Oct 5th – Feastday of Anna Schäffer⁴

In the person of Anna Schäffer we encounter a woman who, in spite of excruciating physical suffering – at the age of 18 she lost the use of her legs – and her material poverty, managed to live her life with profound love for God and her neighbour. The mystery of Anna's



earthly existence is found in her deep and steadfast relationship with Christ. The desire to become a religious missionary burned within her. Through the decades she was bedridden and thus was able to recognize her vocation as a "mission of suffering".

Anna Schäffer's life and character can only be understood through her great love for Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament. She made a profession of faith by writing: "My greatest strength is the Holy Eucharistic communion". It was here that she found the strength she needed to give herself through the wider apostolate of prayer and consolation, both by word and writing. She died on 5 October 1925 and was beatified 7 March 1999.

With Anna Schaffer the question of the meaning of suffering is raised. Anna lived and experienced personally the words we read in the Letter of St Paul to the Colossians: "Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I complete what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the Church" (Col 1:24). Through Christ she was able to accept the mystery of the Cross in love and gratitude. Anna Schaffer is an open portal that welcomes all those who are suffering. She shows that the fate of an incurable disease can be born through trust in Christ. In her troubled life, the great Christian truth was revealed: that

human beings are loved by God especially in suffering.

Fall is officially here with its cool weather and the leaves changing colors! Here, too, the semester is in full swing. A few weeks ago was my first time cantoring at this new seminary and the first time publicly singing for some



months. Prior to seminary, I studied and semi-professionally, performed opera singing in front of an audience, congregation, or general crowd was never much of an issue. However, something was different this first time cantoring again. As the organ began at the start of Mass, I stood there and realized how heavy and labored my breathing was getting. Rather, I must always know that it's about God, our love for and offering of ourselves to Him, and our love for Him through loving our brothers and sisters. May we remember, especially now, our call to see and serve Christ in each person and to live every moment leaning fully on God who is our everything. May God bless you all abundantly.
