## **ADMONITION OF ST. FRANCIS**

#### 3. On Perfect Obedience <sup>1</sup>

The Lord says in the Gospel: "He who does not renounce all that he possesses, cannot be my disciple" (Lk 14:33); and: "He who will have wanted to save his life, shall lose it" (Lk 9:24). That man abandons all that he possesses, and loses his own body, who offers himself whole to obedience in the hands of his prelate. And whatever he does and says, that he himself. knows, which is not contrary to his will, as long as what he does is good, is true obedience. And if at any time the subject sees better and more useful things for his own soul than those which the prelate precepts him, (see next column)

#### The Rule

Chapter Three, Article 21 of The Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order.

On various levels, each fraternity is animated and guided by a council and minister (or president) who are elected by the professed according to the constitutions.

Their service, which lasts for a definite period, is marked by a ready and willing spirit and is a duty of responsibility to each member and to the community.

Within themselves the fraternities are structured in different ways according to the norm of the constitutions, according to the various needs of their members and their regions, and under the guidance of their respective council.

## **The Information Corner**

**Feb 16th** – Feastday of Blessed Veridiana.<sup>4</sup>



Born in 1182 to a noble family near Florence, Veridiana's vocation was discernible even in her youth; she loved seclusion, and works prayer, penance. She grew in years and in grace, and her innocence and virtue won for

her the love and veneration of all who knew her.

As a young girl, Veridiana was sent to assist at the home of her uncle. She displayed good sense that was uncommon for one her age, and often practiced works of charity. Once in a famine she gave the poor a great quantity of beans from the storerooms, not knowing they had already been sold. When the buyer found the bins empty, her uncle reproached her bitterly. Veridiana, deeply grieved, prayed all night; in the morning the bins were again full.

News of this miracle spread far and wide. In order to avoid attention from all sides, Veridiana went on a pilgrimage to Compostela, in Spain, to the grave of St. James the Apostle, and later to the tombs of the Apostles in Rome.

Upon returning, Veridiana had a small cell (10ft x 3½ft) built by the chapel of St. Anthony in Florence. A small window opens upon the chapel, through which she could attend Mass, receive Holy Communion, and receive meals. She was only 26 when, escorted by her spiritual director, she entered the cell and permitted the door to be walled up. She spent the remaining years of her life as an anchoress in prayer and severe penance. Her bed was either the bare earth or a board with a block of wood serving as a pillow; her food bread, water and herbs.

In about 1222, when St. Francis was preaching penance in the vicinity of Florence, he visited

the poor anchoress, gave her the habit of the Third Order and many beautiful lessons on the proper way to live a contemplative life.

After a very saintly life in which she had been granted the gift of miracles, it was revealed to Veridiana the hour of her death. She prepared herself with the devout reception of the holy sacraments. While praying the penitential psalms she died on February 1, 1242, at age 60.

Moved by the extraordinary miracles that had occurred, Pope Clement VII approved the devotion to her in 1533, and later on Pope Innocent XII added his approbation in 1694.

#### **Light and Spouse**

St. Joseph's titles include ones not often heard. For example, **Light Amongst Patriarchs** if one of them. The Patriarchs are our fathers in faith, those elders of the Hebrew people, from Abraham, down through Isaac, Jacob, and eventually to Joseph. They gave form to and nurtured the Hebrew people, whom God had chosen as His Own, and are the forerunners of Christ. The prophets all point to the coming Messiah, the Redeemer. St. Joseph shines on their teaching and example, allowing one to realize the One to Whom all Scripture points and time tends.



Another title, which one *might* call common, is actually a compound title: **Spouse of the Mother of God**. Here St. Joseph is presented not only as the faithful spouse of his wife, Mary, but as the spouse of God's human Mother. As

if fatherhood and raising a family weren't challenge enough! St. Joseph is entrusted not only with the holiest of women, whom he has taken as his wife, but with the care of one in whom Our Lord would be Incarnate and come forth, to be of human estate.
