#### Life is Messy by Matthew Kelly - review from Joe McHugh

This past Christmas, several parishes in the Baltimore-Washington area distributed to its parishioners as a gift a book entitled "Life is Messy" written by Mathew Kelly (founder of Dynamic Catholics). I didn't start to read this book as I was finishing a book I had from the County library. So, I started to read it around New Year's Eve or day, and after I read the first seven or eight pages, I thought 'Oh no, another "I'm okay, you're okay" book." I picked up the book the next day thinking I might have been too critical of it, and I was right. Mr. Kelly covers a number of issues related to life being messy, such as:

- Grief, which happens to everyone. And it doesn't make appointments. It has its own timetable.
- The normalization of evil. By definition, this is the reason for the escalation of evil in our world, although it might not be obvious at first. It all hinges on the immoral content found in our movies and television shows which continually interferes with our moral compass.
- Social media. Over the years it has evolved away from being a family- oriented platform with pictures of our kids first day at school, or the birth of new child. However, over time it has become a politicalized space where postings are broadcast without being fact-checked and come from individuals both foreign and domestic. This has caused a great rift in our country, leading to a "us vs. them" mentality.
- Gossip also takes its place within social media and the end result can be the destruction of one's reputation for the rest of one's life.

I strongly recommend that each of our Fraternity members read this book as it might reaffirm our vow to lead the Gospel life.

"...that in this way one can identify many good people of good will who might cause harm, but more out of ignorance than bad faith.


Personally, approaching another puts to rest many preconceived notions on the part of both one and the other."

Simple, thoughtful questions with a real interest to hear and understand the other could really go far to deepen unity.

#### The Beatitudes and Francis of Assisi: Bible Study of Matthew 5 -- part of The Hagios Study Series



St. John the Evangelist Church will be hosting a new Bible Study during Lent 2022 this year. Dates/time have yet to be announced.

The Beatitudes & Francis of Assisi is an 8-part Bible Study of Matthew 5:1-12, the section of scripture referred to as "The Beatitudes." These eight principles are explored through a pilgrimage of study with full-color images of the real places discussed in each section.

In this book, you'll also explore how these teachings influenced St. Francis of Assisi, a true example of a holy and intentional response to God's word. Pairing this Christian saint with how he responded to scripture gives us perspective on how we can apply Christ's teaching to our time and culture.

The Beatitudes and Francis of Assisi is the first study in the Hagios Study Series. The name come from the Greek word hagios meaning "holy, set apart by God, saint."

- Four sections each week provide well-paced progression:
  - Read Explore the featured verse by viewing it alongside supporting verses. By comparing verses that share the same words across the Greek versions of the Old and New Testament you will better understand the English translation and how these parallel verses give insight into the main reading.
  - \* Reflect View a skillfully crafted meditation video on the Hagios Study mobile app along with short reflections from early Church Fathers to aid you in journaling your thoughts on the readings.
  - Respond Discover the story of a Christian brethren and how they responded to the main scripture for the week. Approachable questions will aid you in prayerfully determining application to your life.
  - Rest The final section brings together all the previous three sections for a moment of final considerations.

    Begin by listening to a contemporary praise song on the mobile app while meditating on the verses from the week. Then finish with an inspired prayer from our communion of saints.
- Discussion questions for small groups or personal reflection
- Journal pages

#### FRANCISCAN CENTER NEEDS OUR HELP

The following email from received from the Franciscan Center on January  $7^{th}$ . The council has approved a donation of \$1,000 to the Franciscan Center in the name of our fraternity.

In the nearly 22 months between the start of the government-led response to Covid 19 in mid-March 2020 and the beginning of 2022, the Center tripled the number of people it feeds on an average day and started its first-ever delivery program, providing meals to homeless encampments, senior centers, and public-housing residents in need.

Volunteers took the lead in preparing more than a thousand sandwiches a week, in addition to the hot, scratch-made meals our incredible kitchen crew provided our guests. Remarkably, in all of 2020 and 2021, only one Franciscan Center staff member became ill with Covid.

Unfortunately, since January 1st, seven of our colleagues – nearly a third of our staff – have gone into quarantine after testing positive. As a result, we've instituted new protocols to seek to prevent the further spread of the virus, including temporarily suspending our volunteer program.

This is a critical loss of helping hands at the worst possible time: in the middle of winter. Nonetheless, we are committed to making sure our guests continue to receive meals and other services they need to sustain their lives and improve their circumstances.

To get it done, we're going to take on at least an additional \$15,000 in expenses we hadn't anticipated: longer hours for current staff, temporary staff, an even stronger emphasis on keeping our work spaces "Covid clean," buying additional rapid testing kits, masks and sanitizer and helping our team mates who are currently suffering from having COVID19.
