BOOK REVIEW: from Jean Gaes

Habits for Holiness: Small Steps for Making Big Spiritual Progress by Fr. Mark-Mary Ames, CFR



This book is changing my life. It is full of Franciscan wisdom and profound insights, written in ordinary language with a lay audience in mind. Most helpful for me was that Father Mark-Mary, at the very beginning of the book, suggests "note-taking:" putting a star by passages that touch your heart, going back to circle those things you intend to put into practice right now, and later rereading and repeating this procedure. Not surprisingly, *Habits for Holiness* begins with a powerful chapter on how to integrate prayer in the moments of each day. Subsequent topics include: family; Catholic culture and liturgical living; simplicity; love for the poor; priests by baptism; living a provocative life (prophets); cultivating happiness, healthiness, and holiness; renewal that lasts (the mechanics of conversion); and an examination of conscience for lay people trying to live a life of radical discipleship. The book is full of realistic, compassionate, common-sense advice. Amazon lists it as "temporarily out of stock." I am planning on ordering from Ascension Press so if you

MAY 1ST FEAST OF ST. JOSEPH THE WORKER

On May 1, 1955, Pope Pius XII established a new feast day in the Church's calendar, dedicating May 1 to "St. Joseph the Worker."

[As] the Vicar of Christ, we wish to reaffirm highly, on this day of May 1 ... the dignity of work, and [to] inspire

social life and laws, based on a fair share of rights and duties ... [We have determined to] establish the liturgical feast of St. Joseph the Worker, assigning it precisely on the 1st of May ... because the humble craftsman of Nazareth not only embodies the dignity of the arm of the worker ... he is also always the guardian of you and your families.

Prior to the Feast day's establishment, Pope St. Pius X, composed a prayer to "St. Joseph the Worker." His prayer, shown below, recognizes the dignity of work and how it can be offered to God as a sacrifice, pleasing in His sight. St. Joseph has always been the supreme example of this type of holy work, teaching his son, Jesus, how to work with great care and precision, giving to God his best work possible.

Before beginning your next workday, consider praying this simple, yet powerful prayer to St. Joseph. He will help you utilize your talents, turning the "daily grind" into something beautiful for God.

O Glorious St. Joseph, model of all who are devoted to labor, obtain for me the grace to work in the spirit of penance in expiation of my many sins; to work conscientiously by placing love of duty above my inclinations; to gratefully and joyously deem it an honor to employ and to develop by labor the gifts I have received from God, to work methodically, peacefully, and in moderation and patience, without ever shrinking

from it through weariness or difficulty to work;

above all, with purity of intention and unselfishness,

having unceasingly before my eyes death and the account I have to render

time lost,

talents unused,

good not done, and

vain complacency in success, so baneful to the work of God.

All for Jesus, all for Mary, all to imitate thee, O Patriarch St. Joseph!

This shall be my motto for life and eternity. Amen
