
Prayer of the Month

<u>The Information Corner</u> Mar 9th – Feastday of **St. Frances of Rome**⁴



St. Frances of Rome was born into a noble family in 1384. At 12 she married another Roman noble, Lorenzo Ponziani. She would have preferred to become a nun, but obeyed her father and became an exemplary wife and the mother of three children.

Soon after her marriage, St. Frances fell seriously ill, and St. Alexis appeared to her and cured her. From that time, St. Frances began to be conscious of the presence and assistance of her guardian angel.

At the little church of San Francesco a Ripa, near the Ponziani palace, Frances Ponziani was received into the Third Order of St. Francis.

At 17, St. Frances gave birth to her first son, John Baptist. Shortly afterwards her mother-in-law died, and St. Frances was placed in charge of the household; she carried out her duties efficiently but also in a genuinely Christian manner.

During a famine she gave corn to the poor, and gave the family's wine to any who asked. During the civil war which followed the 1410 invasion of Rome, nearby peasants begged St. Frances for food, which she gave readily. She devoted herself to the care of the sick, the starving, and the dying, and organized a group of Roman ladies to assist her.

Her second son, after his death, appeared to her and brought her an archangel to take the place of her guardian angel. The archangel's light was bright enough for her to read by it. When she committed a slight fault, the archangel would hide himself and his light would not shine again until she had made an act of contrition.

(Information Corner continued):

In 1425, St. Frances and other ladies were clothed as oblates of St. Benedict. This apparently did not cancel her membership in the Third Order; for she and a friend made a 100-mile pilgrimage to Assisi, where St. Francis himself appeared to them.

In 1433, after Lorenzo's death, St. Frances and her companions founded a religious community of Oblates. There they worked and prayed for the Holy Father and the peace of Rome, for the city was once more in turmoil.

Returning after a visit to her sick son, St. Frances suddenly became ill and was taken back to the Ponziani palace. She died seven days later, on March 9, 1440.

When her tomb was opened some months later, the saint was incorrupt, and her body gave off a delightful fragrance. In 1638 her tomb was opened again, but only the saint's bones remained.

Pope Paul V canonized Frances in 1608. She is honored as the principal patron of all Benedictine oblates, but is also one of the greatest saints who wore the habit of the Third Order of St. Francis.

March Reflection

Foster Father, Head of Family

This month I'll take up two more titles of St. Joseph, both of which are related to family.

The first is Foster Father of the Son of God. actually a compound title, and one with which we are quite familiar. When on a tour of the Monastery's shrines, we are introduced to St. Joseph as Foster Father of Our Savior. In our society we may consider a "foster" father - a one who takes the place of a father who is absent – as having a negative connotation: the child was not wanted. In St. Joseph, however, we have the best of this concept: a child who is loved so much that his Father gives Him into the care of another highly trusted individual, more akin to a tutor, for his earthly training, to shape the mind, heart and character of the child. There is no greater honor for a man than to be given such a responsibility. St. Joseph shows us how to do it well, and in that sense is an incredibly positive model for all men, in that he put aside his own wants and desires for the sake of the One for whom he cares.

This leads naturally to the other title: **Head of the Holy Family**. St. Joseph not only gives Jesus his all in raising, forming,



and caring for Him, but he also cares for, supports, and loves Mary, the Lord's Blessed Mother, who was betrothed to Joseph and yet gave her "Fiat" to the angel God had sent. St. Joseph accepted this, and in an honorable and loving manner cared for them both. He kept his family safe from trouble, listened attentively to God's messages, and instructed his foster son by word and example; things that are the responsibility of the head of a family.

How Mary must have cherished such a man! What a blessed example we have to all men – single and married – as we have in St. Joseph!
