Susan Greif for fast mending of her hip.



Directions to Sacred Heart Church in Bowie

The church is located on Route 450 west (Annapolis Rd) just west of Route 3 (Crain Highway). The church is visible from the road. If you see the church, then you have passed the driveway to go up the hill behind the church where we meet.

To reach the buildings on the Hill, turn left on lane **PRIOR** to the Church entrance/exit roads. If you miss it, use the church parking lot to make a U turn. Once back on Route 450 take the turn off on the right. There is parking by the chapel and cemetery. We will

meet in the chapel at 8:30AM. After the Mass we'll proceed to Whitemarsh Hall, the front room in the basement of the Hogan Center across from the chapel.



OUTREACH -- IMPORTANT NEWS ABOUT THE PHOENIX ACADEMY:

As some of you may remember, one of the apostolates that our Fraternity supports is the Food Backpack Program at the Phoenix Academy in Annapolis.

We chose this school because it was deemed most in need of help by the AA County Board of Education.

This Academy, which is a transitional school, supports children of all ages K-12 from all over the county. Some of the students come from unstable homes where lack of food is a problem. Some have to endure bus trips of an hour or more, each way, to attend



Monthly, a group from our Fraternity goes into the school to pack bags full of the food that we buy with your donations. The social workers at Phoenix Academy, with parental input, choose the children they feel are most in need. Fraternity members sort the items and pack a bag for each of these students. Every bag contains enough food to last a full weekend: 2 breakfasts, 2 lunches, 2 dinners, several snacks, and other goodies.

Because of the pandemic, we haven't been able to go to the school for over a year. However, now that the Phoenix Academy is open, the staff is asking us to continue our support for this vital program.

To help support this apostolate, please indicate in the "memo" section of your monthly donation to the Fraternity, whatever amount you can contribute. Of course, you can always volunteer to come to the school on the appointed day and help pack the supplies – It's quite an experience.

SAINT ELIZABETH OF HUNGARY (Feast Day - November 17)

We remember St. Elizabeth of Hungary as a Patron Saint of the Secular Franciscan Order, a woman who joined the Seculars in 1228. She spent the remaining few years of her life caring for the poor in a hospital which she founded in honor of St. Francis of Assisi.

Denise found this additional information in the book "All Soul's Forget-me-not!" by Rev Louis Gemminger

St. Elizabeth, daughter of King Andrew of Hungary and Queen Gertrude, had an extraordinary affection for the souls of the faithful departed. She frequently sewed with her own hands the shroud for the dead body or defrayed the funeral expenses of the poor; she also followed the funeral processions to the grave, praying fervently all the time, that the Lord might be a merciful Judge to His poor creatures. If any of her relations died, she redoubled her prayers and supplications. After the death of her mother, Queen Gertrude, she never ceased offering up her fervent prayers and good works for the repose of her soul. One night her dead mother appeared to her, with the most sorrowful expression of countenance, and said to her: 'My dear daughter, come to the assistance of thy poor suffering mother. Oh, help by the increase of thy prayers, for I am suffering frightful tortures, on account of the many sins for which I have not done penance. I implore thee, by all that I have ever done and suffered for thee, to do all thou canst to release me.'

Grieved and horrified Elizabeth immediately arose from her couch and, with many tears and prayers, appealed to the mercy of God. After a time, she was overcome by sleep in this act of charity. Then, she had a second vision of her mother, but this time she was quite different to behold. She was overflowing with joy and happiness, and from her lips poured words of thanks and blessings upon her daughter, because her fervent prayers had opened for her the

gates of Heaven.

Even while still a child, St. Elizabeth had the habit of leading her little playmates to the churchyard saying: "Just think, one day we, too, shall be dust." Then she would lead them to the charnel-house, and say: "Those people once lived and breathed as we do, and are now dead. We, too, shall die. Therefore, we are to love God very much and constantly pray to Him." Then, she would make them kneel around her, and she would say, "O my God, in memory of Thy painful death, and for the love Thy Blessed Mother, deliver the souls of the departed from their sufferings. O God, deliver them for the sake of Thy Five Holy Wounds!"

Some souls, Alas! In darkness lie, afar from God and light- sad lot I For them this little book must cry, "Forget-me-not! Forget-me-not!"

Oh, read its pages o-er and o-er! It urges thee to plead- to pray for those dear friends thou seest no more on earth, Alas! Alas, now where are they?
