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A REASON FOR HOPE

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Francis and Clare,

Spring is bursting out all over, and soon the dog days of summer will be upon us. Spring is the season of the year when Mother Nature

wakes us up from our winter slumber and helps us to embrace the beauty that surrounds us and to take in the smell of the flowers in God's new creation.

It is also a time of renewal in hope, faith and joy. Why hope? In his book, God or Nothing, Robert Cardinal Sarah states "hope is nothing other than Christian optimism. It allows man to remain firm in the faith, fully assured by God's promises. In hope, God is the guarantor of my future and of my serene stability."

God has given us the gift of hope not only for ourselves but to inspire others. I am always amazed by the number of people who come together each year to defend the unborn at the March for Life in Washington, D.C. This gives me hope for the future of our Church.

As Franciscans, we are to be messengers of hope and joy, as our Rule and General Constitutions tell us:

Rule 19 Following the Gospel, secular Franciscans, therefore, affirm their hope and their joy in living. They make a contribution to counter widespread distress and pessimism, preparing for a better future.

Article 27.2 Secular Franciscans should commit themselves to create in their environment and, above all, in their fraternities, a climate of faith and hope...

We know that God is the God of hope, as St. Paul tells us in Romans 15:13, "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

Hope is tied to faith. Where there is faith, there is hope. "By the death of your Son, you have given us hope, born of faith, by his rising again fulfill

this hope in the perfect love of heaven". (Holy Week - Liturgy of the Hours)

Our lives hang on the reality of hope, hope in our family, to be firm in faith, and hope in eternal life. Hope turns us away from despair because where there is hope there is faith in what we constantly seek. "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1).

Hope sustains us when we feel all is lost, especially when we face trials and tribulations in our lives. Again, St. Paul tells in Romans 5:5, "Now hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out in our hearts by the Holy Spirit who was given to us." By having hope, we are drawn nearer to God.

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church:

1818 The virtue of hope responds to the aspiration to happiness which God has placed in the heart of every man; it takes up the hopes that inspire men's activities and purifies them so as to order them to the Kingdom of heaven; it keeps man from discouragement; it sustains him during times of abandonment; it opens up his heart in expectation of eternal beatitude. Buoyed up by hope, he is preserved from selfishness and led to the happiness that flows from charity.

So during these turbulent times in which we live, let us not give way to despair but be patient. We may not see it now, but God is certainly in control, as we have faith and hope to guide us on our way, to totally rely on God's plans for us. Therefore, hope is trusting in the Lord. Blessed are they who hope in the Lord." - Psalm 1:1

St. Margaret of Cortona Region's Theme for 2022

In adopting this theme, the regional council underscores the role of the local fraternity as a family: a community of people embodying Franciscan values. The fraternity should be a "safe place" for members to support each other, learn from each other, share joys and difficulties, pray and work for a better community and world.

My personal theme is the antiphon for the Invitatory Psalm introducing Morning Prayer:

Encourage yourselves daily while it is still "today" (Hebrews 3:13). The word "encourage" is a translation of the Greek parakaleite, which means so much more than encourage. It strongly implies the involvement of the Holy Spirit. Let us keep this in mind when we meet as a fraternity. The Holy Spirit should always be present in our meetings, and in our contacts between meetings. We may not always agree with our fellow fraternity members, but we can always encourage them. And in doing so, we strive for greater understanding.

The concept of family means that all members are welcome and invited to "have a seat at the table." No one should be turned away or closed down. The expression of views and ideas—even divergent ones—should be encouraged and respected. No member has a monopoly on what is "true" or "right." That having been said, the fraternity

should adhere closely to the Sacred Scripture and the Rule of the Order. The meeting should be held in such a way that we assume Father Francis is present to inspire us. We would certainly want him to think well of us. Keep this in mind.

Family also means that everyone has a role to play. Servant

Leadership for our Order requires everyone to take an active part and be willing to accept leadership when opportunities arise. This is another reason fraternity members benefit from encouraging each other: individuals can become more willing to seek and hold leadership positions, suggest ideas, and shoulder burdens on behalf of the fraternity.

Finally, family means "love." Love can be hard, but St. Paul tells us it is the keystone of our faith (1 Corinthians 13). St. John implores us: Beloved, let us love one another, because love is of God; everyone who loves is begotten by God and knows God . . . God is love. . . if we love one another, God remains in us, and his love is brought to perfection in us (1 John 7-12).








YouFra

Working for Justice

The Partnership Between UNHCR and Franciscan Mission Service

At the intersection of social justice, career leadership development, and Franciscan spirituality, you'll find the DC Service Corps, a program created by Franciscan Mission Service (FMS) in 2015. DC Service Corps was developed to help meet the needs of both local nonprofits seeking passionate servant leaders and young adults desiring a Franciscan-hearted and justice-centered service experience.

For more than 30 years, FMS has been building partnerships with lay Catholic women and men who are inspired

to live and serve in solidarity with economically poor communities across the globe as advocates for peace, justice, reconciliation, and care of creation. Seven years ago, they began applying their knowledge and experience from training Overseas Lay

Missioners to the 11-month DC Service Corps program.

DC Service Corps volunteers are placed in nonprofits throughout DC and live together in an intentional community at FMS' house of hospitality, Casa San Salvador, in Northeast DC during their year of service.

Starting in 2020, Franciscan Mission Service began a partnership with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR). This placement site gives young adults in the DC Service Corps program the opportunity to grow in the understanding of local and international influences on migration through serving alongside experienced human rights advocates.

Current DC Service Corps volunteer Grace Kuber, a recent graduate of Alma College, serves as a Protection Counselor at the UNHCR, assisting the Individual Case team as they provide support for refugees, forcibly displaced communities, and stateless people.

"At the UNHCR, we work hard to promote accessibility for all people," says Grace. "For individuals who are detained, it is difficult to have access to information, legal representation, a safe environment, and other basic human needs. We really try to assist all people, no matter their background or what they have, for a chance at a better life. There are

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a lot of unknowns when you are a refugee or asylum seeker, so we try to provide as much information and assistance as we can." Grace works with individuals struggling with the effects of family separation, resettlement, and the threat of returning to their country of origin. As a Protection Counselor, she assists asylum seekers, refugees, and their family members by listen-



ing to their stories and connecting them with legal resources through UNHCR's hotline.

"Every day I interact with people who put my own life into perspective," reflects Grace. "Family members advocating for their people in war-torn, tumultuous countries, people who are living in the worst parts of the world, mothers who have to choose between which child to feed: it is very difficult listening to these stories and why they need help.

Although it is difficult, it has made me much more grateful for the life I am able to live now. Patience is also something my ministry has helped me with. Most of the individuals I speak with are not fluent in English. They are in a horrible situation, but they can't relay it to me because there is a language barrier. I owe it to them and their story to be patient and listen to what they are telling me."

Between difficult stories and receiving situations that are out of UNHCR jurisdiction, Grace has been learning to manage expectations and serve faithfully in the capacity that she can, a healthy reminder for all who work in the field of social justice.

"I am not able to help every person who calls or writes to us; it just isn't possible. But whatever we have, we give. The UNHCR is full of knowledge and the ability to research, and so we'll help people with whatever they need to know. The UNHCR has provided me with a lot of helpful training for how to speak, write, and handle case interactions. I've also received training regarding specific pathways for the asylum and refugee process, so I can pass that knowledge onto individuals in need."

This unique and dynamic partnership between FMS and UNHCR creates a steppingstone for young adults interested in social justice work, gives them the opportunity to use their gifts to make a difference, and cultivates a Franciscan-hearted spirit.

"I've always had a passion for nonprofit work but through this, I found a new passion for bureaucratic procedures," Grace says. "Coming into this year of service, I knew nothing about Franciscanism or what that meant. FMS was a perfect surprise."


