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ADMONITION OF ST. FRANCIS

1. The Body of the Lord ¹

The Lord Jesus said to His disciples: "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life; no one comes to the Father except through Me." "If" you know "Me," you would know "My Father as well; and from now on you shall know Him and have seen Him." "Philip said to Him: Lord, show us the Father, and that suffices for us." "Jesus said to him: So much time I have been with you, and you do not known Me? Philip, he who sees Me, sees even" My "Father" (Jn 14:6-9). The Father dwells "in inaccessible light" (cf. 1 Tm 6:16), and "God is spirit" (Jn 4:24), and "no one ever sees God" (Jn 1:18).

Chapter Two, Article 19 of The Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order.

The Information Corner

Nov 19th – Feastday of Saint Elizabeth of Hungary, Patroness of the Secular Franciscan $Order^4$

Born in 1207 to pious Andrew II of King Hungary, Elizabeth was lovable that so the wealthy landgrave of Thuringia and Hesse sought her as the bride of his eldest son Louis. His request was granted, and a solemn embassy went to get Elizabeth, only three years old, so she



could be raised at her future husband's castle.

The two children loved each other like brother and sister, and vied with each other in acts of piety and charity. Elizabeth's greatest joy was to give things to the poor. When she grew a little older, she visited the poor and the sick, and waited on them with as much reverence as if she were serving Christ Himself.

Louis succeeded his father at the age of 18, took over the government and married Elizabeth. Their marriage was unusually happy, and Louis gave his wife full liberty to do all the good her heart desired. At Eisenach she built a large hospital, and during a famine she daily fed nine hundred needy people.

Once when Elezabeth was on her way with her cloak full of good things for her dear poor and sick, she met her husband, and showed him, to his great astonishment, that she was carrying fresh, fragrant roses in midwinter.

Elizabeth once took in a little leper boy and, after caring for him as if he were her own child, placed him in the royal bed, as Louis was away. Louis returned unexpectedly, and when he tore aside the bed covers, was moved to tears when he beheld the form of the Crucified. He said, "Dear Elizabeth, you may always receive guests like that. I shall even thank you for it."

In 1227, Emperor Frederick II set out on a crusade to the Holy Land, and Louis joined the expedition, but died on the way. When news reached Thuringia, Louis' brothers rose up against Elizabeth and drove her out of the palace, with only two faithful maids to accompany her.

In Eisenach the people dared not give her shelter. fearing the resentment of the new masters. So it was that in midwinter, with night at hand, the daughter of a king, a widowed princess, with four little children was completely destitute and homeless.



A man finally offered her shelter in a stable. The thought of how the Son of God found refuge in a stable filled Elizabeth with greater joy than she had ever experienced. She now spun flax for a livelihood, saving something from the meager income to give to the poor.

Later Elizabeth was reinstated in the Wartberg, and Emperor Frederick II, whose wife had died, asked her hand in marriage. But Elizabeth had so learned to love poverty and seclusion that she had no desire for worldly greatness. Her children were given the education due to princes, but she and her two maids repaired to a small house in Marburg. Elizabeth had joined the Third Order of St Francis during the lifetime of her husband; indeed, she was the first member in Germany. Now, vested with the habit and the cord, she led a quiet religious life, while nursing the sick in the hospitals.

Elizabeth died at age 24 on November 19, 1231, after a very short illness. Although the hardships she had experienced showed on her features, after death her face became smooth, majestic, and beautiful, more beautiful than any representations of her. (continued on p5)

While attending Mass at my parish on All Saints Day, I heard a quote that struck me and stayed with me. It was from French poet and writer Leon Bloy, who wrote, "**The only real** sadness, the only real failure, the only great tragedy in life, is not to become a saint."

We are all called – indeed, destined – to be saints, to take our place with our heavenly Father after our Earthly life has concluded. We were created with a destiny to be united with Him, a destiny we do not merit on our own, but are given to us out of love, as sons and daughters of the Almighty, so great is His love for us. It is up to us, in our lives, by our actions, to fulfill this destiny or to discard it.
