A PRAYER OF OSCAR ROMERO

A prayer in celebration of the canonization of St. Archbishop Oscar Romero. St. Romero reminds us in his homilies, and in his actions, that Jesus stands always with those who suffer from poverty, injustice, violence, and hunger. This prayer was composed by Bishop Ken Untener of Saginaw, Michigan, and drafted for a homily by Cardinal John Dearden in Nov. 1979 for a celebration of departed priests. As a reflection on the anniversary of the martyrdom of Bishop Romero, Bishop Untener included it in a reflection book. The passage is titled "The mystery of the Romero Prayer." The "mystery" [is that the words of the prayer are attributed to Oscar Romero, but they were never spoken by him.

This prayer was read by the keynote speaker at the Baltimore Social Ministry Conference.

It helps, now and then, to step back and take a long view. The Kingdom is not only beyond our efforts, it is even beyond our vision. We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work. Nothing we do is complete, which is a way of saying that the Kingdom always lies beyond us. No statement says all that could be said. No prayer fully expresses our faith. No confession brings perfection. No pastoral visit brings wholeness. No program accomplishes the Church's mission. No set of goals and objectives includes everything. This is what we are about. We plant the seeds that one day will grow. We water seeds already planted, knowing that they hold future promise. We lay foundations that will need further development. We provide yeast that produces effects far beyond our capabilities. We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that. This enables us to do something, and to do it very well. It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest. We may never see the end results, but that is the difference between the master builder and the worker. We are workers, not master builders: ministers, not messiahs. We are prophets of a future that is not our own. Amen.

BOOK REVIEW: from Joan Faltot



Did you enjoy the You Tube video "Don't Give Anything Up for Lent" presented by Casaey Cole, OFM? <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=IH1CMXYPi_w</u>

I have been gradually reading his book <u>Called</u>, <u>What Happens After</u> <u>Saying Yes to God</u>. This is a collection of what Cole wrote on his blog page as he journeyed to become a friar, and explores his decision to continue training to be ordained a priest. I am not a great reader; mild dyslexia runs in the family. The book has been arranged in chapters; then further divided into topics that run about two pages in length. I enjoy reading a topic and using it for prayerful reflection.

The topics covered are suitable for anyone trying to live a Christcentered life: how to discern God's call, how to pray, poverty, relationships, building up the kingdom of God. He shares his wonder, sorrow and joy, challenges and encouragement. It's hard to describe this book, but I enjoy it. I can ignore it for a month and

then pick up where I left off at the next topic and continue on from there.

Published by Franciscan Media, it has 192 pages, and is light enough to travel with. It is available through Amazon in paperback, Kindle, or audiobook format, and has a 4.6 out of 5-star rating.



THE PEACE PRAYER OF ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI

During a formation lesson many years ago, I learned that St. Francis did not write the prayer (Lord make me an instrument of your peace...). I was informed that it was written by a bishop in New York. So after searching the web for the Prayer of Oscar Romeo (which was not written by Oscar Romeo), I decided to try and find the name of the Bishop that wrote the Prayer of St. Francis. I found the following in Wikipedia https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Prayer_of_Saint_Francis

The earliest known publication of the prayer appeared in 1912 written in French in a small spiritual magazine called *La Clockette* (*The Little Bell*) published in Paris by the Catholic organization, The League of the Holy Mass (La League de la Sainte-Messe). No author was given though some have speculated that the editor of the magazine, Fr. Esther Bouquerel, was the author. The prayer was heavily publicized during World Wars I & II.

The first known English version of the prayer appeared in the Quaker magazine *Friends' Intelligencer* in January 1917, with the misspelled title Prayer of St. Francis of Assissi. American Archbishop and Military Vicar, Francis Spellman, distributed millions of copies of the prayer during World War II. It has since been quoted by many leaders world-wide, composed in several songs, and even read into the Congressional Record by Senator Albert W. Hawkes.

A friar summarized the relationship between the prayer and St. Francis: "One can safely say that although he is not the author, it resembles him and would not have displeased him." However, a church historian disagrees, saying the style of the prayer is not like St. Francis. Each line of the prayer has the words either "me" or "I" and the words "God" or "Jesus" never appear once, only "Master." The structure of the second part of the prayer, however, is similar to the *Golden Sayings* of Blessed Giles of Assisi:

Blessed is he who loves and does not therefore desire to be loved; Blessed is he who fears and does not therefore desire to be feared; Blessed is he who serves and does not therefore desire to be served; Blessed is he who behaves well toward others and does not desire that others behave well toward him; And because these are great things, the foolish do not rise to them.

HONORING ST. JOSEPH



The following is the closing prayer to the Apostolic letter *Patris Corde* by His Holiness Pope Francis on the 150th Anniversary of the Proclamation of St. Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church.

Hail, Guardian of the Redeemer, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. To you God entrusted his only Son; in you Mary placed her trust; with you Christ became man.

Blessed Joseph, to us too, show yourself a father and guide us in the path of life. Obtain for us grace, mercy and courage, and defend us from every evil. Amen.

Given in Rome, on 8 December, Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary
