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Message from Vice Minister - Richard Churray, OFS

Blessings and peace be upon you! I pray all is well with each of you and that you have had time to visit family members. I know for a Barbara and myself this has been the joy of the summer. We have been very busy visiting our grandchildren. In the upcoming months we have two weddings in Michigan and more visits to grandchildren. It is good to cautiously move back toward normal. I urge each of you if you have not been vaccinated to please get your vaccination. The Delta variant is very prevalent among people who have not been vaccinated! So please get vaccinated!

I would like to take some time to focus on the readings Sunday July 25, 2021. The central theme I see in these reading is about the limitations that I/we put on ourselves.

In the first reading Elijah tells a man to give 20 barley loaves to the people to eat. The man complains to Elijah how can I set this before a hundred people. The man is putting his own limitations on Elijah's request. There are 100 people before him and Elijah wants him to set down 20 barley loaves in front of 100 people! The man sounds fearful to me. Elijah works out of faith in God's word!

In the second reading Paul urges us to live in a manner worthy of the calling you have received. We must ask ourselves this question. As one being called to be a Secular Franciscan am I living in a manner worthy of the calling I have received?

In the gospel we see a similar theme from the first reading: a great crowd is before Jesus and Jesus asked Phillip where can we get enough food for them to eat? Phillip comes back with limitations about how much it'll cost to feed that many people. Andrew comes forward and says there's a little boy with five barley loaves and two fishes. This is followed by a limitation! What good are these for so many! We all know what Jesus went on to do!

So, I must ask myself how many times do I come up with my limitations first rather than looking at possible solutions. I put my limitations up whenever it comes to writing something. I think I'm not a very good writer, what do I know about that subject, it's too much work to put my thoughts into words and I could probably add a few more reasons! Putting up limitations make a task seem insurmountable! Think about our election of council members. How many of us thought of limitations to fulfilling a seat on the council before thinking of the reasons you could be a council member!

Remember what Paul said; I, a prisoner for The Lord, urge you to live in a manner worthy of the call you have received. We must live in faith that what God has put before us He will also give us what we need to complete the task!

August Formation




