#### Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I have not been able to attend fraternal gatherings since last fall and I miss you all very much. With the prayer partner list that Pat arranged, I thought it was a good moment to thank all of you for your prayers over the past year for me and my family and to let you know that I think of you and pray for you often.

I also wanted to share some news ... Now that I have settled at my new apartment in Silver Spring and my kids have adjusted well to their new schools, I have decided to take up a unique opportunity. 
# **BEATITUDES**

Perhaps this year should have been called the Year of the Beatitudes. You have two programs from which to choose.

## **The Beatitudes and Francis of Assisi** – from Ruth Shea

St. John the Evangelist church is sponsoring a Hagios Bible Study led by Fr. Erik. The format lays out a chapter or beatitude a week to read, study, reflect, and rest upon. Our fraternity started one small group. The format includes individual study, Zoom small group meetings on Sunday evenings before the large group live-stream presentation, and in person gathering after our monthly fraternity meeting. There is an app called *Hagios* that can be downloaded. In addition to the printed material, the app supplies meditative music to enjoy while you are journaling. You can purchase the book on Amazon. ## **Living the Beatitudes** – from Genny Wilbourne

OFS National Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation (JPIC) is offering a 10-part series on "Living the Beatitudes," hosted by Patricia Grace. A Zoom meeting is held once a month, for 10 months, on Saturday. The Saturday on which it meets, and the time of the meeting, varies from month to month so it is important to contact Patricia Grace at <a href="mailto:patriciaelizabethgrace7@gmail.com">patriciaelizabethgrace7@gmail.com</a> to get the calendar as well as Zoom invitations for the meetings. The next meeting is on Saturday, March 26 at 2:00 Pacific Time. (I think that is 5:00PM EDT).

I attended the Introductory session on February 19, 2022. There were 102 participants, but only several could be viewed at any one time. The format for this session, and all future ones, is divided into four sections: Opening Prayer, Short Reflections, Small and Large Discussion Groups in Breakout Rooms, and then Closing Prayer.

Matthew 5:3-12 The Beatitudes, and John 3:16 were read and discussed. This program does not have a standard text. Several books and articles were suggested for sources for study.

- <u>Eight Doors of the Kingdom: Meditations on the Beatitudes</u> by Jacques Philippe delves deeper into the Gospel of Matthew's promise of everlasting happiness as we draw closer to God.
- <u>Let's Us Dream, the Path to Better Future</u> by Pope Francis offers heartfelt spiritual guidance for a path to a better future in a short "easy to read" publication.
- <u>Bishop Barron: Culture would love to compartmentalize religion</u> in the <u>Clarion Herald</u> is a review by Peter Finny, of a homily given by Bishop Barron to judges, lawyers, and politicians at the Red Mass of the Archdiocese of New Orleans on October 4, 2021. It discusses the tensions rising over the proper role of religion, faith, and moral thinking in today's society.

We were encouraged to read some of this information and then write our own Beatitudes based on our own individual lives. The Beatitudes should guide our personal and spiritual development.

During the small group breakout, we discussed how Scripture is A Love Letter from God and the Beatitudes are the

backbone of community life that seeks common good. All shared our personal synonyms for "blessed"-----happy, joy, given grace, hopeful, favored, thankful for, I love you, gifted, illuminated, joyful, aligned with the will of God. The 2 hours passed quickly and ended with the words on a billboard viewed by one of the participants------

Hi There! You Know That Whole Matthew Thing?
I Meant That!
Love, God

## **UKRAINE RELIEF** – Joan Faltot

I am sure I share everyone's opinion that Russia's aggression in Ukraine is unjustified, a crime against humanity, and worthy of a war crimes tribunal. I want to help in some way, but how? I guess it is reasonable to expect every charity organization to jump on board and start requesting funds for Ukraine. But how effective will they be? What is their experience in Ukraine? So far, I have found one organization that I feel has direct involvement in Ukraine with "boots on the ground" right now in Ukraine.

I hope you have all heard in your parish, that the Knights of Columbus have promised to match all donations up to \$500,000. You can forget the matching funds. As of March 8<sup>th</sup>, \$4.5 million has been raised for the Ukraine Solidarity Fund. And 100% of it will go to assist Ukraine and its refugees. The Knights have contacts in Ukraine. The Knights were established in Poland in 2006 and currently have 6,840 members. The Knights were established in Ukraine in 2012 and currently have 1,889 members there.

The majority of the aid focuses on two operations. On March 1, the first semi-truck shipment of food, medical supplies, and clothing was delivered from the eastern part of Poland to Lviv, Ukraine's western-most major city. A second trip was in the planning stage. The truck was driven by Knights of Columbus volunteers. In Lviv, local Ukrainian Knights unloaded the truck and are working to distribute the material. Say a prayer that the truck does not get bombed, as Russia has now said it would target the supplies/equipment entering the country. The second operation is inside Poland just across the border from Ukraine. The Knights have set up "mercy huts." Fleeing refugees can receive food, medical supplies, clothing, and relief from the winter weather.

#### Additional tasks include:

- The Knights are working with both the Latin and Greek Catholic Church in Ukraine, with dioceses and councils in Poland, and with international humanitarian aid agencies to address needs quickly and effectively.
- Polish Knights have established collection sites in Kraków, Radom, and Tomaszów Lubelski, where they are gathering and packaging medical supplies, warm clothing, and necessities.
- Anticipating a request from the Polish Bishops' Conference, Knights in Poland have created a database of parishioner homes and parish centers that will host refugees.
- Polish Knights and their families have already received and housed wives and children sent by some Ukrainian Knights across the border.
- Local leaders of the Knights of Columbus in Ukraine, including the state deputy, state secretary, and a district deputy, have been appointed part of an "Anti-Crisis Committee," established by the Archdiocese of Lviv to coordinate and distribute humanitarian aid.
- Based on the Knights' success in collecting and delivering relief supplies into Ukraine, a number of organizations and companies in Poland have asked to partner with the Knights of Columbus going forward.


