking while in a teleconference is considered impolite, unless everyone is eating! Besides, crunching and chewing anything is much louder than you think!

It is important to remember that only one person can speak at a time. Even the natural reactive "uhhuh's" and "yep's" when done by others on a call congests the conversation and it gets difficult to hear.

If you are on mute, a neat trick is if you wish to speak just hold down your spacebar on your keyboard while you speak. Once done speaking let go of the spacebar and it goes back to mute.

## Gospel to Life: Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

First Reading Deuteronomy 8:2-3, 14B-16A

Responsorial Psalm Psalm 147:12-13, 14-15, 19-20

Second Reading First Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians 10:16-17

Gospel John 6:51-58

Jesus said to the Jewish crowds: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world."

The Jews quarreled among themselves, saying, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" Jesus said to them, "Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him. Just as the living Father sent me and I have life because of the Father, so also the one who feeds on me will have life because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven. Unlike your ancestors who ate and still died, whoever eats this bread will live forever."
