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Minister's Message

Peace and all good!

"For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead." (John 20:9)

On Easter Sunday, we will hear this passage from the Gospel of John proclaimed.

I'm not sure about you, but every year at Easter, when I think — *truly* think; that is, ponder deeply — about Christ resurrected from the dead, my brain does a tiny backflip. It's almost as if I feel, for an instant, that I'm in a cognitive free fall; that all the things I think I know are somehow not as sure or solid as they seemed.

Perhaps that's how the women at the tomb briefly felt, before they ran to tell the shocking news. Or, maybe it's something like Thomas' reaction; he couldn't trust his own eyes until Christ invited him to "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." (John 20:27)

The Resurrection is the central tenant of our faith — indeed, St. Paul says, "and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain." (1 Cor. 15:14)

And yet...

Possibly, like me, you've been queried, "But you don't *really* believe that, do you?" Even some highly credentialed theologians have gone so far as to cast the Resurrection in symbolic terms; as a signifier of a surely wondrous spiritual incident, yet not meant to be taken literally.

But as journalist Brandon Ambrosino wrote in the *Huffington Post* almost a decade ago, "Does it matter... if Jesus' resurrection is interpreted metaphorically? My answer [is] that it matters a great deal, since a Jesus whose physical body remains in the grave gives me no hope for a physically broken world."

Ambrosino is not a professional theologian — he's a writer for secular publications — but he has nonetheless provided a brilliant and succinct contemporary confession of why Christ's literal resurrection is critical to our faith.

Because a literal resurrection says many things.

It says there is, indeed, hope for a broken world.

It says that belief in the seemingly impossible is not an act of gullible naivety.

It says that pain and suffering have the power to redeem.

It says that God's love is so radical and sacrificial that He would give us His own Son, and His Son would give us His life, to show humanity what authentic love genuinely looks like.

It says that God — as That which gives all things life — is also capable of restoring it, even to the point of, yes, raising the dead to life.

When Thomas Jefferson prepared his own version of the Gospels — titled *The Life and Morals of Jesus of Nazareth*, completed in 1820 — he quite literally, with a razor, cut out the parts he deemed as defiant of reason.

Minister's Message Cont'd

Jefferson was not the first skeptic of the miraculous; Scottish Enlightenment philosopher David Hume (1711-1776) also discounted the supernatural episodes found in Scripture. In Hume's view — and Jefferson's — a deity who would go about defying the known laws of nature by raising the dead and healing the sick upends our experiential reality, with the result of natural anarchy. Empiricism was the yardstick to be applied — and when it was, Hume found preternatural Bible accounts lacking. Furthermore, civilized people just don't believe such things; Hume condescendingly observed that miracles are most prevalent in "ignorant and barbarous nations."

So taking Hume's lead, how do Jefferson's Gospels end? "There laid they Jesus and rolled a great stone at the mouth of the sepulcher (tomb) and departed."

That's it. No Resurrection; no Ascension; no Pentecost.

No miracles, to be sure.

And also no hope.

Call me credulous; call me unsophisticated. But without belief in a truly resurrected Christ — however astonishing; however stupefying; despite the fact that "that's never happened before or since" — then as St. Paul says, "our faith has been in vain."

So when or if we have trouble wrapping our minds around the reality of the Resurrection, what to do? Simply affirm, quite paradoxically: "I believe; help my unbelief!" (Mark 9:24)

I believe.

Because He lives — He really lives! — may you have a praise-filled Easter, and a heart full of hope!

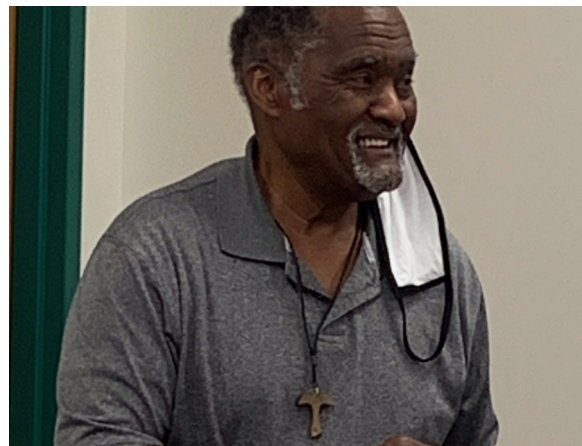

Profession Anniversary

Tau Fraternity honored the 25th Anniversary of Profession for Frank Bowen, OFS and the 35th Anniversary of Profession for Sally White, OFS. The Ceremony begins on page 30 of the *Ritual of the Secular Franciscan Order*.



PRESENTATION:

Gil Donahue, OFS gave a presentation on Care of Creation. He introduced himself as the Regional Animator for Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation. Gil mentioned that he had emailed four hand outs to the Fraternity:

- A calendar with social service ideas for Lent,
- A Care for Creation themed way for Stations of the Cross,
- An outline of the presentation, and
- A preview of an article he wrote for Up to Now with the theme "Be Family in Christ."

Gil read two scripture passages:

Gen 2:15, "The Lord God then took the man and settled him in the garden of Eden to cultivate and care for it."

Mark 1:15, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent (metanoete) and believe in the gospel."

He explained that metanoete means "change your perception/open your mind." Then he provided facts about climate changes = the warming of ocean water and implications. He gave personal accounts of a trip that he took with scientists to Antarctica. Gil then offered suggestions of things that we as individuals can do:

- Talk with other groups about the issue.
- Plan for acting through changes such as recycling, composting, and becoming more consumer conscious.
- Educate your community.

Gil read from the *Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order*, Chapter 2, "Way of Life," paragraphs 7 and 11. He concluded by saying that we are here to tend the garden.

ONGOING FORMATION:

Walter Gawlak, OFS began Ongoing Formation with a recap of Chapter One, "Prayer: Life in Relationship with the Lord" from *Habits for Holiness: Small Steps for Making Big Spiritual Progress* by Fr. Mark Mary Ames, CFR. He highlighted the following points:

- Without prayer, none of the rest of the book makes sense..
- New habits of prayer are aids in our daily conversion.
- Some new habits include journaling, using post-it notes, highlighting/underlining scripture.
- We can sanctify the week or month with prayer.
- We can sanctify the year with an annual retreat,

Before dividing into small groups for discussion, Walter read Articles 22 and 24 of the *Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order*. The groups discussed Chapter 2, "Family: The Power of Relationship," from the formation book.

ECUMENICAL APOSTOLATE

Tau is continuing to provide a representative on the Mission Committee, First Baptist Church in Herndon. Pastor Sean Roberds who leads the mission committee is trying to find ways to welcome refugees to the Herndon community.

In addition to researching various settlement issues and the federal programs that help settlement them, the committee is reviewing the book, *The Newcomers* by Helen Thorpe, in order to help understand the struggles refugees face in fitting in with the American culture.

The book follows the lives of twenty-two teenagers from around the world over the course of one school year at South High in Denver, Colorado. The students, in a beginning level English class, each have arrived from countries devastated by drought or famine or war. It is recommended reading for anyone who is interested in helping refugees settle in the US.

In addition to research, the committee has established some short term goals and one long term goal. The short term goals involve researching ways to connect with US Settlement Agencies to help the Afghan refugees as they are being settled. The underwear drive was very successful in helping the refugees stationed at Fort Picket.

With the refugees at Fort Picket settled the focus is on the Afghan refugees at the safe haven site in Loudoun County. One thousand refugees a month until September will be housed at the safe haven pending resettlement.

The committee members are reaching out to nonprofits to determine if there will be similar ways to help these refugees such as the successful underwear drive. Once the committee can identify needs, then Tau Fraternity and the First Baptist Church can coordinate donations.

The long term goal is to provide ESL classes and possibly an American citizenship class beginning in September, 2022, at the First Baptist Church of Herndon. The church has the classroom that can be used and several volunteers to teach. Tau Fraternity has several volunteers to teach as well. In order to establish the classes, Catholic Charities, Arlington Diocese, has agreed to provide advice on setting up and marketing the classes. In addition, Catholic Charities is willing to provide training for volunteer teachers, registration and other forms, and recommended textbooks.

There will be many opportunities for Tau to provide volunteers. Besides teaching, volunteers will be needed to set up and clean up classrooms, register students, print forms, and mentor students in the classrooms. When the structure of the classes, time and days, are determined, Tau brothers and sisters can sign up for volunteering. In the meantime please pray for this apostolate. Remember this is the Baptist's apostolate which we are supporting.

"Still from Me you run?"

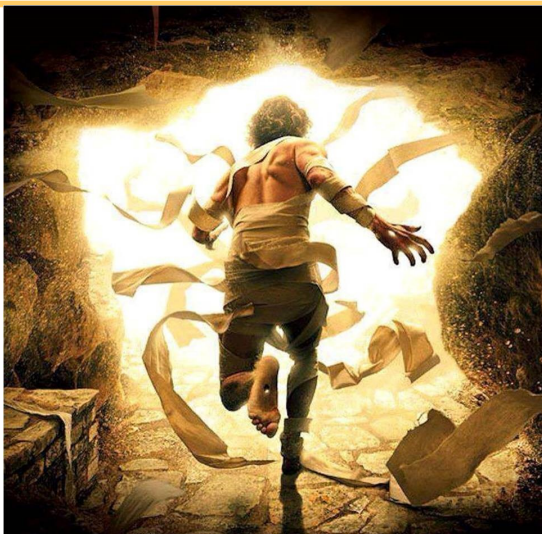
"Having suffered in your pain,

Fr. Stephen King, OFM Conv. is a member of the Our Lady of the Angels province of the Order of Friars Minor Conventual. He completed a Master of Divinity degree at the Washington Theological Union, and has served in various ministries in the province and the order ever since.

He has been involved in the parochial and education ministries of the province, including service to the Secular Franciscan Order at the local and regional fraternity levels. He completed a Master of Arts degree in Franciscan Studies from the Franciscan Institute at Saint Bonaventure University, and a Doctor of Philosophy degree in Christian Spirituality from the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, California.

His main interests are the history and sources of the very early Franciscan movement, especially the use of iconography to present the image of Francis of Assisi. He has served the province and order in initial formation ministry, and has served as a lecturer at the Franciscan International Study Centre in Canterbury, England.

Prayer to the Holy Face of Jesus

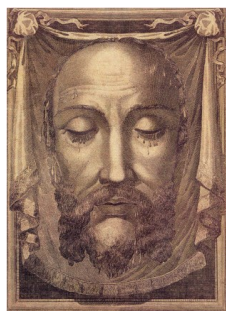
