Minister's Message

In December, I heard many comments that people were glad to see 2021 ending after a year of Covid-19 illness, deaths, restrictions and shut downs. With the arrival of 2022, things don't seem to be greatly improved with the new Covid variant of Omicron. A myriad of other issues political, cultural, economic, social and world affairs add to the havoc the virus is causing. The end result for many is fear, discontentment, confusion and perhaps anger depending on what the focus is at the time. (By anger I do not include righteous anger but rather refer to anger that would be displeasing to God or destructive in nature emotionally, physically or spiritually). These negative emotions or states of being are not of God and we should ask for God's grace to dispel them.

Listening to the news oftentimes provides the spark that sets aflame these negative feelings and moods. Although we don't wish to be ignorant of what is going on in our community, country and world, it is wise to limit how much we dwell upon what we hear on the news. While praying evening prayer on January 9th,

Psalm 112:7-8 resonated with me. The psalmist starts off in verse 1 " Happy the man who fears the Lord" and then in verse 7-8, "He has no fear of evil news, with a firm heart, he trusts in the Lord." A firm heart to me means a heart filled with faith and hope in and love for Jesus Christ. How wise and true are the words of Scripture. Through prayer and love of Jesus, the stronger the virtues of faith, hope and love become. Love engenders trust because we trust those we love.

Whatever is happening in the world, we know the Lord is with us. We try to act with prudence and good judgement. We best serve ourselves and others by focusing on Jesus not on displeasure permeated by the news; focusing on Love not fear. Prayer and God's grace will fortify us. As Franciscans, joy should remain in our hearts. The story of Francis conveying the meaning of perfect joy to Brother Leo is appropriate in our present time. No matter what is happening in the current circumstances of our personal life or in the world around us, we need to have joy. The perfect joy Francis spoke about is not celebratory joy, fun, laughter or always being in a happy mood. Rather it is the calm,

steady assurance that comes from within of God's love and care us no matter what storms and trials we experience. Let us remember God's words, "Fear not, for I am with you, be not dismayed for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you. I will uphold you with my victorious right hand." Isaiah. 41:10.

Jesus we place our trust in You.
